Ald Elliott wanted to know how much the city would lose by the whole transaction. The horse had done very little service, and had to be fed, at himself in regard to his defence of the city's veterinary. Ald. Elliott wanted to know if Dr. Nicholls was prepared to put up the loss the city would sus-

Ald. Rigney said it was not anticihorse. The animal was being cast aside, not account of any physical ailment, but because it was unfitted for fire work, it being a high strung horse, and of nervous temperament. He couldn't give figures as to what it had cost the city to keep the horse. Ald, Couper held that it had cost the city \$280 to maintain the horse. Ald. 


