Premier Hazen Has Selected His 'Men to Govern' the Province—All Are Young Men.

St. John, N.B., March 20.—At noon, to-day, the Robeson administration placed its resignation in the hands of Governor Tweedie, who at once called upon J. D. Hazen, leader of the conservative party, to form a cabinet.

Dr. D. V. Landry (Kent), commissioner of agriculture.

W. C. H. Grimmer (Charlotte), surveyor-general.

John Morrissey (Northumberland), commissioner of public works.

Henry McLeod (York), solicitor-general.

The new administration will be sworn in at the executive council rooms, next Tuesday, and the dates of the bye-elections will also be announced then.

The Hazen government is made up of comparatively young men. Not one is yet fifty years old. There are three lawyers, Messrs. Hazen, Grimmer and McLeod; two merchants, Messrs. Morrissey and Fleming; one contractor, Mr. Maxwell; Dr. Landry is a practicing physician and also an active farmer.

Newboro, March 21.—Salmon fishing through the ice at Devil Lake is the order of the day. A few large catches have been reported recently. More wood has been hauled into the village during the past week than in any week this winter.
