A PROPHECY TRUE

SILENT FOR YEARS, DUMB WOMAN SPEAKS.

"Bewitched" When a Child, She Was Deprived of the Faculty of Speech.

Florence, April 11.—A woman named Carlotta Tani, living in the village of Castellina Torre, near Florence, has recovered the power of speech after being dumb for forty-four years.

In her home, a farmhouse, which goes by the name of Belle Ragazza, she related how, when she was seven years old, an old beggar woman called the "witch," gave her a quince.

Immediately after eating it she became dumb, and in the forty-four years that have elapsed since has been able to express only her most pressing needs by sounds which her brothers and parents could understand.

Before dying the "witch" summoned the girl, promising a cure, but Carlotta reached the "witch's" hut too late.

She remembers very little of her past, save in the case of a few incidents which caused her violent emotion.

One such incident was a proposition of marriage from a hunchback. She told her sister-in-law, who was in the morning, "Come, come and dress me," News of the "miracle" spreading, the villagers flocked to the house, whereupon Carlotta raved and told them to be off.

She is a healthy woman, but very shy. She remembers very little of her past, save in the case of a few incidents which caused her violent emotion.

Robbers and Police in Conflict. Former Beaten.

Vienna, April 11.—An exciting fight between a gang of train robbers and two policemen took place on a night train running between Agroin and Brod, in Croatia, yesterday.

The two policemen found an unfortunate traveller struggling with three men, two of whom were rifling his pockets, while a third was hammering him on the head.

The police at once attacked the robbers with their swords. One of them jumped off the train. He was killed instantaneously.

The other robbers climbed on the roof of the carriage, and as the train was passing over a bridge across the River Save, one of them jumped clear into the water, and it is believed he escaped unhurt.

The train stopped shortly afterward, and the third robber, who was still on the roof was arrested.

GEMS FOR THE MASSES. Flea is Made For Cheaper Diamonds to End Crisis.

Johannesburg, April 11.—R. H. Henderson, mayor of Kimberley, in a letter to the press on the diamond crisis, says that the policy outlined by Cecil Rhodes at the last meeting of the De Beers company, that he attended, was the maintenance of a steady dividend of forty per cent., and a fair price of forty shillings per carat.

He points out that since then dividends have reached fifty-five per cent., while the price has almost doubled, thus limiting the sale to a wealthy few in America.

Mr. Henderson urges that the position could be saved by reducing the price of diamonds to bring them within the reach of the masses in Europe and America. This would lead to the employment of an increased number of whites, and would relieve the mining companies of any agreement with the buying syndicate.

LUXURIOUS TRAVELLING. French Railway Inaugurates Up-to-Date System.

Paris, April 11.—The Orleans Railway company inaugurated, yesterday, a new train de luxe, consisting of six new cars each seventy feet long, or six feet longer than any cars now in use on the French lines, and mounted on bogies with triple axletrees, giving great smoothness in running.

There are two smoking cars furnished with writing tables, and newspapers and periodicals. In each is a news board on which are filed the latest bulletins from the Havas Agency at each stopping place. Adjoining the two "smokers" is a "library" car, with several hundred volumes, reading tables, and easy chairs, for reading.

There is an electric pushbell at each chair to enable the occupier to call the attendant.

Back At Woodville. Woodville, Ont., April 11.—Percy Bowins, the Woodville youth who was tried at Detroit, and acquitted, on the charge of murdering old Mrs. Welch arrived here, last night, accompanied by his mother, the two immediately proceeding to their home. Very little interest appears to have been taken in the return of the Bowins. A number of persons went to the station, but more out of curiosity than from any other cause.
