## CUT OFF SHOP LICENCE

### GANANOQUE FIRM OF HALL AND MPARLAND

Get the Axe From the Liquor License Board—Death of Charles La France—Boy Struck on Head By a Brick.

Gananoque, April 22.—The board of license commissioners for the license district of Leeds, met at the town hall, Lansdowne, yesterday afternoon, for the granting of licenses for the license year 1908-9. The inspector, F. B. Taber, of Horton, and Commissioners Connor, of Gananoque; Steacy, of Lansdowne, and Gallagher, of Westport, were all present. Very little difficulty was experienced in deciding on granting the application for the rural districts and villages in the northern part of the district. But when the applications for licenses for Gananoque came up for consideration, delegations from Gananoque council, No. 284, L.T.C., Gananoque W.C.T.U., Lansdowne W.C.T.U., and the Front of Leeds and Lansdowne were on hand to solicit the setting off of shop licenses, which was done as briefly as possible, and so successfully that notice was given the shop license holders, Messrs. Hale and McParland, that three months' license only would be granted them to allow of their selling off their stock.

## SAW A FAMOUS BATTLE.

### Capt. W. G. Miller Viewed the Battle of Champlain.

Capt. Willet Green Miller, Norfolk county's oldest resident, who died on the 15th, at Simons, was the uncle of Prof. W. G. Miller, provincial geologist, and formerly of Queen's Mining school. The deceased was born at Plattsburg, in New York state, September 11th, 1808. He was six years of age, Captain Miller, during the war of 1812, and on a hill-top near the shore of Lake Champlain the youngest probably of an awestruck throng, looking at a naval battle, now known in history as the Battle of Lake Champlain, the battle in which Britain and Canada strove to capture Plattsburg and carry the war into the enemy's country. Of these events, Capt. Miller carried a distinct recollection down practically to the day of his death. He remembered perfectly as leader on the American side, Gen. McDonough, and Com. McDonough, as they made their headquarters at the grandfather's house. Indeed, it was there that these two warriors, having quarrelled, vindicated their honor by fighting a duel, each receiving a bullet wound, one in the thigh and the other in the wrist.

Capt. Miller became a resident of Canada, settling first at Burlington Bay, in 1824. He built and helped to build and sail a large number of vessels engaged in the laketrade. He came to live in Norfolk in the early fifties. On New Year's Day two years ago, in full possession of all his faculties, able to read without glasses and enjoying good health, he went out to visit in the town divisions. Returning home he was stricken with paralysis.
