Corey is of French birth, although he has spent most of his career as an athlete on this side of the water. It is not likely that he will accept the proposition.

The Hamilton rugby club statement shows the receipts for the half year to be \$7,835, and after all accounts were paid, a balance of \$1,790 in the treasury. Of this \$1,000 has been added to the perpetual ground fund, which now amounts to \$5,000.

Adam Zimmerman, M.P., has been appointed honorary president, to succeed the late Hugh Murray, and William Southern to take the late Mr. Murray's place on the grounds committee. The largest gate of the year was on Thanksgiving Day, when the receipts were \$1,790.

The race committee of the Brockville fair have provided for an additional stake event for the forthcoming exhibition, making three altogether, for a purse of \$500 each. These will embrace the 2:20 trot and 2:30 pace. Besides these events there will be a big trotting and pacing programme.

**LIVED ON WOLFE ISLAND.**

**The Woman Murdered at Brownsville, N.Y.**  
 Mrs. Sarah Brennan, murdered at Brownsville, N.Y., was born in Ireland fifty-five years ago. She led three when quite young and lived for a time in Montreal and other cities in Canada, and finally on Wolfe Island with Mrs. Agnes Brown, the mother of James Rattray, of No. 16 Griffin Street, Watertown, N.Y., where the Farmer told Mr. Brennan, Mrs. Farmer wanted the goods she had packed up sent. These consisted of personal trinkets, old pictures, letters, hand-writing of her daughter, a handbag, price-brac, etc. All these were carefully gone through by the officers, but nothing was found among them. She had a great fondness for children. Mr. and Mrs. Brennan were married about twenty-seven years ago.

Mrs. Brennan had lived on "Paddy Hill" opposite Brownville, for nearly a quarter of a century, and was well and favorably known by all. She was of a kind and cheerful disposition, and had a great fondness for children. They had only one child, a daughter who died about seven years ago. Mrs. Brennan grieved over her death up to the day of the foul murder. Two years ago, in hope of drowning her sorrow she paid a visit to her native country and met after long separation her two sisters and a brother.
