THIRTY-SIX DROWNED BY SINKING OF A TORPEDO BOAT DESTROYER.

The Catastrophe Occurred Off the Isle of Wight-Tiger Cut in Two By Collision With a Big Cruiser.

Portsmouth, Eng., April 3.—Thirty-six men, including Lieut. Middleton, commander of the torpedo boat destroyer Tiger, lost their lives in the collision off the Isle of Wight last night between that vessel and the British cruiser Berwick.

The suit of Evelyn Thaw for the annulment of her marriage to Harry Thaw will come up in the supreme court, New York, on Monday next.

Postage stamps valued at upwards of \$100,000, forming a consignment in process of shipment from New York to Newfoundland, have been washed ashore at the Island of Cuttyhunk, off New Bedford, from the wreck of the steamer Silvia.

P. D. Ross, editor of the Ottawa Journal, and debated candidate at the last provincial elections, has decided not to seek the conservative nomination for one of the Ottawa divisions.

The steamer King Edward has left Quebec for Esquimaux Point and way places, with a number of passengers and general cargo.

Fire, on Friday, in the house of John Reid, No. 2 Ashland avenue, in the Riverdale section, Toronto, destroyed this and the adjoining house owned by Moses Myatt.

A Finnish immigrant girl, on her way to the western states, tried to commit suicide, on Friday morning, as the train from New York on which she was a passenger was approaching Montreal.

At Terre Haute, Ind., found guilty of a charge of arson, Henry D. McDonald shot and killed Chief of Detectives William E. Dewey, seriously wounding three other officers and a bystander, and was himself seriously wounded.

BURIED UNDER SALT VAT.

Body of Unknown Italian Discovered at Syracuse.

Syracuse, N. Y., April 3.—Examination of a body of an unknown Italian found buried in a salt vat, yesterday, revealed wounds which indicate the man died of violence. The body was tied in a bag and buried in a hole a foot deep under the salt vat. The brine had percolated to the corpse and fairly preserved it.

DISORDERS AT FUNERAL

Of Workmen in Rome—Four Rioters Wounded.

Rome, April 3.—During the funeral of a workman, yesterday, a number of riots, who were following the hearse, created serious disorders. Troops were called out. Two rioters stoned the soldiers, who fired, killing three of the rioters and wounding fifteen, four of whom were mortally wounded.

Horse In Drinking Water.

Chatham, Ont., April 3.—City Engineer Jones, investigating a rumor that dead animals had been thrown into the Thames river above the city, found a dead horse in the source of the city water supply. Dr. Charteris, health officer for Chatham township, was notified and will have the water cleared. Prosecutions will follow.

Confessed To Murder.

Trenton, N.J., April 3.—Joseph Bannister and Herman Haupt, who were arrested on Sunday for chicken-stealing, have confessed to the murder of Mrs. Frances Kade, whose lifeless body was found last Saturday, lying across the door step of her home near Fallsington, Pa.
