CAUSE WAS JEALOUSY
LURED BY DISCARDED SWEETHEART AND KILLED.

A Terrible Spectacle—Victim Believed to Have Been Drugged Before He Was Stabbed to Death.

Venice, May 5.—While the Venetian authorities are still busy reconstructing last summer's sensational murder of the Russian, Count Kamarsky, another appalling and mysterious murder has occurred in the city.

A prominent young lawyer named Giambattista Munari, president of the local canoeing club, and very well known among the foreign colony interested in sport, has been unaccountably missing for three days. After search had been made in all his usual haunts, his body was at length discovered in the house of a former sweetheart. It was lying in a pool of blood, and was terribly hacked about with a stiletto still sticking in the throat. In a bedchamber immediately above the apartment in which the lawyer's body was found lay the corpse of a woman, in whose case death was due to asphyxiation.

When the police burst into the house the gas jets were still full on, but the tragedy had seen its awful finale fully three days before.

As already indicated, much mystery attaches to the affair in its details, but today's investigations tend to show that the crime was the outcome of jealousy. The dead woman, named Teresa Valin, thirty-six years of age, was widowed early in life. She subsequently retired from service at the Austrian consulate in Venice to become the mistress of a rich Englishman, who had apparently secured a good berth for her eighteen-year-old son in Canada. The murdered lawyer, Munari, became her lover seven years ago, when he installed her in the luxurious apartments where he has met his death.

About three years ago Munari forsook Valin for another woman, and this led on several occasions to humiliating scenes in various public resorts. Finally a report that Munari intended to marry her rival aroused Teresa Valin to ungovernable wrath.

Shortly before the tragedy Valin met Munari in a fashionable restaurant at the luncheon hour, and insisted on an immediate interview. The result was that the harassed lawyer pledged himself to pass the evening in Valin's apartments.

According to the police theory Munari was from that moment a doomed man, Valin having arranged to drug the wine of her victim and stab him to death.

The apartment showed traces of a terrible struggle, and there are several slight wounds on the woman's body.

Though the police are disinclined to believe that there were any accomplices, a neighboring decorator swears that he saw a man dressed in gray hurriedly leave Valin's dwelling on the night of the tragedy.

The supposed murderer, who afterward retired upstairs and committed suicide, had, according to her maid's testimony, often threatened to take the lawyer's life should he decide to marry another, and the very day of the tragedy had sent out to buy foolscap, on which she drew up her will, bequeathing her belongings to her son and a sister.

The murdered lawyer's family is well to do and of high standing, the father of the deceased being the presiding judge at the Venice law courts.

LIVE STOCK MARKETS.

The Prices Paid at the Various Centres.

Montreal, May 4.—About 700 head of butchers' cattle, 176 calves, 1,097 fat hogs and 7 sheep and lambs were offered for sale at the Point St. Charles stock yards this forenoon. Good cattle were scarce, and brought higher prices, but the common stock and milkmen's strippers were in liberal supply at about former rates. Prime beefs sold at 5½c to 6c, per lb.; pretty good cattle, 4½c to 5½c; the milkmen's strippers, 3½c to 4½c, and the common stock, 3¼c to 4½c, per lb. Calves sold at from 4c to 6c, per lb. Sheep sold at 5½c to 6½c, per lb., and spring lambs at \$5 to \$7 each. Packers are paying 7c, per lb. for good lots of fat hogs, but some small lots were sold at 7½c, per lb.

COMMERCIAL MATTERS.
What is Going on in the Business World—The Markets.

Port Arthur miners say the Minto mine will be re-opened and operated by Toronto capital.

In the London revenue district, during the fiscal year, 34,340,650 cigars were manufactured.

An estimate shows that there are now 375,770 idle cars on the roads in Canada and the United States. This is the greatest number on record.

The capital stock of the Crow's Nest Pass Coal company has been increased from four to ten million dollars.

The output from the mines of the Dominion Coal company for April was 200,000 tons, compared with 316,384 tons in April last year. For the year to date, however, the output totals 1,239,530 tons, a very substantial increase over the corresponding period of 1907.

The pearl is the best known of Australian gems, and for many years thousands of dollars worth have been secured in Queensland. The oyster fisheries of Thursday island have been the chief source of supply, but pearls are found all along the Queensland coast.

The latest statistics on French postal savings banks only come down to 1904. Then there were 7,883 banks, with 4,345,446 depositors, and deposits, including interest due December 31st, of \$229,155,290. The interest is two and one-half per cent, compounded.

CAN'T GET LISTS READY.

A Physical Impossibility to Get Them Out.

Port Arthur, Ont., May 5.—It is a physical impossibility that the law requires of the clerk of the court, that he should be able to get the lists ready in either this riding or the riding of Port William, so that if the government persists in holding the elections on June 8th, as announced, it must smash its own law to smithereens and disfranchise practically the whole country. It has been thought that fifty days was allowed after the lists had been prepared in which to make appeals, but this is not so. According to the act passed in the legislature it is provided that no appeals can be made after the 15th of May. As the enumerator will not have his preliminary lists prepared in several cases, possibly a majority of the cases, it will be seen that there is practically no appeal possible from the lists as prepared by the enumerator.
