## IMPORTANT CAPTURE OF A COUNTERFEITER WHO WAS IN HIDING.

Two United States Secret Service Officers Arrest a Pole in Bellechasse County, Quebec—To Be Extradited.

Quebec, April 13.—Two United States secret service officers, Messrs. William J. Flynn and J. E. Nye, and Sergeant-Detective Parry of the provincial police, made an important arrest on Saturday last, at Camp Murdoch, twenty miles distant from St. Valier Station, Bellechasse county. As a result their prisoner is now in the Quebec jail awaiting extradition proceedings. The accused, is of Polish descent, and whose name is W. J. Pellickas, was for some time suspected with two of his pals, of counterfeiting United States quarters at Elizabeth, N.J. The two others were arrested, pleaded guilty to the charge, and have been sentenced while the principal party, Pellickas, fled the country and came to Canada. The tracing of the man and his arrest was performed in a very clever manner, and reflects great credit on the sagacity of the secret service men.

### STORY OF THE FIRE.

What is Recorded As Results at Chelsea.

Chelsea, Mass., April 13.—Briefly told here is what yesterday's fire did in this city's three persons killed, perhaps more; ten thousand homeless; loss of between \$7,500,000 and \$10,000,000, on which there is about \$5,000,000 insurance; section, three-quarters of a mile wide and a mile and a half long, reduced to ashes; two hospitals, library, thirteen churches, four schools, state armoury, five banks, post office, Y.M.C.A. building, Chelsea hotel and manufacturing plants destroyed.

### To Give Relief.

Boston, Mass., April 13.—Relief work for Chelsea was put in operation today. Mayor Beck is receiving messages of sympathy and offers of aid from cities all over the state and beyond its borders. The public subscription fund was started, to-day, with several subscriptions of one thousand dollars each. Several banks and trust companies have notified Mayor Beck to draw upon them for similar sums. Hardly a big grocery and provision house is not sending its teams to the relief camps loaded with provisions. The big insurance agencies of Boston announce that they are ready to pay losses in full.

### OUR NEW ARRIVALS.

United States Loses \$41,000,000 to Canada.

Ottawa, April 13.—It is estimated that of the 211,569 immigrants who came to Canada in the seven months of last year for which official returns are available, 39,000 were from the United States. At least 5,000 of these sold their farms in the south to buy others in the north and they carried on an average \$8,000 each. Collectively they thus brought into Canada \$40,000,000.

Then there was also \$1,900,000 from the 19,000 artisans, tradesmen and laborers, who had on an average \$100 each. Thus the United States emigrants altogether brought at least \$41,000,000 to Canada.

### DOUKHOBOR PUZZLE.

Veregin Proposes to Bring Tribe to British Columbia.

Nelson, B.C., April 13.—Peter Veregin, leader of the Doukhobors in Canada, stated that the climate of Western Canada is too cold for his countrymen, and he proposed to bring all the Doukhobors in Canada to British Columbia, settling them in the Kootenays, probably in the neighborhood of Nelson, if land could be got hereabout. If there was not room for all his people here he would take the balance to the coast and settle them near Vancouver. He left for Vancouver on Saturday to look over a situation there. The Doukhobors number 7,000 persons, comprising 1,200 families.

### BURNED BATHING BABIES.

Dunville Woman Was Too Near Gas Stove.

Dunville, Ont., April 13.—As Mrs. Stanley Bates was leaning her twin babies, yesterday, in front of an open gas stove, her dress took fire and she was so badly burned that she died. Mrs. Bates was alone in the house, her husband having left for Penetanguishene a week ago.

### The Balkan Peril.

A strange story reaches us from one of the Balkan states, where commercial morality is still in its infancy. At a recent banquet given at the house of the prime minister a distinguished diplomat complained to his host that the minister of justice, next to whom he was sitting, had taken his watch. The prime minister said: "Ah, he shouldn't have done that. I will get it back for you." Sure enough, towards the end of the evening the watch was returned to its owner. "And what did he say?" asked the guest. "Sh-h. He does not know I have got it back," said the prime minister.

### Victoria Man's Sudden Death.

Victoria, B.C., April 13.—Seized with an epileptic fit while sitting for his supper, which he had just ordered, William Hooper, a member of the firm of Hooper Bros., mill owners, at Dunsmuir's, expired suddenly on the sidewalk outside the Commercial restaurant. He managed to stagger as far as the street when he collapsed, and before medical aid could be summoned he passed away.

### COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What is Going on in the Business World—The Markets.  
Montreal power's year ends this month, and it is estimated that the company will show gross earnings of \$3,910,000 for the twelve months. The net will likely be around \$2,222,000, and after providing for bond interest and other charges, the company will show close to ten per cent. earned on the common stock.  
As an illustration of the huge amount of capital awaiting solid investment in London, it is announced that the first day's application for the county council's three and a half per cent. loan of \$13,750,000, issued at par, amounted to \$500,000,000. A similar loan a year ago was issued at 97, and then it was covered about twenty-fold.  
Dougherty & Co., mining promoters, of New York, who in the past few years have floated forty companies, with \$150,000,000 of capital stock, among 20,000 shareholders, from which they drew \$4,000,000, now plan to cut the \$150,000,000 capital to \$15,000,000, place the companies under one control, the Amalgamated Properties company, and assess every stockholder ten cents on each \$1 he invested.  
When Mr. Hooper introduced postal telegraph and commercial cable here, the Montreal Stock Exchange experienced some of its best and most prosperous days. These two issues became immensely popular, and it is no exaggeration to say that within a comparatively short time Canadians were carrying from \$6,000,000 to \$6,000,000 worth of the two stocks. It is equally safe to assert that the Canadian investors who stuck to the issues have made over \$5,000,000.  
Will Try and Settle.  
Toronto, April 13.—J. H. Plummer, president of the Dominion Iron & Steel company, arrived last night; James Ross, of Montreal, president of the Dominion Coal company, and E. B. Angus, Montreal, one of the directors, are also here. It is rumored these two companies are to endeavor finally to get together, and attempt to settle the matter in dispute.
