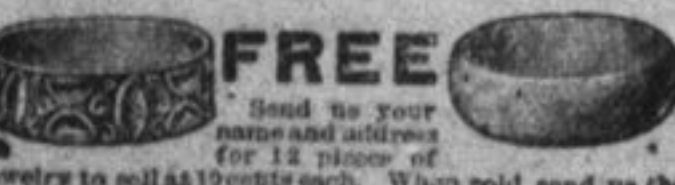

INCREASE IN AGREEMENT

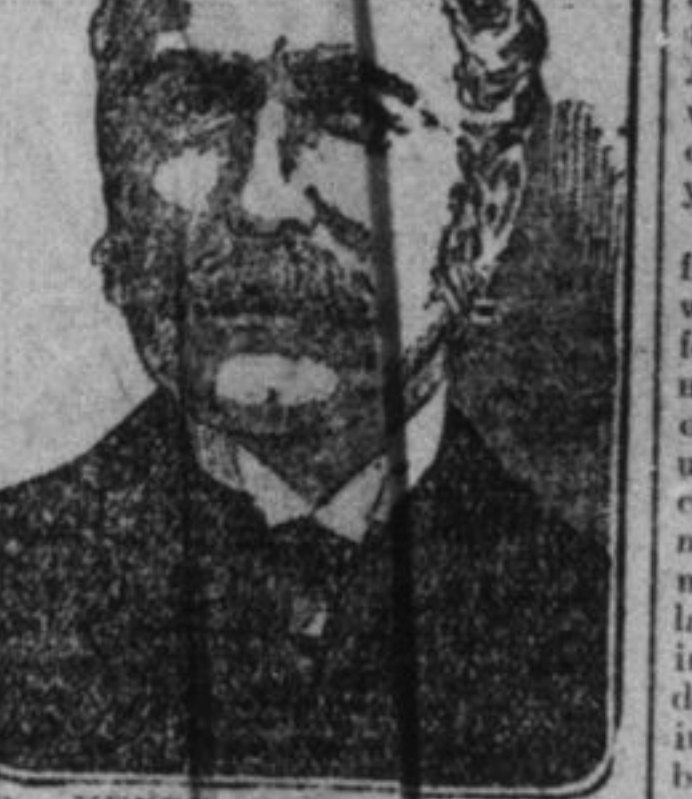
POINTS TO A PROSPEROUS YEAR IN THE WEST.

Twenty Per Cent. More Land Will Be Cropped, According to Government Reports - Immigration From United States Also Increasing.

Ottawa, April 22 - Official reports received by the immigration department from agents throughout Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta show that the total acreage under crop in the Canadian west, this year, will be about twenty per cent. greater than last year, with all indications so far pointing to a record yield. The increase in acreage is attributed largely to the great influx of new settlers during the past year. Reports from agents of the department in the United States indicate that the arrivals of American settlers to take up land will be this year, very largely in excess of the number who came in last year.

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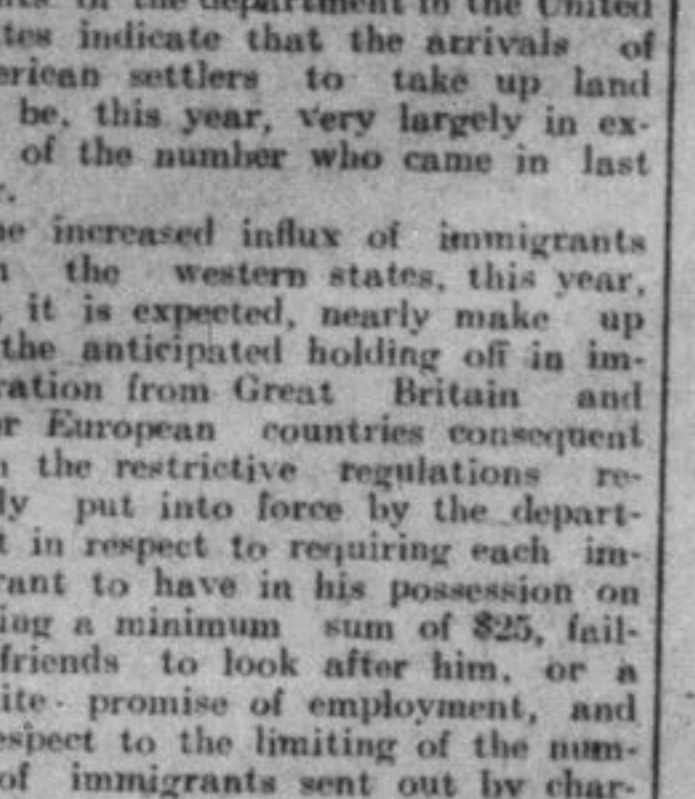
