# FIRE PISTOL IN AIR TO SCARE AWAY A PORCH CLIMBER.

Brook Street Residents, Near University Avenue Startled—A Drunken Citizen Tried to Get Into Another's House.

The residents of Brook street between Division street and University avenue were startled early this morning by the report of a pistol. Many went to their windows to see what the trouble was, and saw a man at an upstairs window, telling a man sitting on his steps to get out or he would shoot him. Two nights later this same man has been awakened by some one trying to get in his front door or trying to climb up the porch. It was the same man who tried to gain entrance both times. The man, who is well known in the city, was intoxicated and thought he was going into his own house and finding the door locked began to climb up the veranda. Last night he again tried to effect entrance, and the resident of the house opened the window and told him to move on. No heed was paid to remarks other than some foul names. The drunk kept on trying to gain an entrance. Finally to scare him away, the man in the window fired a shot into the air, and even this was paid no attention to. The man seemed bound to get in, so he took off his coat and tried to climb up on the pillars to the balcony above, but did not succeed. Finding all his attempts to gain entrance futile, he went away, leaving his coat on the steps. The coat was taken in charge by the police and is now at the station.

## HOSSACK STRIKES HARD.

Government Has Broken Its Promises—Time's Up. From the Hossack Letter. "On January 24th, 1905, Mr. Whitney made a public appeal for aid, and declared that should his future conduct not be approved, the people might withdraw their confidence. Does Mr. Whitney feel that he has lost public confidence? He has so arranged many constitutions by having liberals that the withdrawal of liberal confidence will not affect the standing of the parties in the legislature. On January 26th, 1905, Mr. Whitney published his 'glad appreciation' of the fact that 'liberals in large numbers' supported him. In 1905, apparently with the expectation of losing liberal support, Mr. Whitney's appreciation is expressed by having the liberals. There were a grim humor in the party now, did it not savor so strongly of the very ordinary, commonplace and tricky politician.

The liberal majority in the assembly had dwindled away until it had virtually disappeared, determined to bring this state of demoralizing uncertainty to an end, many liberals all over the province voted for his candidature and thus gave him an unprecedented large majority. All he had to do to retain it was to carry on the government of the province with vigor, purity, and liberality. Had this been done many liberals who helped to put him into office would have been willing to assist in keeping him in it to enable him to show what he could do to justify their support. To their surprise he almost immediately began to dismiss public officials against whom no charges were ever made, so that there were more dismissals for patronage purposes in the last four years than there had been in the preceding thirty. Before the close of his first term he put himself so completely in the hands of William Mackenzie as to be reduced to a position of political servitude akin to the relation in which some public men in the United States have long stood to the great capitalists and railway magnates of that country. And, worst of all, he became a party to the grossest and most disgraceful violation of public trust that has occurred in Canada within half a century when he sanctioned legislation that made a present of a hundred and thirty thousand dollars to a mining syndicate of the brother-in-law of his minister. The present from Sandfield Macdonald to Whitney is too obvious to need emphasizing.
