QUIT AS TREASURER

WOULD NOT AGREE TO REDUCTION IN SALARY.

The Township Council Gave the Office to H. Glasser—Other Township Business—Sales of Farms and Movings.

Denbigh, March 21.—The municipal council for Denbigh, Abinger and Ashby, met at Vennachap, on the 14th inst. The members were all present. A number of accounts were presented and orders on the treasury given therefor. The auditor's report was handed in, and after considering it, it was accepted and the clerk instructed to get the usual number of copies printed. H. Glasser was then appointed municipal treasurer in place of John Lane, who held that responsible office ever since the municipality was organized, in 1866. The only reason for the change is that Mr. Lane would not submit to a reduction of his salary, while his successor is offering to discharge the duties of the office at a considerable reduction. The usual number of other municipal officers were then appointed, and the formation of another school section, respecting the dividing of school section No. 7, debated upon, but after mature consideration, for diverse reasons, no action was taken.

Patrick Kellous enlarged his real estate by purchasing from Adam Dool the 100 acre farm adjoining his own. M. Rodgers leased his farm of 500 acres to Thomas Pringle, for a term of three years, and is going to work a rented farm near Kingston. Thomas Dool has moved on the farm owned and formerly occupied by William Greer, and Henry Bartsch, after shifting around considerably, has moved back on the old Bartsch homestead, where he intends to remain as long as he can.

Patrick Rodgers has moved, with his family, on his new homestead, near Charlton, in New Ontario, where he intends to reside in future.
