

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Homestead Regulations.

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, excepting 3 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less.

COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What is Going on in the Business World—The Markets.

The exports of manufactures of the United States have averaged more than two million dollars a day during the entire year, including every day in the calendar year. On June 30th, 1906, the total single track railway mileage in the United States was 22,423.1 miles, or 6,262.13 miles more than at the end of the previous year. The United States Steel Corporation has about completed preparations for the purchase of the business of Corigan, McKinney & Co., Cleveland, Ohio, probably the wealthiest iron interests not in any way affiliated with the trust. Suit for the recovery of \$167,449.58, claimed to be balance due from sale of stock, has been entered by the Silver Leaf Mining company, against the well-known New York brokerage firm of Douglas, Lacey & Co. Acting on information given by the Canadian Policyholders' Association, the minister of finance has instructed Superintendent Fitzgerald, of the insurance department, to make an enquiry into the Canadian Guardian Life Insurance company.

Among the poems in May Scribner is a sonnet by Archer M. Huntington, who recently presented the Hispano-American Museum to the city of New York, and who has fine literary accomplishments. The E.M.S. Empress of Ireland covered the distance from Halifax to Liverpool last week in five days nine hours and forty-one minutes, the fastest winter passage recorded in the world's trade. The republican New York state convention, endorsed Governor Charles E. Hughes as candidate for president.

DRAMATIC CIRCUMSTANCES.

Shot By Woman He Would Not Wed.

Geneva, April 14.—Arthur Weber, a young man employed in a tobacco factory at Reinach, in the canton of Argovie, was shot by a woman, yesterday, under the most dramatic circumstances. For some time past Weber has been pestered by the woman—a beautiful young Italian. She declared that she had fallen violently in love with him and implored him to marry her. Unfortunately, Weber's affections were engaged elsewhere, and when he informed the Italian of this fact she threatened to kill him if he did not marry her. She nearly carried out her threat yesterday afternoon, when, with a revolver in her hand, she entered the factory, brushed by the workmen, and going up to Weber, shot him in the back. "This is my revenge," she said, and throwing down the revolver, she walked out of the factory before any of the astonished workmen could interfere. She was arrested the same night. Her victim is dangerously wounded, and there is little hope of his recovery.

The Bosses Win.

Major Rathbun, M.P.P., East Hastings, is opposed to the alterations by the Whitney government in Hastings county. East and West Hastings had each a population of about 17,000 people, while the North had 25,000 people. In this arrangement the East has 29,000, the West 17,000, and the North 22,000, putting the county out of balance. He could not see why a township giving a majority of 162 conservatives should be thrown into a riding which at last election gave the large number of votes of any riding in the county. The change negates the power of Hastings and Prince Edward to the bosses, a small group of men living in Belleville.

LIVE STOCK MARKETS.

The Prices Paid at Various Centres.

Montreal, April 13.—About 1,270 head of butchers' cattle, 380 calves, 249 sheep and lambs, and 2,537 fat hogs were offered for sale at the Point St. Charles stock yards this forenoon. A large proportion of the cattle were in prime to extra condition, and trade was good at advanced prices all round. Extra Easter cattle sold at from 6c. to 6 1/2c. per lb.; prime heaves at 5 1/2c. to near 6c.; pretty good cattle, 4 1/2c. to 5c.; and the common sort, 3 1/2c. to 4c. per lb. Joseph Richard bought 10 extra steers at 6 1/2c. per lb.; 5 calves at 7c. to near 9c. per lb.; and a mixed lot of 15 sheep and lambs at 6 1/2c. per lb. A lot of choice calves from Whittby, Ont., were sold to a Quebec buyer at from 7c. to 10c. per lb. Other calves sold at from 4c. to 6c. per lb.; spring lambs sold at \$5 to \$6 each. Good lots of fat hogs sold at from 7c. to 7 1/2c. per lb.

PLAN ONCE FOILED

TERRORIST CHIEF ENDS LIFE IN EXILE.

Escaped From Siberia in Barrel and Made Men Assassins By Hypnotic Spell. St. Petersburg, April 14.—Gershuni, the ex-student rioter and ruling spirit of the present revolutionary terrorist movement in Russia, is reported by the newspapers to have died in exile but a free man. He escaped from a life sentence in the East Siberian political penal settlement two years ago by getting some fellow prisoners to conceal him in a coal barrel which, with a load of others, was to be taken further north. The driver was bribed and "lost" the barrel, its occupant escaping after many perils to Japan, and then to America. Among his young comrades he was credited with strong powers of hypnotism, by which he became the real pivot of their movement. Most of the attempts against heads of the Russian government in recent years were of his devising. It was his instruments who assassinated Prince Obolensky and M. de Plehve, and since his escape he organized some of the chief attempts of recent months. He never took part in the actual deeds, but by choosing men among his desperate comrades, fascinating and frightening them, he directed the most daring coups. Once, his friends admit, he was foiled completely. He had instigated an attempt on the life of the late M. Polesnoi, procurator of the holy synod, which was to be carried out at the funeral of M. Linaev, the minister of the interior, whose execution he had decreed. For assassination he had chosen a young subaltern of radical leanings. After four sances with Gershuni the officer refused to kill the procurator. On the morning fixed for the deed the chief went to his agent's room and found him terrified from remorse, swearing that he could not commit murder. Gershuni upbraided and derided him, finally giving him a bottle of strong wine and telling him to do as he bid. The officer went out obediently with his revolver and poisoned bolts and took his position on the line of the funeral procession. As M. Polesnoi stepped forward on foot the eyes of the two men met, and the would-be assassin, who had covered under the eye of Gershuni, felt himself even more helpless as the agent's cold, grey, masterful eyes did not release their hold from his. It was as if they met and fought in a life-and-death combat and the terrorist was vanquished. He broke down, turned and fled. They found him in his lodgings in an hysterical state, exhausted with throwing off the spell of Gershuni.
