IN FIGHTING MOOD

BIG BOMB IS FOUND IN WOMAN'S MUFF.

Young Man Hiding Another Under His Overcoat is Captured By Police.

St. Petersburg, March 14.—The police have learned that the sixty terrorists whom they seized in the streets are members of the same fighting organization, the Northern District Social Revolutionary party, which accomplished the assassinations of General von der Lamm, the last prefect of St. Petersburg; General Mien, who stamped out the Moscow rising; General Pavlov, procurator of the Kronstadt court-martial; the prison directors, Gudina and Ivanov, and the chief director of prisons, General Maximovskii. They had made several unsuccessful attempts, among their intended victims, being the minister of justice, M. Stezheglovitch.

The principal seats of their organization were at Kuokola and Terio, in the Viborg district of Finland. From the papers seized the police know that, besides the Grand Duke Nicholas Nicolaievitch, M. Stezheglovitch was again marked down for death.

Since the defeat of the plot there have been many arrests of important revolutionaries effected by the vigilance of the Russian secret police in Finland. One detective succeeded in being present at a meeting which decided the details of a projected series of assassinations. Besides those taken the police captured a young man in front of the Kazan cathedral hiding a bomb under his overcoat, and a young woman near the Roman Catholic church in the Nevsky Prospekt, who had a big bomb hidden in her large muff.

KEEP MEMBERS TO SIX.

Opposition to Giving Toronto Eight Seats.

Toronto, March 14.—Premier Whitney and Mr. McKay held a conference as a result of which the inaugural meeting of the redistribution committee has been postponed until Wednesday next.

The main issue at present appears to centre on Toronto's representation. Unexpected opposition to giving the city eight members has developed among the rural conservative members and the opposition are not slow to take advantage of the situation. Two conservative rural members said openly, this morning, that they would oppose any proposition to give Toronto more than six members.

Other redistribution comment seems to take for granted that the two West-worth constituencies, with a combined population of 26,000, will be merged into one, while Monck and Cardwell will vanish altogether. In Bruce two ridings will probably be made where there are three at present, and changes are also anticipated in Huron.

VICTIMS OF A PLOT.

Many Gypsies Killed by Poisoned Food.

Vienna, March 14.—The plague of gypsies in Croatia and Hungary has resulted in terrible reprisals by the farmers, who have suffered greatly from the depredations of these marauders. Nineteen gypsies, comprising an entire band, died suddenly near Tompolava, Croatia, this week, after eating portions of a cow they found dead in a forest. It was afterward found that the body of the cow was poisoned.

In a neighboring district sixteen gypsies belonging to another band died after eating hares which had been poisoned by the farmers and left lying in the fields.

Both Croatia and Hungary are overrun with gypsies, who rob wayfarers, levy blackmail, burn lonely farmhouses and are often accused of stealing children.

The authorities have been unable to deport them, and imprisonment apparently has no effect on them.

Room For Millions.

St. Louis, March 14.—Rodman P. Hoblin, premier of Manitoba, and minister of agriculture, stopped in St. Louis, yesterday, on his way to Alabama and Texas for an outing after the close of a long and arduous session of parliament. In talking of the farming possibilities of Western Canada he stated that "the prairie provinces of Manitoba, Alberta and Saskatchewan have room for five million Americans as fast as they can be conveyed there by the railroads." He said: "These three provinces ten years ago had fewer than 400,000. They have now passed the million mark."

Victim Of Heart Disease.

Watertown, N.Y., March 14.—Another victim was added to the long list of persons in this city, who have succumbed to heart disease during the past few months when Mrs. Eleanor Nelson, died at the home of her son, Frank, No. 409 Broadway avenue. She was seventy-five years of age. She arose this morning and called for a glass of water. Upon bringing it to her, it was noticed that she was ill. Death claimed her a few minutes later. Besides the son with whom she lived a number of other relatives in Canada survive.

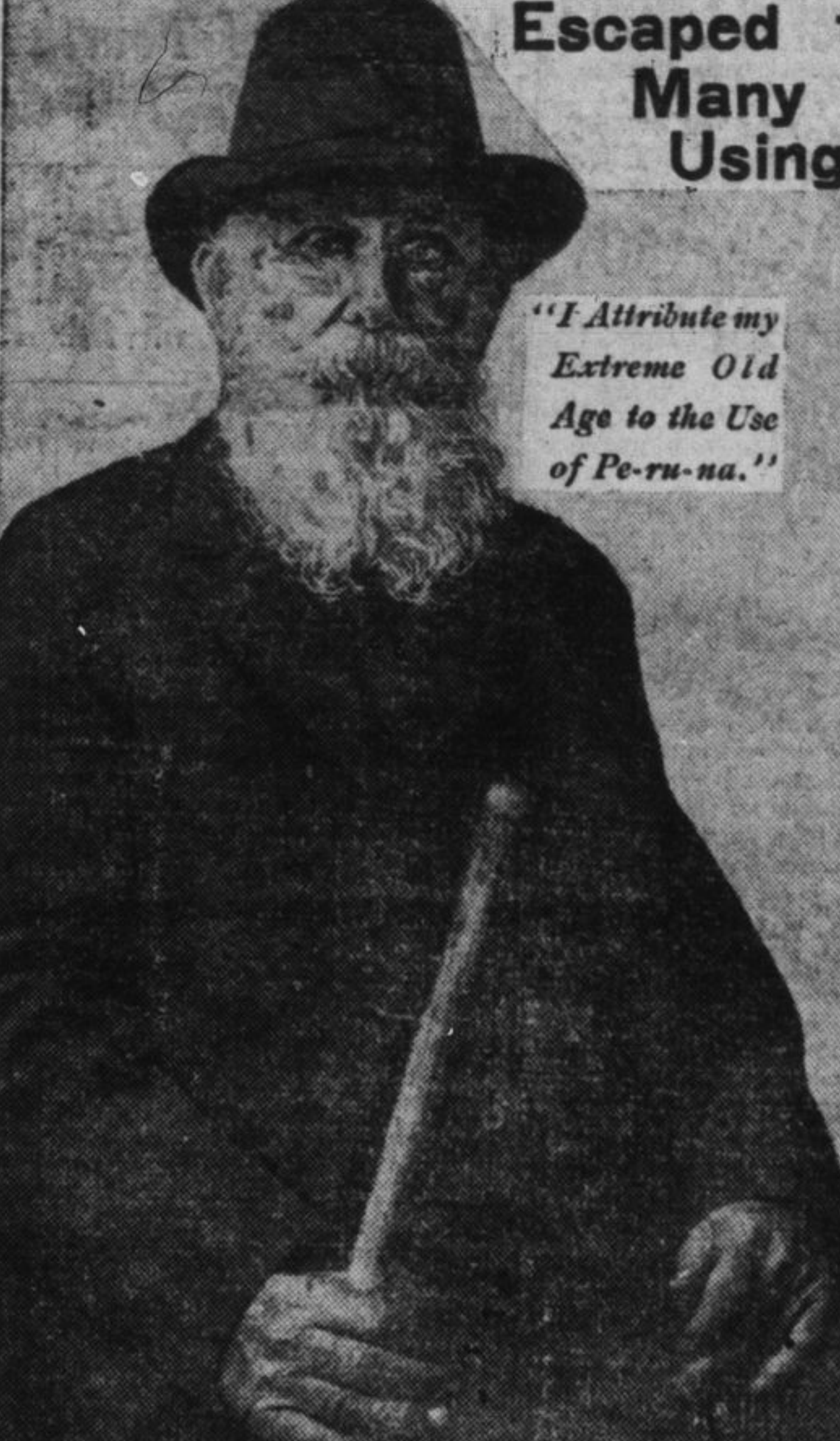

THE OLDEST MAN IN AMERICA



Mr. Isaac Brock, 118 Years Old Last Birthday.

ISAAC BROCK, a citizen of McLennan county, Texas, has lived for 118 years. For many years he resided at Boque Falls, eighteen miles west of Waco, but now lives with his son-in-law at Valley Mills, Texas. WAS LEFT PENNILESS

DANCER IS DUPED BY MAN SHE LOVED.

Disappears From Hotel With Money and Jewels Aggregating \$55,000.

Milan, March 14.—A love idyl between a beautiful young Russian dancer, Zalina Walpola, and a Belgian named Joseph Pai, came to a dramatic end to-day at the Palace Hotel, Milan. Pai, who is thirty-four years of age, and is said to be connected with the management of the Alcazar Variety theatre in Paris, met the talented Moscow artist while she was performing in Brussels, some months ago, and succeeded in persuading her to accompany him on a pleasure trip to the cities of Europe, in the guise of a newly married couple. When they arrived in Milan yesterday, in company with a maid they had already visited France and the greater part of Italy; they appeared to be on affectionate terms. Toward eight o'clock this morning the woman requested Pai to consign to the care of the hotel bureau a silver bag containing \$5,000 in French and Austrian paper money, and also a large case full of pearl necklaces, rings and bracelets, valued at \$50,000. Within ten minutes the Belgian had disappeared with the treasure. He is believed to have taken train to Monte Carlo. As soon as the theft was announced orders were given for all the frontier stations to be watched. The disconsolate Zalina has been left with barely sufficient funds to settle the hotel bill. The police have great hopes of effecting the heartless scoundrel's arrest as he left a rich collection of photographs and other personal indications behind in his hasty flight.
