BIG FIRE IN TORONTO

DESTROYED G.T.R. ELEVATOR AT QUEEN'S WHARF.

The loss is \$60,000—Mrs. Scott, a widow, was killed by a hose reel on its way to the fire.

Toronto, April 21.—Over \$60,000 damage was done by fire that destroyed the G.T.R. elevator at the Queen's wharf early this morning.

The fire started shortly before seven o'clock. The big elevator stood at the extreme end of the dock. It was built almost entirely of wood and it was dry as tinder.

At five minutes past eight o'clock the crowd, who covered every available space from which a view could be obtained, gave a short quick gasp as the huge structure every line of which was marked out with flames, heeled over to the west, and a big section fell with a roar and a hiss into the waters of the slip.

The loss is: Grand Trunk elevator, \$50,000; insurance in the Liverpool and London and Globe for \$34,000; G. T. R. cars, \$1,400; L. Coffee & Co., grain, \$2,500; Ingraham & Hand-in-Hand, \$2,500; Canadian Grain Co., grain, \$1,500; Inwood in the Royal \$4,000; William Hannah & Co., grain, \$250; insured in North British & Mercantile, \$900. The fire was under control about nine o'clock, but is still smouldering.

Mrs. Mary Scott, a widow, fifty-three years of age of 25 Deice street, was instantly killed at Palmerston and Queen streets this morning at 4:55 o'clock, by a hose reel from the Dundas street fire station, on its way to the burning elevator, at the foot of Spadina avenue.

SHIPPERS' WAGE SCALE. Juvenile Robbers Gets Ten-Year Sentence.

Montreal, April 21.—Shipping interests today formally announced their state of wages to longshoremen for the coming season as twenty-seven and a half cents per hour for day men, and twenty and a half cents per hour for night men, with bonus of two and a half cents per hour for men who work through the season.
