PALMISTRY ABSURD

BENEATH CONTEMPT SAYS PROF. STIRLING.

Dean of Medical Faculty in Victoria University Says Lines in Hand Are Due to Muscular Action and Mean Nothing.

London, March 24.—"Palmistry is an absolute absurdity, the whole thing is beneath contempt," declared Prof. Stirling, dean of the medical faculty and professor of physiology at Victoria University, Manchester, in the course of a lecture at the Royal Institution this week.

"Look at your palms," he continued, "and you will find certain classical lines. These lines—the so-called lines of life, heart and head, and the girdle of Venus, and the bracelets of life around your wrist—what do you suppose they really are? They are nothing more or less than creases or folds produced by the action of the muscles.

The line of heart, for instance, is the flexure of the four fingers. The line of life is the result of the action of the thumb. All these lines which have been given astronomical names by palmists are characteristic flexures. You will find the same lines on the palm of the Barbary ape. It is daily gulléd through its extraordinary ignorance of the elementary facts of physiology."

CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION

Has Placed Its Views on Various Matters.

From Our Own Correspondent Ottawa, March 24.—Mr. Royce, Algonquin West, started proceedings of interest when he asked if Ontario farmers were to be precluded from the benefits of the sum set aside for seed for farmers in the west. Sir Wilfrid Laurier replied that up to date no applications for aid had been received from Ontario farmers. Mr. Fielding told R. L. Borden that the civil service commission report was not yet ready to lay on the table as a portion of it had been omitted and the whole would not be ready for a few days.

So far as can be gathered the report lays stress on the increased cost of living in Ottawa, which practically means a recommendation for increased salaries. But the commissioners have extended very much further the scope of their enquiry than the position of civil servants. The management and administration of some of the departments come in for criticism and in this regard it is said that there is a very much interesting reading. In fact, it is said the report means trouble for certain parties on Parliament Hill.

The house then went into committee on the orders of the day. Mr. Ross (Vale-Cariboo) being prominent with his act to incorporate the Shuswap & Thompson River Boom company. There was a lot of talk on the part of Mr. Foster and those members interested in the district, but for all that was done the bunch might have kept their seats and allowed the bill to pass to the next reading. The object of the bill is simply to boost the company and the greater part of the day was spent in advertising it.

There is one more side issue—an other private bill to the same effect is already before the house and the question is simply a case of which is to go forward. The opposition are fighting Mr. Ross' bill in favor of the other, and rather wildly assert that if this goes through the company would secure a monopoly of the river, an accusation that tickles the government to no little extent. The opposition was kept up as each clause was considered, the opposition wandering away from the point on the slightest pretext.

PAID TO STOP SCANDAL.

Actress Demands Annuity Because of Her Children.

Madrid, March 24.—The judges in the Elene Sanz affair called at the palace, yesterday, to take the evidence of the queen mother.

Elene Sanz was a Spanish actress whom King Alfonso XII had two natural sons. These children are now suing the heirs of Alfonso XII for an annuity which they claim was left to their mother by the king, and which was to revert, after her death to them.

The queen deposed that a few days after the death of Alfonso XII, Senor Salmeron came to Senor Abella, who was then master of the household, and told him that Elene Sanz had in her possession certain letters from the late king, the publication of which would cause a great scandal. She would give them up for \$15,000, and in addition Salmeron claimed \$1,000 for his services in the matter. Trusting to the integrity of Salmeron, the queen paid off these two sums and was assured by him that all the letters in question had been destroyed. The present suit, the Sanz heirs, however, is based entirely upon letters identified with those which the queen paid to have burned. The Sanz matter is to come up before the supreme court, that tribunal having declared itself competent to try the case.

Live Wire Restores Sight.

Phillipsburg, N.J., March 24.—Knocked down by a shock of electricity from a wire he touched, John Miller, an employee of Howard Schooley, a butcher of this place, had the sight restored to an eye which had been blind for thirty-three years. There had been a filmy growth over the eyeball. Upon receiving the shock he saw a woman wearing a blue dress walking in the street. "By gracious, Schooley!" exclaimed Miller, "I see her with my bad eye," and so it proved.

Bay Man Said to Have Made a Strike.

Watertown, N.Y., March 24.—According to despatches, Roswell Viiger, formerly of Alexandria Bay, and well known in this city, where he has visited a number of times, has struck a gold mine in the Cobalt region, north of Toronto. As a purser upon the yacht "Lilac," Viiger had a large acquaintance.

A year or so ago, Capt. Viiger, of the "Lilac," died of heart failure. Roswell Viiger later took a course at Mercersburg Academy, which he left to prospect in the Cobalt region, where a claim was owned by his father. But few letters have reached this city from young Viiger, and the telegram came as the first announcement of the rich strike made by the young prospector.

WANTED HER RIGHTS,

Thinks They Include Drinking at Bars.

Ogdensburg, N.Y., March 24.—Women's rights developed a new and aggressive defender when Majel Bushay was brought before the recorder, charged by a couple of policemen with usurping man's particular privilege of standing up to the bar and dispensing of schooners of beer. Miss Bushay is eighteen years of age and attractive in dress and appearance. She was very indignant that the authorities should interfere with her. She was willing to admit that she had been patronizing a saloon bar, but contended that so long as she conducted herself decently it was her privilege to do so.

"Just because I have the courage of my convictions and walk in the front door and drink what I please is no reason why J should be arrested while women who have their intoxicants delivered at their homes are immune," was the line of argument she advanced to the recorder. Her mother also appeared and stated that Mabel was eighty years of age, free to do as she pleased and so far as she was concerned had her permission to go into saloons if she desired. The saloon man was sent for and given a curtain lecture and Mabel was sentenced to the House of the Good Shepherd at Troy until she reaches the age of twenty-one years.

Awarded A Medal.

Present Journal. Ex-Mayor Stephenson was the recipient of a medal from the Canadian Humane Association, to be presented to our townsmen, Dr. D. M.
