WOMEN'S NOBLE WORK

WHAT THE Y. W. C. A. HAS ACCOMPLISHED.

It Was Organized Nearly Fifty Years Ago—It Wards Off Danger For Many a Young Woman in These Evil Days.

It was but fifty years ago that a little group of women met in the English town of Bristol to consider the problem then being forced upon them of protecting and caring for the girls who were coming to that town to earn their living, and who were thus deprived of home care and guidance. The necessity for such an organization even then, when most of the professions and businesses were shut against women, was so great that the effort spread rapidly into all the principal cities and towns of Great Britain, and over the sea into the continent. Branch after branch of the Young Women's Christian Association were formed, until at the third international conference of the World's Young Women's Christian Association in Paris, in May, 1906, a company of 260 delegates, representing twenty-one countries, with many visiting delegates, made up one of the largest conferences of an international character which has ever been held. French, German and English were the languages used in the work of the conference, but many others were heard in the committee meetings and in the corridors, a constant reminder of the world-wide stretch of this great work.

The keynote of the association has been, and is, sympathy and love, and there are thousands of young women who look back to the little social gatherings in the association rooms or home as the beginning for them of a new life. "I was friendless and lonely," one says, "and though no one cared for me, but there I found a friend, and somehow after that it was easier to believe in the Divine Friend."

The education department, with its libraries of good, wholesome books, its classes and lectures, its reading circles and literary societies, aims at the development of woman's intellectual nature. Browning's words: "My business is not to remake myself, but to make the absolute of what God made" is the aim of this department.

The physical department, with its gymnasiums and outdoor clubs, tennis courts, lectures on physiology and hygiene, has an inestimable value in awakening and strengthening in the members reverence for their bodies and a desire for physical health and strength. The boarding homes scattered here and there all over the world afford accommodation for thousands of young women, amid helpful and pleasant surroundings, all under Christian influences. The luncheons and restrooms, when wholesome food is furnished at a price within the reach of all, are all part of the work of this great organization.

The work accomplished in the industrial centres during the past decade has brought new life and hope to thousands of young women employed in mills and factories. Lunch and restrooms have been established in these buildings and clubs and classes have been formed, which have brightened the monotony and dull routine of their lives, and ill-ventilated and unsanitary buildings have, through persistent efforts of the association, become thoroughly efficient and well equipped buildings. In a great mill, where hundreds of girls toil through the long hours, there is a little band on whose faces new light has come. Many changes have been made in the scene of their day's work.

Properly conducted, the Young Women's Christian Association is one of the strongest forces in moulding the coming womanhood of the countries, and in determining the future life of the nation. In countries where women have little opportunity for education and great need of healthy social life, where many women are to be found in factories, in shops and in all occupations, and above all where women have already shown themselves possessors of much native strength and ability, the association has great scope for its various activities.

Miss Carrie Macdonald, the secretary in charge of the Canadian Association in Japan, thus writes: "The problems of Japan's young womanhood are agitating the serious men and women of Japan, and the association as an aid, has been heartily welcomed. Requests have already come in from organizations in more than ten centres, not only to work among students and graduates, many of whom are young women of leisure, but to grapple with the more distinctively city problem among the girls in shops, offices, stations and factories."

An effort is being made to extend the scope of the work in Canada. The association has enrolled between five and six thousand members stretching from coast to coast, and comprises about fifty associations. But this is only a beginning. The United States has 745 associations and 100,000 members, while eleven traveling secretaries are constantly employed in visiting the outlying places, presenting the work and organizing new associations. Canada has but one such secretary to cover its vast territory. The demands for this work in the west are overpowering. Many of the young women in places of business in the large towns are obliged to accept unsatisfactory boarding houses or live in tents. The travelling secretary found many of them in tents during her visit to the west last summer, and spent much of her time in opening up boarding homes in such towns as Winnipeg, Edmonton and Brandon. Associations are now contemplating, with the hearty co-operation of the mayor and business men, the opening of large homes in which many young women will find comfortable accommodation, with care and guidance in times of difficulty for a reasonable cost.

FOREST FIRE PROTECTION.

The Need is Very Great Say Those Who Know.

Fire is the greatest enemy the forest has, and before it is worth while attempting any scientific management of the forests, some means must be put in operation for keeping the fires out of the woods. There may be some certainty of our having a forest to manage. The amount of damage done to the forests by fires in times before any protective system was established is simply incalculable; it has often been said, and probably even falls short of the truth, that for every dollar's worth of timber taken by the lumbermen from the valley of the Ottawa river, one of Canada's greatest lumbering districts, fires have destroyed ten dollars' worth.

PARIS. APRIL 18.

H. O. TANNER, of New York, the painter of Biblical scenes, has just finished the large picture which he is to send to the Salon des Artistes Francais, and which measures no less than five metres wide. It represents the parable of the Bible, "The wise and the foolish virgins," and its composition, which is very simple in its arrangement and execution, does honor to the artist. "This parable means that men should be ready to meet the judgment of God and that those who have been imprudent enough not to prepare for it will be excluded from heaven. According to the old custom, the bridegroom went to the bride's house when the evening came, to bring her to his own house where the wedding feast awaited them. Young men and women went to meet him with torches. "Then," says the gospel, "shall the kingdom of heaven be likened unto ten virgins, which took their lamps and went forth to meet the bridegroom. And five of them were wise and five foolish. They that were foolish took their lamps and took no oil with them. But the wise took oil in their vessels while the bridegroom tarried they all slumbered and slept." Mr. Tanner has placed his subject in an atrium, the ground of which is paved like a chessboard, with white and green tiles. Between the roof and the beams that support it, and which are hung with a brownish-red drapery and wreaths of laurel leaves, there is a glimpse of the sky, of a deep violet blue, shining with stars. The picture depicts the moment when the virgins are called by the guardians who watch the entrance of the hall, and the virgins are represented in several groups some in white tunics, others in mauve or blue.

HIS BANK THE WALL.

Equivalent of \$25,000 Found in Ruins of a Cottage.

New York, April 18.—Convicted that William Jaynes, who died last week, had hidden away in a trunk a considerable amount of money, the executors of his will made a thorough search of his property, and finally decided to tear down the dilapidated cottage in which the man had spent his life. After a portion of the wall had been taken down, the workmen found two bags, one containing \$3,000 in gold, the other \$6,000 in bank notes. Later they discovered bank notes, which will bring the value of the estate to \$25,000.

DRUG MANUFACTURER FINED.

Washington, April 18.—As a result of the first conviction under the pure food and drugs law, Robert N. Harper, president of the Washington Chamber of Commerce, former president of the American National Bank, and one of the best known business men of this city, was sentenced by Judge Kimball in the police court to pay a fine of \$500 on one count and \$200 on another count of the indictment recently returned against him for manufacturing and selling an alleged mis-labelled pharmaceutical compound. President Roosevelt had insisted that the prosecuting officer demand a jail sentence.

PRINCE RUPERT GOING AHEAD.

Vancover, B.C., April 18.—Reports from Prince Rupert are that the town is rapidly going ahead. Although people are advised to keep away until town site lots are put on the market. The Bank of Montreal is about to establish a branch there, the Bank of Commerce already having one. Sub-contractors on railway construction have started work.
