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FINN OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest Culled From All Over The World.

James McBride, Toronto, died of blood-poisoning, caused by a needle getting in his arm.

A. H. Rennie, who has given \$150,000 to the Hong Kong university, is a brother of Dr. Rennie, of Hamilton, Ont.

The liquidator of the Mutual Reserve Insurance company warns Canadian policyholders to pay all premiums to him in trust.

Percy Archer, an Englishman, employed as porter at the Kirby House, Bradford, committed suicide by taking carbolic acid.

Matthew Cummings, addressing the Ancient Order of Hibernians, opposed any alliance between Great Britain and the United States.

Rear Admiral Charles S. Perry will be commander-in-chief of the Atlantic fleet when it leaves San Francisco in July to encircle the globe.

Nine hundred boys in St. Bridget's school at Montreal, marched out in good order in a minute and a half during a fire in the building.

Senator W. G. Blair died at Baltimore, Tuesday night. He was stricken with erysipelas several days ago and gradually grew worse until the end came.

The convention of the Woodmen of the World opened, this afternoon, in the Duffield block, London, Ont., where nearly three hundred delegates are assembled.

The steamer Pomona was wrecked, near Port Ross, California, Tuesday afternoon. All her passengers were saved.

A resolution disapproving of the action of the Toronto council in reducing the licenses failed to pass the Toronto branch of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association.

A fine of \$1,000 was imposed upon the Vermont Central railway company, in the United States district court, on a plea of guilty to an indictment charging granting of rebates.

Joseph Scanlon, arrested in Hamilton, about a month ago, on a charge of inducing his aged mother, at Guelph, to sign a cheque for \$500 in his favor, by alleged false representations, was discharged.

Prince Joachim Albrecht of Prussia, son of the late regent of Brunswick, and a second cousin of Emperor William, has resigned from the army, where he had the rank of major, and will not again be permitted to wear the German uniform.

At the biennial convention of the Dominion Council Royal Temples of Temperance, in Hamilton, to-day, there was a lengthy question of the abolition of the bar. It was argued that doing away with bars would mean improved accommodation for the travelling public.

Postmaster David J. Smith, West Nyack, N.Y., made a single-handed attack early Wednesday, upon three burglars, who had dynamited the post-office safe. He wounded one of the men so severely that it is believed he will die. The others escaped.
