## WANT THE CRIMINAL

HE IS NOW IN HANDS OF OTTAWA POLICE.

French Government Made Request For the Man Who Recently Spent a Term in the Penitentiary.

Ottawa, March 18.—The French government has made a request to the Canadian government for the extradition of a famous criminal who is now in the hands of the police. He is William McManis, alias Joe Martin, alias McMahon, and is wanted by the Paris police for complicity in the Rue Scribe robbery. He recently served a term in Kingston penitentiary for shop breaking at Ottawa, but it was not known to the police that they had an international jail bird on their hands until the request of the French government came to hand. He was remanded, to-day, for extradition proceedings.

### KILLED IN THE RING.

Philadelphia Youth Loses Life While Boxing.

Philadelphia, Pa., March 18.—In an amateur boxing tournament, following the regular performance at the Bijou Theatre here, last night, "Wilie" Robinson, aged nineteen years, was killed while boxing with Charles Wolf, of the same age. Robinson and Wolf, who were friends, had been in the ring but thirty-five seconds when the latter struck Robinson a severe blow over the heart. Robinson collapsed and became unconscious. He died in the police patrol on the way to an hospital. ### ENGAGEMENT BRACELETS.

Princess Marie Bonaparte Started the Idea.

The newest Parisian fad is the betrothal bracelet. It is not worn on the wrist, but on the upper arm, the left arm, as nearest the heart.

The fashion is said to have been introduced by Princess Marie Bonaparte, who received from Prince George of Greece, instead of the traditional ring, a double band of gold made to fit about her arm close up to the shoulder.

The two broad rings of which the ornament consists were chased with an antique design and studded with diamonds and sapphires and had a clasp of diamonds.

The engagement bracelet is made in many forms, however, sometimes with bangles of gems and sometimes with two rings of pearls looped from it. Often, says the New York Sun, it is perfectly plain save for a single fine diamond or a small star of brilliants.

### Cleans Fish Automatically.

Washington Post. A machine which, it is claimed, will automatically cut and dress 250 fish a minute, or 15,000 an hour, has been placed on exhibition by its inventor, a Philadelphia man, at the Eleventh street wharf and is attracting a great deal of attention. It is stated the machine can do the work of a dozen men, as an expert cutter and cleaner can cut and clean only 1,000 or 1,200 fish an hour.

The fish are slid into pockets in the rear of the machine, and two automatic chutes at once grip the fish back of the head and near the end of the tail. A circular knife then decapitates and strips the fish, while three knives on a revolving shaft, still further in the machine, thoroughly clean it. After this operation the cleaned fish slides down a shaft into a basket, while the head and entrails are deposited in a separate compartment.

It is stated the machine can be constructed to cut from five to twenty-five fish at each stroke, and can be operated by one man and two children. It is fitted with an automatic register which keeps an account of the fish which are cleaned.

### A Grass From Which Papers Made.

Esparto is not an agricultural product, and it seems fitting that the leading export of the Tripolitan people should be a product of their own arid land, wild and incapable of cultivation. Since 1865, when the first shipment of esparto was sent to England, vessels have borne away thousands of tons yearly to that country. You or I pick up a heavy-looking new, leading export of the Tripolitan people, and the reader of some London newspaper peruses its columns and then casts aside the finished product of the esparto-picker. In 1901, which was an average year, 315,156 camel-loads came into the country, nearly 134,000 passing through the gateway of the Suez-Canal, the total export of the country amounting to about 23,000 tons. That from the town of Tripoli, 16,690 tons, brought £75,500, which was over a fourth of the amount of her total exports.

### ACCIDENTALLY SHOT.

A Young Man Was Fatally Injured.

Ridgetown, Ont., March 18.—Pearl Brien, second son of William Brien, of Ridgetown, was accidentally and fatally shot by his brother while the two were shooting geese at their farm on Talbot street, this morning. He had been secreted under the foundation of a barn, situated about the middle of the farm, waiting for the geese to fly in and started to crack out on their hands and knees, Pearl having a shotgun, and Charles a Winchester rifle. The rifle was evidently at full cock and the trigger came in contact with something which caused it to be discharged. The bullet entered the back of Pearl's head, but it was too late to save his life. He was twenty-five years old and very popular.

### The Cannon Ball Tree.

Among the plants of Guinea one of the most curious is the cannon ball tree. It grows to the height of sixty feet, and its flowers are remarkable not only for their beauty, but also for their fragrance. Its blossoms are of a beautiful crimson, appearing in large bunches and exhaling a rich perfume. The fruit resembles enormous cannon balls; hence the name. However, some say it has been so called because of the noise which the balls make in bursting. From the shells domestic utensils are made, and from the contents are obtained several kinds of acids, sugar and gum as well as the materials for making an excellent drink in sickness.

### Arctic Dog Life.

Nowhere in the world has the dog such unrestricted right of way as in our most northerly possessions—Alaska. In winter when the more than 600,000 square miles of territory are sealed up in solid ice, dogs are almost the sole means of getting from place to place—in fact, they seem necessary to life itself. The aristocrats of Arctic dog life are the mail teams in the service of the United States government. They are to-day a superior breed to the dogs employed some half-dozen years ago, before great gold discoveries increased the mail service.

### Dead At Tweed.

Tweed, Ont., March 18.—Warwick Bowell, an old and respected citizen of Tweed, died at an early hour this morning. He had been ailing for some months. Mr. Bowell was a brother of ex-Premier Sir Mackenzie Bowell and also was an expostmaster, having held the office of postmaster here for about twenty-five years. He was a staunch conservative and a religious Methodist. He leaves a widow, two daughters and two sons.

### Contagious Disease Cases.

Medical Health Officer Bell says that so far this month there have been reported to him five cases of scarlet fever, three of diphtheria and two of typhoid fever. Scarlet fever is dying out. On the whole the health of the city this winter has been good.
