AT QUEBEC CELEBRATION

ONE HALF OF THE 47TH REGIMENT TO ATTEND.

Annual Meeting of the Officers Was Held in This City—Committees Were Appointed.

Hannah, Enterprise; No. 6, Capt. A. Hunter, Verona; No. 7, Capt. Charles Gray, Olesca; No. 8, Capt. Pringle, Arden, with Surgeon-Major Dr. Curtis, and Rev. A. E. Jones, of Tamworth.

The trip to the city of Quebec is being looked forward to with keen interest, on the part of the regiment, and the only regret is that the whole regiment will not be allowed to go, but, of course, orders will not permit this. However, those who are chosen will make a splendid showing for the regiment.
