Sporting Notes.

The Ontario Jockey Club Stakes received a total of 480 entries. The Olympic trial matches in clay bird shooting are to be held at the Exhibition grounds, Toronto, on May 20th, 21st and 22nd. Chicago for the National baseball league pennant seems to be a rather safe one. Pittsburgh and New York are pressing the Cubs closely. The efforts, mostly venomous and all ill-informed, to prevent Tom Longboat from competing at the Olympic games had no effect on the Canadian committee. The certificate of the C.A.A.U. will be sufficient to send his entry to England. The American Amateur Athletic union sponsored J. P. Sullivan, a New York distance runner, for competing against a horse in a charity benefit in New York on Saturday night. The horse may have been bred in Canada, and so would be disqualified by the A.A.U. At Cleveland the trotting championship trotter, Lou Dillon (1:58 1/2) foaled a filly by John A. McKerrow (2:04 1/2). The youngster is without a spot or mark and said to be in perfect condition. C. K. G. Billings, the owner of the trotter, said Lou Dillon would not be trotted this season and probably never again. IRISH POVERTY FACTS

EVIDENCE GIVEN BEFORE ROYAL COMMISSION.

Population on the Decrease—Cottage Industries Have Discouraged Emigration.

The New York Herald prints a special cable despatch from London on Irish Poverty and its Causes, in which it says: The evidence with regard to the poverty of Ireland and emigration to America given before the royal commission on the condition of the poor in Ireland, was published in the form of a blue book, to-day. One witness stated that the population of Roscommon in 1841 was 360,000, while in 1901 it had sunk to a little over 100,000; the present estimate being under 100,000.

In Castle-Teachen, where the land was good and valued at sixteen shillings per acre, the population had failed eighty per cent., while in Ardagh north, where the valuation was six shillings and six-pence per acre, the population had fallen only three per cent.

A witness, John Hayden, contended that this showed that the people had gone from the Good Land not voluntarily, but because they were obliged to. Peter O'Malley, describing the poverty of Oughterd, said the bare necessities of life could, in many instances, not be obtained from the land alone and the people were largely dependent on help from friends who had emigrated to America. Lace schools had been established in the district and had done good work. Schools and the money earned by cottage industries had discouraged emigration to America, some girls working at cottage industries earned more than the emigrants saved, while in America and lived more comfortably at home than they would in America. Other girls were keeping house for relatives and earning a pound a week at lace making besides.

The witness mentioned lace as an example, and a vocated schools for varied cottage industries. Another witness, the Rev. John Flatley, speaking of his experience in Clare Island, the Lecanane district and Thom, said its lace making classes had been a great success, and he was astounded at the amount of money girls were earning. Few girls would now leave the districts mentioned to go to America, or go to service in England or Scotland.

Another phase of the question was supplied by the Rev. James Kelly, who gave evidence of the work in Connaught. In spite of the increasing population, he said, Connaught still suffered from Cromwellism, and its after effect, namely the bad system of land tenure. He spoke of the appointment of the royal commission and the sixteen years work of the congested district board in Connemara and elsewhere, the fringe of the economic problem had not yet been touched. About one-third of the 100,000 acres in Clifden Union were held by ninety graziers, while the salarism per head was only a fraction over the population was decreasing. The able-bodied were emigrants to America, and the weak and sickly remaining. There was still congestion owing to the undue occupation of land by a few persons. There were vast tracts of reclaimable land in Connemara, which were not fit for game now, and if the whole of Connemara were divided up, except the residential parts, which no one demanded, the people would not still go to America or Scotland. Very few from that part emigrated to England.

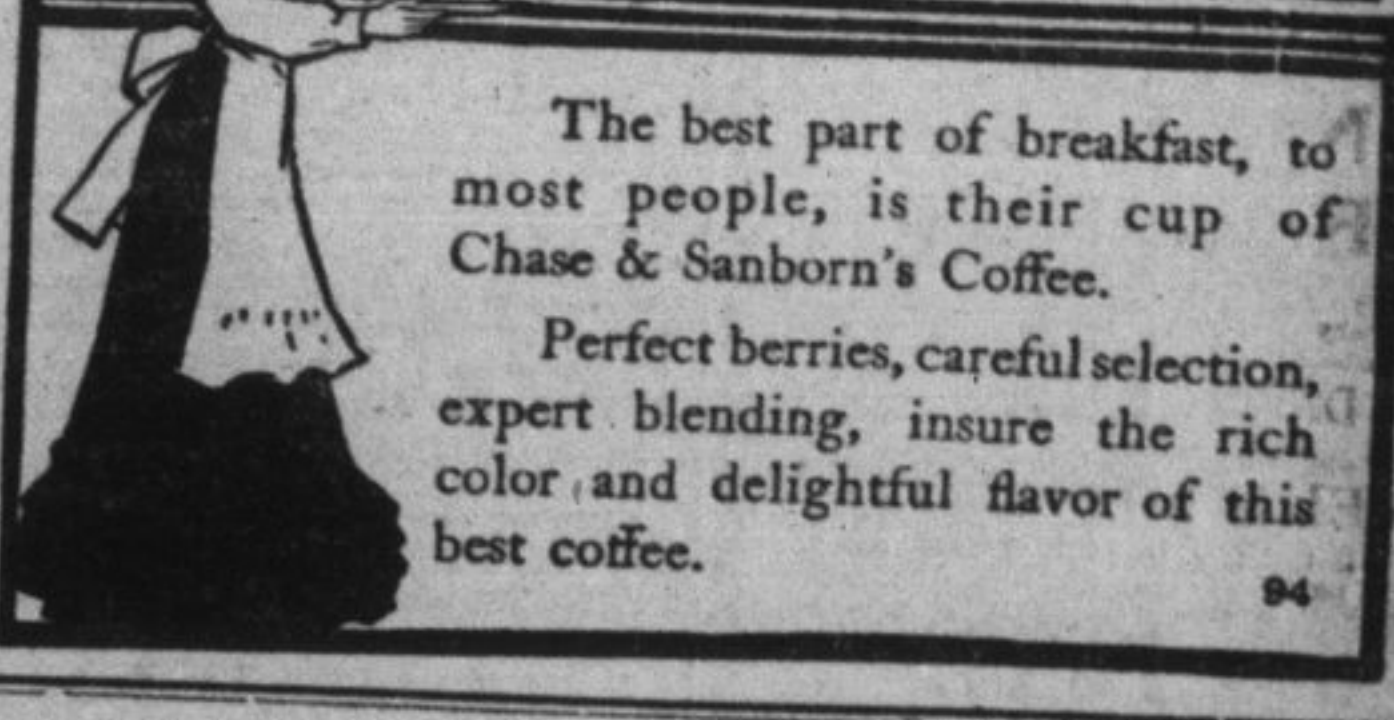
A vivid story was told about three thousand families who lived on bogs and marshes in Clifden Union. Their holdings were valued at £4 each, while eighty-eight non-resident graziers held between them 68,830 acres of the best land in the district. The results were destitution, discontent and emigration. The landlords' exorbitant demands had made land purchase almost impossible. The Rev. Canon Malpas, in giving evidence in favor of the development of the marble quarries by the state, said that hundreds of people who now emigrated to America from Clifden and Cleggar might be employed in the splendid marble and granite quarries of the district. These were close to the railway station and there was an abundant supply of water. But neither the congested district board nor the government department had done anything toward their proper working except a few specimens being shown at the St. Louis exhibition and in Cork and Limerick. Every month large blocks of the finest marble were sent from Clifden and Cleggar to America, and the continent of Europe, and the fact that the chief market was America was proof of their commercial value. The development of the quarries was left to one individual, who was hindered as other Irish industries had been killed, by lack of capital, the supply of which could not have been prevented, as stated, by anything so trifling as those with grazing rights, obstructing to the dumping of material on their land. The state should see that the quarries were properly worked.
