GREAT LOSS OF LIFE

A JAPANESE CRUISER SANK AFTER EXPLOSION.

And a Great Number of the Crew Were Drowned, Including the Sons of Royalty in the Mikado's Kingdom.

Tokio, April 30.—Admiral Yoshi-matsu, commander of the training squadron, reports that an explosion occurred in the stock magazine of the cruiser Matsushima, at four o'clock this morning, while anchoring at Makong, a harbor on the Pescadores Islands. The Matsushima immediately sank, until only the bridge was visible. Efforts to rescue by boats from other cruisers continued until 9 a.m., saving the lives of 141 men, including some officers. The majority of the officers were not saved.

At the time of the admiral's report the cadets aboard numbered fifty-eight, out of a complement of 300. It is feared that all are lost. The sons of Baron Chinda, vice minister of the foreign office, and of Prince Gyama, a general, are among them. Capt. Nomo, Yoshimori and Yasubo also thought to be lost. The cause of the explosion is unknown. The Pescadores Islands are a low group between Formosa and China.

Woman Tells How She Slewed Her Neighbor.

Leeds Tory Convention Promises to Be Lively.

Watertown, N.Y., April 30.—Starting developments in the Brennan murder case came to light last night, when Mrs. James Farmer told not only the complete story of her life, but also what is accepted as a truthful story of the crime.

According to her statement the husband James Farmer never knew of the murder which had been committed in his home until the moment the trunk containing the mutilated body of Mrs. Patrick Brennan was opened before his eyes.

Mrs. Farmer claims she committed the murder alone, but not with an axe as stated. She struck down the woman with an article which she had been using a few moments before. Nothing concerning the deed, she says, entered into a quarrel which the two women had and which was the cause of the murder.

Mrs. Farmer's school days were spent in Buffalo. According to the officers she bore no bad reputation in that city. For four years she was employed as a nurse girl in the family of Philip Roth at No. 51 Richmond avenue. It was in Buffalo she said that she met Farmer and fell in love with him. They were married and he went on a three months' cruise after which they came to Brownville.

When she reached the story of the crime, Mrs. Farmer was not excited. By word of mouth she recited how she had alone committed murder. "My God, why did I do it? I must have been tempted. I never thought of it until the moment," and the woman buried her face in her hands as though to shut out the memory.

FIRE OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest Called From All Over The World.

Notice has been given of a general reduction of wages in the cotton trade centred at Montreal.

It is announced that the United States fleet has accepted an invitation to visit the Fiji Islands.

Miss Stewart, of Carthage, N.Y., aged 104 years, said to be the oldest resident in Northern New York, is dead.

Cattle drivers are asking the government to buy them for the cattle which are condemned at the abattoirs as unfit for food.

Burglars attempted to rob the Bank of Commerce branch in a western suburb of Winnipeg, but the safe resisted their efforts.

Governor Johnson, Minnesota, urged Detroit wholesale men to work to obliterate the boundary between Canada and the United States.

William Hanlon, who is already serving a term at Kingston penitentiary for forgery, was sentenced, at Guelph, to an additional twelve years.

Jules Lamouroux, aged eighty-four, overcomes with grief at the loss of his daughter and her family in the landslide at La Salette, died in his chair.

Four boy funds in Toronto recently brutally tortured a ten-year-old child because he refused to steal money from his home for them to buy cigarettes.

Prince Ernest August, of Cumberland, the youngest son of the Duke of Cumberland, it is reported, is about to become an officer in the German army.

The Canadian Pacific railway weekly crop report, just issued, shows from eighty to ninety per cent. of the wheat sowing completed, and conditions most favorable.

The preparations for the wedding at Taunay-Solo, next week, of Prince Wilhem of Sweden and the Grand Duchess Pavlina, a daughter of Grand Duke Paul Alexandrovitch, are practically complete.

The Commonwealth government has been in consultation with the governments of Victoria and New South Wales, with regard to the entertainment of the United States fleet during its visit there. It is understood that more than \$500,000 will be required to this purpose.

THE OBSTACLES PUT UP

May Prevent Emigration From Britain to Canada.

London, April 30.—The Cambewell distress committee has asked the Central unemployed body whether, in view of the serious obstacles placed in the way of emigration by the Canadian government, suitable men and their families could not be sent to Australia and the other colonies. The Glasgow committee has decided to discuss the emigration in consequence of the belief that while the type of men required by Canada would be beneficial to the dominion it would be a disadvantage to Glasgow to lose them.

CARNEGIE'S GIFT TO LEHIGH.

Dormitory Dedicated in Presence of Distinguished Company.

Bethlehem, Pa., April 30.—Taylor Hall, the new dormitory at Lehigh University, a gift of Andrew Carnegie was formally dedicated in the presence of a distinguished company. Carnegie, who expended \$100,000 to provide the new addition, accompanied by Charles M. Schwab, James Gayley, John Burroughs, naturalist, and fifty invited guests participated in the exercises, and were the guests of the faculty at luncheon.
