## WAS A GREAT CRUSH IT WILL COST HUNDREDS TO REPAIR.

Flood Caused By Ice Jam—Damage Done to Docks and Gardens at Clayton.

Watertown, N.Y., April 16.—Reports have reached this city of a remarkable ice jam which formed in the St. Lawrence river a few days ago, extending from Clayton to a distance of a half mile or so below Thousand Island Park, where the river narrows to a few hundred feet.

Coincident with the jam, the unusually high water rose several feet more, adding further damage to that which had already been done. Residents of the islands say that the water is the highest in twenty years. Docks have been washed away, flower beds destroyed and lawns wrecked.

Some time ago the ice from the river in the vicinity of the Thousand Islands passed off down the river, excepting small portions in the hidden bays. Later on huge masses from the lake regions began making their appearance. A few days ago it jammed in the Narrows opposite Jolly Oakes, the jam accumulating as the hours passed until it formed a bridge to Clayton, allowing the mail man to cross for three days between that village and the park. The damage wrought will cost many hundreds of dollars.

### MYSTERY SOLVED.

Murdered After Asking For Return of a Loan.

New York, April 16.—The Brooklyn police declare they have solved the mysterious murder of Giovanni Carollo, whose body was found in a vacant lot in South Brooklyn with a cord knotted about his neck and two flour sacks over his head. They allege that Carollo was killed in a bakery shop kept by Giuseppe and Vito Bonetti in South Brooklyn, and that Carollo went there to collect \$100 which he had loaned them.

### MCCARRON OUSTED.

Declared Not to Be a Delegate to Convention.

New York, April 16.—State Senator Patrick H. McCarron, leader of the Kings county democracy, was unseated from his place as a delegate to the party's state convention, last night, after a two days' contest.

Disorder reigned in the convention early, this morning. A fight occurred on the convention platform and one man was knocked off.

### TWO MEN DROWNED.

Launches Capsized Near to Goose Bay Last Night.

Rogersville, Ont., April 16.—Thomas Hazelton and James Chismore were drowned in the St. Lawrence river, about ten miles west of here, last night. They left Alexandria Bay in a small gasoline skiff and had got about as far as Goose Bay when a storm of sleet and snow struck them, instantly capsizing their boat. Hazelton was married, but Chismore was single.

### CHILD'S BODY FOUND IN VAULT.

Oswego, N.Y., April 16.—Looking for their lost baby boy from one o'clock, until 11 o'clock, only to find the little fellow dead in the vault of the outside closet of their home, is the pathetic experience of Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Peterson.

James started out to play attire in a blue top coat and little Scotch derby. His mother saw him start across the street, and sending some one to look for him, a few minutes later was made to find him. After a vain search the mother became alarmed and parties were sent out to look for the boy. Before the afternoon was over crowds had descended the streets and scoured wards. It fell to the lot of his grandfather, John Galvin, who had always made an especial point of visiting the little fellow, to find him in the vault.

She walked in on them quietly, when both were at home. Mrs. Ferguson has possession of the flat, but in the meantime, after failing to get her out of town, "Charley" has disappeared.

### SHOT THE MEN.

Who Sought to Take Car From the Barn.

Chester, Pa., April 16.—A ticket agent and motorman of the Chester Traction company, the conductors and motormen of which company are on strike, because the company reduced their wages ten per cent., were shot and severely wounded, early to-day, when they attempted to take a car out of the barns. The local police were unable to control the crowd, and a call was sent for the state police.

### THE FIRST ARRIVAL.

Port Colborne, Ont., April 16.—Navigation through the Welland canal was practically opened at seven o'clock, this morning, with the first arrival of the season, the steamer Imperial and Barge 41, bound from Sarnia to Toronto with oil. Capt. Morrison stated that he arrived off the harbor, last evening, but, owing to the heavy ice and fog, did not attempt to enter the harbor until daylight. The ice extends for quite a distance up the lake, and towards Buffalo, and in places is very solid.

### JAILED FOR ELECTION FRAUDS.

New York, April 16.—Frank Duffy, an election district captain, who had been convicted of having assisted thirty men to register falsely at the last election in the seventeenth assembly district, was sentenced to not less than two years and three months and not more than four years and three months in prison. The punishment was meted out in spite of more than 200 letters, asking for clemency.

### BROKE JAIL; SHOT DEAD.

St. Petersburg, April 17.—A sensational prison breaking is reported from Penca, which resulted in ten deaths. Eleven political prisoners attacked and stabbed two wardens to death. They then threw a number of bombs and escaped from the prison in the confusion. Guards hastily gave pursuit and shot eight of the men dead.

### FEAST OF THE PASSOVER.

The Hebrew feast of the Passover or Pesach was observed by the Hebrews of this city, last night, by the holding of a special service in the synagogue at the corner of Montreal and Peel streets, and dor the next eight days, services will be held daily and also at the home of the Hebrew people, it being also a home festival.

### DROWNED ON A WRECK.

Gothenborg, Sweden, April 16.—The small steamer Goeteborg capsized here, yesterday afternoon, with thirty or forty persons aboard the steamer. Sixty of them were rescued, but eight bodies have been so far recovered. It is believed that there are many more in the wreck.
