

FIRED DELIBERATELY AT HEAD MEN OF MONTREAL POLICE.



John Dillon Says He Has No Regrets For Killing Constable Shea—He Picked Out Detective Carpenter As One Victim.

Montreal, April 10.—John Dillon, alias James Smith, the book agent, who murdered Constable Shea on Monday night, and wounded Chief Detective Carpenter and Constable Focault, talked today, at the General Hospital about the exciting event for the first time. He seemed in no way sorry for his crimes, and apparently regretted that he had not succeeded in killing a few more of the police. He saw the police coming with the warrant for his arrest, and he had every intention of killing Chief Detective Carpenter and Chief of Police Campeau as well. He had not the slightest intention of allowing the police to take him if he could prevent it. He did not know Chief Campeau by sight, and that is the reason he escaped. He deliberately picked out Chief Detective Carpenter from among those who were in the near vicinity. This is confirmed by the fact that he might have killed others more easily, but he was not shooting wildly in the crowd.

London, April 10.—General Booth, of the Salvation Army, was seventy-nine years of age to-day. The event was celebrated in this city with exercises in which 25,000 members of the army took part.

COLEBROOK MAN DROWNED.

Melford Shangraw Fell Off a Log Drive. Colebrook, April 9.—Mrs. John Shangraw, of this place, received the sad intelligence this evening, that her son, Melford, was drowned in the swift river near Wankama, St. Lawrence county, N.Y. While working on a log drive, he fell between the logs and disappeared in the swift current beneath. As the river is jammed with logs for several miles, his companions have been unable to recover the body, and think they will be unable to do so before the drive has passed. The water in the river here is very high and the ice is going out rapidly. There are fears of it doing damage to the mills and dam. A DASTARDLY CRIME.

Fires House to Burn His Wife and Child. Dauphin, Man., April 10.—Apparently a most dastardly effort at revenge has been made at Pine River. Owing to domestic trouble a Galician named Andrew Wanger, twenty-four, separated from his wife. The latter, with her child, returned to her parents, named Galan. During his absence Galan alleged that Wanger went to Galan's house and fastened the door with a rope on the outside, set fire to the house. The flames quickly gathered headway and only with great difficulty did the mother and child escape through a solitary and small window, and that not unscathed. Wanger disappeared, but his arrest is a matter of time, as the police are on his trail. The house and contents were completely destroyed.

Made a Big Capture.

Paris, April 10.—The police have, in custody, three well-known anarchists named Kuhn, Roux and Rousset. They also captured a cart loaded with dynamite which the prisoners had in their possession. It is believed the men are connected with a plot against the leaders of the gigantic lockout which went into effect in this city on April 4th.

Threatening Cabinet Members.

Washington, April 10.—Secret service men are guarding the cabinet members from the threatened attacks of the anarchists. Postmaster General Meyer, who recently suppressed the organ of the Reds, at Patterson, N.J., has received a large number of threatening letters.

Will Exterminate Cannibalism.

Paris, April 10.—France and Portugal have closed an agreement to exterminate cannibalism in Guinea.

ROMANCE SPURS HER.

To Wed Worthington Whitehouse When Divorced.

New York, April 10.—There is romance back of the sordid story of Mrs. Alfred G. Vanderbilt's suit for divorce. Rumor has it that she will be speedily married the second time. Rumor connects her with Worthington Whitehouse, and society is much interested.

Less than two years ago Mrs. Vanderbilt was involved in a wreck of the Montreal express, on the New York Central railroad, while traveling with a party of friends, among whom was Whitehouse, the man whom she sailed for Europe. From this time the names of Mrs. Vanderbilt and Whitehouse have mysteriously been linked.

BIG RELIGIOUS RIOT.

People Incensed Over Diocese Amalgamation.

Rome, April 10.—A fierce religious riot occurred yesterday at Troia, a province of Puglia, arising from amalgamation against the various dioceses of the province. A mob attacked the palace of the bishop, who favors the amalgamation, and smashed all the windows. It then stormed the cathedral where the canons were assembled for service, and wrecked the bishop's throne. The increased people piled up the furniture and set it on fire in an attempt to burn the cathedral. Infantry was hastily summoned and cleared the cathedral at the point of the bayonet.

It's Hams And Bacon Now.

Cleveland, April 10.—A six-legged hog was found in a drove at the packing house of the Cleveland Provision company. Two perfectly formed legs protruded from the hog's chest. In the centre of the chest was a hard lump resembling another head. Workmen at the packing house examined the animal with some interest, and then strung it up by one hind leg on the big wheel which carries the pigs to the slaughter room. It is hams and bacon now.

Absolute Divorce Likely.

New York, April 10.—Hefner McCure has finished the report in the case of Mrs. Ellen Vanderbilt, who has brought suit for divorce from her husband, Alfred Vanderbilt. While official confirmation is lacking it is reported the referee recommends an absolute divorce be granted the plaintiff.

London, Ont., April 10.—Thomas Noah, the Indian who has been on trial here on a charge of murdering Absalom Fox, another Indian, on the night of May 22nd, 1907, was found guilty, this morning, of manslaughter, and was sentenced to twelve years in the penitentiary.

Again Hit Trail.

Fort William, Ont., April 10.—Naked Bushobors attempted to hold another parade, yesterday, but were stopped by the police; fourteen of them have been taken to police station in hags and the magistrate will commit them to six months in the Central prison at Toronto.

Sent To Penitentiary.

London, Ont., April 10.—Herbert Mee, convicted of embezzling the funds of the Stratford Malting and Brewing company, at the recent sessions of the assizes, was sentenced, by Judge Riddell, to five years in the penitentiary on all the counts, the terms to run concurrently.

NEWS OF THE WORLD

CONTRACT IS MADE Between Hydro-Electric Commission and Ontario Power Co.

Toronto, Ont., April 10.—The contract between the Hydro-Electric Commission, and the Ontario Power company, for the supply of power, is incorporated by the bill presented to the legislature by Hon. Adam Beck. The commission promises to take power exclusively up to 30,000 horse-power, and also, in addition thereto, one-half of the amount of power required by the commission up to 10,000 horse-power; thereafter the commission may, at its option, take power from other sources. The commission agrees to pay the company at the rate of \$9.40 per horse-power per annum, for power at 12,000 volts, and at the rate of \$10.40 per horse-power, per annum for power at 60,000 volts, and when the amount reserved and held ready for delivery at the order of the commission is in all 25,000 horse-power or more, payment shall be made at the rate of \$9 per horse-power, per annum for power at 12,000 volts, and at the rate of \$10 per horse-power per annum for power at 60,000 volts. If power is taken at a higher voltage than 60,000 volts, the price shall be determined as hereinafter provided. The agreement is to remain in force for ten years, and can be renewed up to forty years.

Occurrences Recounted In Brief Form.

J. E. Girouard, who has been registrar of the Yukon territory since July, 1898, has resigned.

The dispute between the Winnipeg street railway and its employees will probably be settled by arbitration.

Hugh Clark, M.P.P., has registered his protest against the guarantee of the C.N.R. bonds by the Ontario government.

Col. William L. de Lacy, a prominent lawyer of Poughkeepsie, committed suicide, by inhaling illuminating gas.

The governor-general has given one thousand dollars as his personal contribution to the Quebec Battlefields Association.

The widow of William Simpson, killed at the Phoebe street school, Toronto, has sued M. C. Webb, the contractor, for \$3,000 damages.

W. A. Gallier, M.P. for Kootenay-B.C., announces that he will not again be a candidate at the approaching dominion elections.

The Toronto World reports that J. S. Gallagher, of Frontenac, absented himself from the three-fifths clause division in the legislature.

The congregation of Knox church, Hamilton, Ont., decided unanimously to extend a call to Rev. A. E. Mitchell, of Ottawa, to be its pastor.

John Melanin was instantly killed in a coal mine, at Bridgeport, N.E., when a heavy boulder fell on him. He was employed in driving coal boxes to the landing.

At Vancouver, B.C., the first carload of equipment and horses to be used in the construction of the Grand Trunk Pacific railway east from Prince Rupert, arrived, from Kenora.

David Kidd, who for many years has been the Hamilton agent of the Canada Life Assurance company, has tendered his resignation. He will be succeeded by G. Donohoe Burns.

It is said that T. H. Preston, M.E.A., who some time ago announced his retirement from public life, will again be the candidate of the liberals for South Brant in the coming provincial contest.

Premier Murray, in Nova Scotia legislature, last night, regretting the practice of resorting to commissions by the present government, with the result of unusual charges under this head.

King Edward's visit to Biarritz was undertaken as a holiday in conformity with the strong opinion of his medical advisers, owing to repeated attacks of influenza to which the king has been subject during the spring for a number of years past.

At Oil City, Pa., Miss Nellie Smalley, aged seventeen, may die from over-exertion, due to skipping rope. After jumping 300 times she dropped exhausted, and was seized with prostrations so severe that force is necessary to keep her in bed.
