The first meeting of the executive of the Kingston Baseball League was held in the Randolph hotel, last evening. The following teams were represented: Senior, Mc-Macs, R.C. H.A., C.L.A., Y.I.C.B.A., Victoria, junior, Crescent, C.L.A. and Victoria, and president, Frederick McFarland, E. S. Webster and Secretary Hipson. The by-laws, drawn up by the three officers, were submitted to the executive to vote on. They were adopted with only two votes being taken, on the final rule and one on the amendment to it. The playing in the junior ranks of men under nineteen years old, who had played two senior games last year, was fully thrashed out, and it was finally decided that as long as they were in good amateur standing, according to the C.A.A.U., and were under age, they could play junior this season. The other rules were discussed at length.

The president, vice-president and secretary-treasurer will draw up the schedule and submit it to the executive at the next meeting, to be held at the Randolph on Wednesday evening next.
