HE WILL LIKELY DIE FROM SHOTS THE POLICE PUT INTO HIM.

James Smith the Montreal Murderer, Fatally Wounded—The Policemen's Uniforms Drew His Fire.

Montreal, April 7.—It is believed at the general hospital, that James Smith, the man who killed a policeman last night, and held the police at bay for hours, while holding the fort in his lodging house on Main street, will die as the result of the wounds which the police were compelled to inflict before the man was finally subdued. The man lying in the hospital ward, where he was removed, last night, strongly guarded by police, and was served with three warrants of arrest, one on a charge of murder, and two on charges of attempted murder. There are grave doubts, however, that he will ever be able to appear in court to answer the charges.

Chief Detective Carpenter and Constable Foucault, who were shot by the madman, but not dangerously injured, are reported to be improving today, although suffering considerably from their wounds. It is stated, today, that Smith shot at a uniform where he would not bother about civilians. The explanation of that circumstance is that a few hours before the trouble he told his landlady, Mrs. Pritchard, that he had killed someone in the old country some years ago. The fear that she had told the police, and that they had come to arrest him for the crime is believed to have worked on his mind and led to the determination to hold out against arrest at all costs.

"KID" BURKE CAPTURED.

Grabbed \$1,000 Roll, Was Chased and Caught.

St. Louis, Mo., April 7.—While Michael E. Hogan was standing in the public banking room of the Mercantile Trust company, yesterday, Frank Sellick, New York, a bookmaker's sheet writer suddenly seized a roll of \$1,000 from Hogan's overcoat pocket and ran, pushing aside men and women who stood in his path. He was captured on the steps of the bank, while attempting to pass the money to a confederate. Sellick was fashionably attired, and was wearing a number of diamonds. He had plenty of money in his pockets. Superintendent John Shear of the Bertillon Bureau, identified the prisoner as "Kid" Burke, alias Fisher, known to the police of every large city in the United States and in Paris and London. Several pictures of Burke were found in the rogue's gallery. Mr. Hogan is president and principal owner of the bank at Alton, Ill.

PITH OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest Culled From All Over the World.

John Menney, a Toronto lumberman, died of pneumonia at Montreal. The Allan line steamer Laurentian from Boston, arrived at Glasgow, on April 6th.

To-day is the fortieth anniversary of the assassination of Hon. D'Arcy McGee, in 1860.

One hundred thousand pounds of Passover biscuits are held by the Toronto customs for valuation.

Mrs. Vicars, wife of Rev. John Vicars, Cannington, Ont., died, Tuesday morning, after a brief illness.

Inspector William Munro, of the Winnipeg police force, one of the best known police officials in Canada, is dying.

Street railway employees at Winnipeg have presented their demands to the company, and a strike is not improbable.

At Trinidad, Colorado, Deputy Sheriff Tony Shelly was shot and instantly killed on Monday night, by an unknown man.

The Allan SS. Ioniian, from Glasgow, arrived at Halifax, at 8.15 a.m., with 126 second class and 368 steerage passengers.

Decision was given at Osgoode Hall unseating the mayor and six councillors of Midland on the ground that their declarations were improperly made.

Reports from all over the west, from the Rocky Mountains eastward, indicate that the finest weather prevails, and that seed prospects never were better.

It is stated that a determined effort will be made on Thursday to secure the appointment of a Canadian board of the Grand Trunk railway stockholders.

Dr. Orr has arranged with the Guildhall authorities for a collection of paintings by modern British artists for the Canadian National exhibition, at Toronto.

Colin Fraser, the well-known northern fur trader, is in Winnipeg, disposing of his winter packet. He has gloomy forebodings of the future of the trade.

The Ontario supplementary estimates contain a vote of \$100,000 to be made by the province toward the purchase of the Plains of Abraham, at Quebec, for national park.

It is announced the king has conferred a knighthood of the Garter on Lord Crewe, lord president of the council, and knightship of the Thistle upon Lord Southwark.

The new school in Hochelaga ward, Montreal, named in honor of Miss Sarah Maxwell, who gave her life to save the children in the fire some time ago, was opened on Monday.

At Vancouver the great legal battle over the rights of the Dominion versus the province to control the streams within the Dominion railway belt in British Columbia is under way.

The doura has scored a victory of sweeping importance in forcing the retirement of Mr. Alexieff, vice-minister of commerce and director of the department of commercial navigation.

Capt. W. D. Gatfield, of the marine reporting agency of Duff & Gatfield, Amherstburg, Ont., and one of the best known marine men on the lakes, is dangerously ill of typhoid fever.

E. Dyson Currier, a guest at the Badminton Hotel, Vancouver, B.C., while examining a Colt automatic revolver, accidentally shot himself, being wounded painfully but not dangerously.

After Prorogation the Leader, Will Take a Holiday and Then Go Into Campaign Work—Asking For Deportation.

Toronto, April 7.—It is the desire of the government that the legislature should complete its business early on Friday afternoon. If this is accomplished prorogation will take place on Saturday. In any event the last business session will be held this week. It is anticipated that after the house has closed, Premier Whitney will take a short vacation before starting on his election campaign tour.

He is now off Rockford, Ont., and says he cannot secure employment owing to being subject to epileptic fits.
