MAY GET NO INCREASE THE KAISER'S INCOME LIKE LY TO STAND

At the Same Figure—Bill Sure to Meet With Opposition in the Reichstag—Kaiser's Expenses Large.

If it be true that an attempt is to be made to increase the stipend of Kaiser William, we may look for active opposition in the Reichstag, says a correspondent.

At present he receives \$650,000 as German emperor and \$3,852,770 as king of Prussia.

Part of the Kaiser's responsibilities consist in the maintenance of the royal theatres at Berlin, Hanover and Cassel, and he has also to foot the bills for the royal concerts.

A very large portion of the Kaiser's personal funds go in clothes. It is said that he possesses uniforms of a first-class battleship.

When he travels, as very often he does, it is with a retinue big enough to rival a small army.

Six years ago, Herr Wilhelm Hildebrand had his estate worth \$775,000 and \$750,000 in hard cash, a gift matched by that from a West Prussian landowner, who gave him a 5,000-acre estate as an earnest of greater possessions.
