MARY GREEN GONE SHE TOOK HER LIFE IN WEDDING FINERY.

Was to Have Been Married and Was Happy at a Party in Her Honor—She Took the Gas Route to Eternity.

New York, April 3.—Mary Green, aged thirty-two, the daughter of a former sea captain, living in East Ninety-Fifth street, attired herself in all the finery she had planned to wear at her wedding at Easter time and then committed suicide by gas asphyxiation, to-day. She was engaged to marry William Edington, an electrical engineer, and she seemed to be happy when her friends gave her a party, Tuesday evening. While her brother was asleep in an adjoining room, she entered the bathroom, tied a rubber tube leading from the gas jet to her mouth, and was dead when discovered. She left a note to her fiancé begging his forgiveness, but giving no reason for suicide.

PITH OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest Culled From All Over the World.

A mild outbreak of small-pox is reported in Harwich township. Judge Cassels, of the exchequer court, will likely accept the position of royal commissioner.

The Winnipeg Stock Exchange is being organized, and will probably commence business in August.

The budget debate died a sudden death at 10.30 o'clock on Thursday night. The tobacco resolutions were put through.

A general fight took place at a dance at Union, Alberta, and a cowboy named Stevenson shot Otto Taylor through the leg.

Toronto council is asking for an order to hasten the hearing of the appeal against Chief Justice Meredith's quashing of the license reduction by-law.

Charles M. Hays, president of the Grand Trunk Pacific, has returned from England, having successfully floated the new bond issue of \$15,000,000.

At Knox College convocation, Revs. W. A. Wilson and Alfred Gandler were admitted to the standing of doctors of divinity, both, however, in absentia.

The New York State Public Service Commission has given the Delaware & Hudson railway permission to purchase the last share of the New York & Canada, raiload.

The first shipment of silver coin was made from the Canadian royal mint, on Thursday, a total of \$24,000 being sent to various parts of the country. The city of Woodstock and the townships of East Zorra and Blandford, may vote on local taxation at municipal elections in January next.

The customs revenue of Canada for the fiscal year, which closed on March 31st, reached a total of \$67,866,632, an increase of \$6,054,033 over last year.

Andrew C. Ferguson, Hamilton, Ont., a young Scotchman, was sentenced to a year in the Central prison for attempting to pass forged cheques on several business men.

At Belmont, N.Y., Giuseppe Sanducci was convicted of murder in the first degree and sentenced to die at Auburn in the week beginning May 7th. Sanducci shot Joseph Dardano, an Albany excise inspector.

The jury in a Sunday saloon closing case at Chicago disagreed so thoroughly that several of the men were found injured and part of the furniture in the room damaged when the report was finally made.

At Brantford, W. H. Loft, an Indian, accused of handling liquor illegally, said he had not had a drink in a month. Mayor Bowby said his nose did not indicate it. Then came pandemonium as Loft tried to smash Bowby's nose. Loft got fine of \$25 and costs.

When the legislature opened, this afternoon, the opposition presented a resolution calling for absolutely no redistribution of older Ontario. This resolution will declare that no redistribution whatever is necessary except in the case of the northern part of the province which is entitled to new seats on account of rapid growth.

Because Mrs. Frederick Switzer married again and became domiciled in Canada, after being divorced by a United States court, her first husband being still alive, an attempt is being made, at Toronto, by the parents of her second husband, to have her claim as a wife upon his estate quashed on the ground that the marriage was bigamous. All the parties are Ontario people.

CERTAINLY IN BAD LUCK.

Thrown Out of Cutter and Eyes Lacerated.

Picton, Ont., April 3.—Webster Talcott, a prominent resident of Bloomfield, was thrown out of his cutter when his horse went through the ice on the side of the road. He badly lacerated his eyes on a barb wire fence. As he lay unconscious he was attacked by a dog and severely bitten before assistance reached him.

The Contest In Frontenac.

There are rumors of a kind of mixed contest at the coming Ontario election in Frontenac. It is stated by conservatives that Dr. Spanier is likely to be a candidate, and remain in the field against J. S. Gallagher, who defeated him in convention. It is also rumored that D. D. Rogers, ex-M.P., will run in this election. If all this is so, Frontenac will have a merry election.

Was Officer Of Napoleon.

Waterloo, N.Y., April 3.—Mrs. Nathalie Fort, of Cape Vincent, daughter of Hyacinthe Fenquet, an officer under Napoleon Bonaparte, died yesterday. Her father fled to America after Waterloo.

Fell Down His Collar.

Picton, April 3.—Gilbert Barker, a prominent retired farmer, of Bloomfield, while engaged at work in his cellar, Wednesday afternoon, dropped dead. He was sixty-eight years old.
