

ARTHUR REILLY, AGED 15,

IN HOTEL DIEU. Was Out Shooting in a Marsh With Two Companions on Tuesday Afternoon.

With a bullet lodged in the hist neck, and suffering great pain, Arthur Reilly, fifteen years of age son of Arthur Reilly, 8 Corrigan street, was removed to the Hotel Dieu, Tuesday afternoon, shortly after three o'clock. The lad was victim of an accident, while he two other companions were out shooting muskrats, in a marsh off Rideau street. The bullet had not been located this morning, at ten o'clock and it is probable that the X-ray will be used. Dr. C. A. Morrison is looking after the patient. It is believed that the case will prove dangerous. The accident, will no doubt, be given

thorough investigation. In conversation with the lad's relatives, the Whig learned that the boy in company with two others, one enamed Tyo, and the other Dixon, went out to the marsh to shoot, as is the custom of many of the boys in that neighborhood. Reilly, so it is stated, had no rifle of his own, but borrowed one from a friend. Tyo had a rifle, but Dixon had not. He intended to notify the police, and have the matter inquired into. His boy told him that he did not have a gun in his hand at the time of the accident, and that as the bullet came from behind, he did not know who fired the shot. 
