

THIRTY-SIX DROWNED

BY SINKING OF A TORPEDO BOAT DESTROYER.

The Catastrophe Occurred Off the Isle of Wight—Tiger Cut in Two By Collision With a Big Cruiser.

Portsmouth, Eng., April 3.—Thirty-six men, including Lieut. Middleton, commander of the torpedo boat destroyer Tiger, lost their lives in the collision of the Isle of Wight last night between that vessel and the British cruiser Berwick. The vessels belong to the Portsmouth division of the British home fleet and were engaged in night manoeuvres in the channel while on their way to Portland. The night was dark and when the destroyer attempted to cross the big cruiser's bow she was caught amidships and cut in half with knife-like precision, sinking almost immediately. The deck crew who were dressed in heavy oil skins and boots went down with the vessel, most of the twenty-two men who were rescued were engineers and stokers, who having light clothing were able to keep themselves afloat until picked up.

The Very Latest Culled From Over The World.

Several persons were killed by troops in an anti-clerical riot in Rome.

The suit of Evelyn Thaw for the annulment of her marriage to Harry Thaw will come up in the supreme court, New York, on Monday next.

Postage stamps valued at upwards of \$100,000, forming a consignment in process of shipment from New York to Newfoundland, have been washed ashore at the Island of Cuttjhunk off New Bedford, from the wreck of the steamer Silvia.

P. D. Ross, editor of the Ottawa Journal, and defeated candidate for the last provincial elections, has decided not to seek the conservative nomination for one of the Ottawa divisions.

The steamer King Edward has left for Esquimau Point and way places, with a number of passengers and a general cargo. She is the first steamer of the regular lines outward this season.

Fire, on Friday, in the house of John Reid, No. 2 Ashland avenue, in the Riverdale section, Toronto, destroyed his and the adjoining house occupied by Moses Wyatt. Reid and his family, consisting of his wife and his child, had a narrow escape.

A Finnish immigrant girl, on her way to the western states, tried to commit suicide, on Friday morning, as the train from New York on which she was a passenger was approaching Montreal. She jumped from the car and threw herself in front of an approaching train on an adjoining track.

At Terre Haute, Ind., found guilty of a charge of arson, Henry D. McDonald shot and killed Chief of Detectives William E. Dwyer, seriously wounded three other officers and a bystander, and was himself seriously wounded. McDonald had been tried for dynamiting stores and a church in Sandford last year.
