BURNS TO FIGHT TWO MEN IN ONE NIGHT.

Gans and Nelson Meet in May—Professional Lacrosse League For Fort Arthur, Fort William and Winnipeg.

The Vancouver Lacrosse Club has been taken over by the Vancouver Athletic Club.

Ottawa will vote against the admission of Quebec to the senior National Lacrosse Union.

The C.A.A.U. carnival in St. Lawrence Arena, Toronto, will be a monstrous affair. Over 700 entries in all are in.

The Scottish Association Football Union refuses to give any sanction to the approaching visit of the Australian team to Britain.

Ernest Siegfried, a German wrestler, of Chicago, has challenged Champion Gotch. Gotch has yet to say whether he will take him on or not.

Hamilton has signed Pitcher Covey, of Portsmouth, N.H., and Second Baseman Dunninger, of the Lyons Club of the Empire State League.

Receipts of the Gotch-Hack wrestling contest amounted to \$43,758. A pretty good sum of money, of which \$30,000 clear is for the promoters.

"Joe" Gans and "Battling" Nelson have been matched for a fight at San Francisco in May. Gans to make 133 pounds ringside, with Nelson to catch weight.

Cleveland has the only real Canadian baseball battery in captivity in the big league. "Glad" Graney, of St. Thomas, and "Nig" Clarke, of Amherstburg, being the pair.

"Joe" Gans, the lightweight champion of the world, will not fight Rudolph Unholz, the Boer, at Jeffries' club in San Francisco, unless he receives a substantial guarantee.

An amateur Athletic Association has been formed at Calgary and the Alberta government will be asked to contribute \$2,000 towards sending Canadian athletes to the Olympic games.

Fort Arthur and Fort William are anxious to form a professional lacrosse league with two Winnipeg teams, and thus stimulate middle west interest in Canada's national game.

The University of Toronto will hold a gymnasium competition this evening to decide on the candidates to compete in Montreal, April 14th, for the Olympic team. Keith, Elliott and Fidler are star performers.

"Tommy" Burns has decided not to return to this country as promptly as was expected. He is to meet Charley Wilson and Tiger Smith. Matches with both men have been offered to him at the Folies Bergeres. He is to scrap the couple on the same evening.

The Toronto Varsity Lacrosse Club has arranged the hardest schedule of games for this year that they have ever had. The team will play on May 23rd, at Johns Hopkins; on May 27th at Mount Washington; on May 27th at Harvard; on May 30th at Crescenta of Brooklyn; on June 2nd at New York Athletic Club; and on June 4th at Syracuse. A few more games may be arranged.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any person who has been a member of the Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, existing 8 and 28, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less.

Application for homestead entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency. Entry by proxy may, however, be made at an Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

An application for entry or cancellation made personally at any sub-agency office may be wired to the Agent by the sub-agent, at the expense of the applicant, and if the land applied for is vacant on receipt of the telegram such application, to have priority, and the land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by mail.

In case of "persecution" or fraud the applicant will forfeit all priority of claim unless he has been granted it will be summarily cancelled.

An application for cancellation must be made in person. The applicant must be eligible for homestead entry, and only one application for cancellation for the same land received from an individual until that application has been disposed of.

Where an entry is cancelled subsequent to institution of cancellation proceedings, the applicant for cancellation will be entitled to priority of entry.

Applicant for cancellation must state in what particulars the homesteader is in default.

A homesteader whose entry is not the subject of cancellation proceedings may, subject to the approval of Department, relinquish it in favor of father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, if eligible, but to no one else, on filing declaration of abandonment.

DUTIES.—A homesteader is required to perform the duties under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.

(3) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres to extent, in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his residence duties by living with the father (or mother).

(4) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in any direction exclusive of the width of road and water crossed in the measurement.

(5) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself, and notify the Agent for the district of such intention.

Before making application for patent he settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of his intention to do so.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for a period of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 per acre. Not less than 2,500 acres shall be leased to an individual or company. A royalty at the rate of five cents per ton shall be collected on the merchantable coal mined.

QUARTZ.—A person eighteen years of age or over, having discovered mineral in lace, may locate a claim 1,500x1,500 ft.

The fee for recording a claim is \$5.

At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. When \$500 has been expended or paid, the locator may upon having a survey made and upon complying with other requirements, purchase the land at \$1 per acre.

The patent provides for the payment of a royalty of 24 per cent on the sales.

Placer mining claims generally are 100 feet square; entry fee \$5, renewable yearly.

An applicant may obtain two leases to dredge for gold or five miles each for a term of twenty years, renewable at the discretion of the Minister of the Interior.

The lessee shall have a dredge in operation each one season from the date of the lease for each five miles. Rented \$10 per annum for each mile of river leased. Royalty at the rate of 24 per cent collected on the output after it exceeds \$10,000.
