SCARING AN OPPONENT.

The conservative paper which sneered at the liberal press and its change of attitude towards the Whitney government, has been answered by the Globe, and in vigorous fashion. While the government was promising fair things it had a right to consideration, but when, especially at the close of the session, it indulged in crooked or contentious things, and rushed them through without giving the opposition the chance to look into them, it forfeited the good opinion and forbearance of its opponents.

"The liberal press," says the Globe, "supported Hon. Adam Beck's power policy, but Premier Whitney made a fatal blunder in rejecting the overtures of a representative of the British bondholders, and that without so much as consulting Hon. Adam Beck. That blunder robbed the people of Ontario of their white coal for generations. Liberal newspapers praised the premier when he declared he would not gerrymander Ontario, and that his fair redistribution would be an example to the province. He has suddenly forced through the legislature a gerrymander that the most complacent conservative newspapers are ashamed to defend. The liberal press commended the promise of care for the wealth of the province, but with startling suddenness \$130,000 has been voted away to a relative of the minister of lands and mines. The liberal press endorsed the declaration that the time for land grants to railways was past in Ontario, but we have had the unexpected revival of a land grant for which the premier made but a halting apology. Still more startling is the involving of the province in a guarantee of \$2,500,000 bonds for the Mackenzie & Mann interests at a time when Mr. Mackenzie is tying up the government's power policy. The liberal press has been unexpectantly called upon to announce the appointment of a member as sheriff, another principle gone by the board. The only fall that is not startlingly sudden is the adoption of the spoils system and its undermining of official fidelity."

Every little while the Tory press is claiming credit for its fairness and independence, though it must be said that it gives very little evidence of them. The liberal press has been inclined to do independent criticism and it has had its experience. This criticism has been quoted against it, when its own party has been affected, or when, as in this case, it displayed the eminent quality of fairness to the conservatives. The remarkable thing about the present case is that the "call to account" is from a paper which has posed as an independent and a lover of fair play.

QUEEN'S COLLEGE CONNECTIONS. The issue of circulars upon the subject has been the occasion of the present press discussion as to the relation of Queen's College with the Presbyterian church. The movement in favour of great changes is generally pretty well understood, but it is difficult to realize the causes that have led up to the proposal now for a separation of the college from the church.

This institution of learning was the projection of the church, but its growth and development depended upon agencies of a civic, provincial and national character. This is evidenced in the various additions which have been made to the historic pile, and to the interest that attaches to the erection of each new building. It tells the story of expansion and the means that were employed in giving expression to the aspirations of the times.

The college passed through two great crises successfully. One was the absorption scheme which meant the concentration of teaching power in Toronto, under the scheme advanced by the government. Queen's stood (1) for isolation, for the independence of life and service which time demonstrated to be for its good. It stood (2) for the non-denominationalism which seemed to be wisest and best for all its interests. The question had been no sooner settled, however, that it was reopened, and the Presbyterian church undertook to endorse the college liberally and so guarantee its greater usefulness.

There appears to be a third crisis in sight, but the necessity for it has not been made apparent. The church should be allowed to make good its pledges, or falling in that make clear the way for a return to the proposal which it asked to have set aside. The church, however, moves slowly, of course. It cannot do otherwise. But it should be given an opportunity to complete the work it has on hand or retire from it without embarrassment. There is a seeming absence of definite action on the part of the college

governing body or representatives of the Presbyterian church. In other words, the appeal for a separation of interests now does not arise from any authoritative source; and the result must be confusing. It is, therefore, necessary that the position of the college with regard to the movement of the day, and concerning its relation with the Presbyterian church, should be plainly stated, for presumably the financial future of a great institution should not be imperilled by indiscreet appeals.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

The wounded men on the firing line of the conservative party have not been removed. Why?

Mr. Morley once said that the Lords should be ended or mended. The fact that he is going to the upper chamber is suggestive of what he may attempt.

Mr. Ross has been again discussing the senate. He does not presume to say what may happen to it, but he is satisfied that it will remain. Perhaps he may help to revive or reform it.

The London Times will remain under the control of the Wallers family. An intimation that some of its traditions will be preserved, though its escutcheon has been somewhat tarnished.

The conservatives in the commons are quite sure that no member of parliament should be appointed to a public office if a liberal. It will be all right if the lucky one happens to be a conservative member of the legislature.

The Montreal Gazette regards it as a sign of weakness in any party "to have any of the old men where they looked like chiefs." This cannot apply to one party. Some of those who are behind Mr. Borden in Ottawa should take the hint.

The Toronto News is annoyed with the leader of the opposition, because he insists upon the government having an annual accounting for the money spent on the Provincial University. Why not? It is a business proposition.

A movement is on foot to have Mr. Donovan run in Leeds as the conservative candidate. What is to become of Mr. Taylor? It is only a few days since he was telling his constituents the wonderful things he was doing at Ottawa. Have they tired of him?

Mr. Whitney talks of having the next redistribution conducted or carried out by an independent and non-political commission. He does not expect that promise to be seriously taken. The gerrymander, and what preceded it, are too fresh in the memory.

The women of Toronto will not be silenced on the franchise question. The premier jollied them a bit on the subject, but they have not been thwarted in their plans. They are again demanding votes, and they will not be refused.

The model school section of the Educational Association is referred to as the "morgue." A result of the government's policy. And yet the model school is a necessity, and may some of these days, become very much alive. "Never say die," should be the motto of the model school teachers.
