TO GET WAR OFFICE

It is Said Winston Churchill Will Succeed to It.

As Haldane is Likely to be Made Lord High Chancellor With a Peerage Attachment--The King Coming to London



WINSTON CHURCHILL.
London, April 9.—It is officially announced that King Edward will leave

Binritz on April 15th, in order to hold a privy council in London on the 18th. The new ministers probably will have their first audience with the king on this occasion, as it is understood Mr. Asquith was able to submit a list of his main appointments to his majesty, yesterday morning. Mr. Asquith is expected in London today, when he will complete his ministry.

The latest information in well informed circles points to strong possibility of the retirement of Lord Loreburn, lord high chancellor and the appointment of R. B. Haldane, secretary of state for war, to this post, with the peerage attachment. It is known that Mr. Haldane is ready to leave the war office. He would have liked to become chancellor of the exchequer, but it is apparent that David Lloyd George, president of the board of trade, has the keys to this office in his pocket. In the event of Mr. Haldane going to the upper house, Winston Churchill, under secretary of the colonial office, will most likely get the war office.

Ottawa, April 9.—In Hon. Mr. Fisher's bill to amend the inspection and sale act, now before parliament, the minister of agriculture has taken measures to put an end to the cheese boy romances, which have attracted attention in the old country. It has been found that cheese bottles commonly slipped into the centre of cheese, or to incorporate any inferior cheese or cheese therein. The penalties provided under the act will apply against anyone who either manufactures or deals in these inferior products.

bottles in cutting the cheese, are more apt to grumble about the inconvenience and nuisance than they are to take any serious interest in the contents of the dairyman's note.

The bill which Mr. Fisher has introduced will declare it an offence to put any foreign substance whatever into cheese, or to incorporate any inferior cheese or cheese therein. The penalties provided under the act will apply against anyone who either manufactures or deals in these inferior products.

Cancels the privilege to justices of the peace, of giving certificates for purchase of liquor on Sunday for medicinal purposes. The premium said the privilege had been grossly abused; the magistrates had been very weak. They are, it may be added, a recent selection of the Ontario government.

The license of any seller who harbors a constable will be cancelled.

Provisions against changes of license to escape the second and third penalties are provided. As many as a dozen changes of owners had taken place at Owen Sound within a year or so, to avoid penalties.

A form of notice to habitually drunkards is provided and on proof of their intemperance or of purchase of liquor a fine of from \$10 to \$20 is fixed, while imprisonment is ordered for refusing to disclose the name of the seller of the liquor. This clause is borrowed from Manitoba.

No legislation is offered upon the three bills local option laws.

What Is To Be Done?

According to the law followed by the city council, no work can be done unless it is shown that there is money to pay for it. This rule may cause trouble for the board of education in regard to exits and fire escapes which it contemplates adding to the schools.

At present the board of education has no money to pay the cost; neither has the city council. As difficulties would have to be issued, the question may go to the people. In the meantime what is to be done?

Mayor Busse will enter on the second year of his term with a larger party majority back of him than any mayor has had in the last thirty years.

MATTER ARRANGED

And Railway Will Not Go Into Receiver's Hands.

New York, April 9.—Danger of an Erie railway receivership, on account of the \$5,500,000 notes which matured yesterday, and other floating indebtedness of the company, was removed at the eleventh hour by a new and entirely unexpected development. The management of the company and J. P. Morgan & Co., the fiscal agents, had offered to give up six per cent three years notes in exchange for those maturing yesterday, the exchange of these notes being made on condition proceeding to a loan of \$5,000,000 by a syndicate headed by J. P. Morgan & Co. Instead of this, however, arrangements were made less than an hour before the close of the stock market for payment of maturing notes in cash and the furnishing of the \$5,000,000 additional capital as well.

\$7,682 Cash In Wall.

New York, April 9.—Lacking faith in banks as depositories for his savings—William H. Wilkins, of Whitestone, L.I., who died recently, devised a unique arrangement for the safe keeping of his money.

His daughter found \$7,682 in gold and silver coin, stored away in a hole in the wall. She said her father caused a sort of repository to be built in the wall of the kitchen. After it was once sealed up, he had no way of opening his home made bank and he dropped money in through a slot from time to time. From the day he had standing between two open windows, which was all that saved him from being badly burned.

Montreal, April 9.—George Potts whose name has been called in the recorder's court so many times, and who finally appeared before Recorder Dupuis, about ten days ago, and pleaded guilty to the charge of personating, appeared, yesterday, and was sentenced to one hour's imprisonment and a fine of \$500, or six months in jail. Potts was arrested while trying to personate Isaac McRae, in St. Jean Baptiste ward, at poll No. 1 in the recent civic election. The fine was paid.

New York, April 9.—The first judgment under the labor law passed by the legislature in May, 1906, making railway companies responsible for injuries received by an employee through the negligence of another employee, has been awarded in the supreme court John Toner getting a verdict for \$20,000 for the loss of his left leg in July, 1906.
