## A SEVEN-ROOM BUNGALOW

Designed by Charles S. Sedgwick, Architect Minneapolis, Minn.



This bungalow has five rooms on the principal floor and two bedrooms on the second floor, with wide, spreading roof and overhanging eaves, a broad piazza across the front and also in the rear, screened in.

The entrance is central, with a wide hallway, and connecting directly through to the rear, with an outside door opening on to the rear piazza.

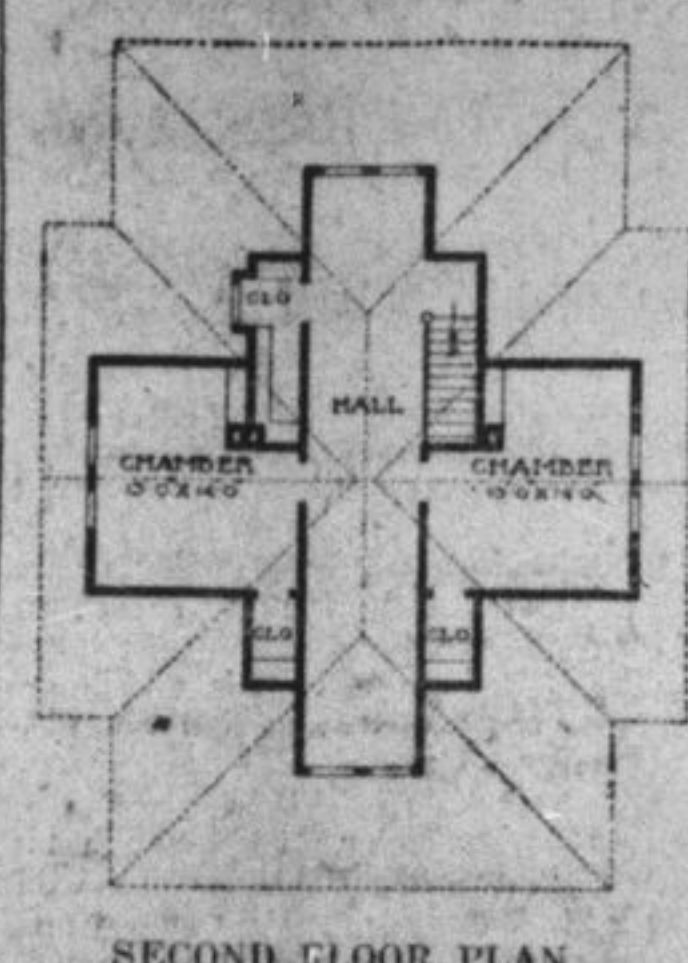
On the left is a good-sized living room, with fireplace and two connecting bedrooms, each provided with ample closets and a hall closet. On the right is the dining-room and kitchen, with pantry between and stairway leading to the upper rooms. The width of the house and pitch of roof admits of these two rooms on the second floor. They are well lighted and ventilated through gable windows and dormers at each end.

The house is designed to be finished in natural wood, stained; the principal rooms and hall stained dark Flemish color, the kitchen and bedrooms left in the natural color of the wood and the upper rooms finished in natural wood or painted white. The floors are of hard pine or fir.

The outside of the bungalow is shingled. The foundation is built of native boulder stone. The size of the house is 34 feet in width by 34 feet in depth, exclusive of piazzas and projections. The height is 8 feet 6 inches in height, using 10 footposts. It is estimated to build this house and small basement for \$2,500, exclusive of heating and plumbing. This price can be varied by the manner of construction and the materials used.

### TO BOYCOTT MONARCH

KING PETER MAY BE FORCED TO ABDICATE.

His Tenure of Serbian Throne Depends Upon Result of General Election.



Belgrade, May 9.—King Peter's tenure of office, for a long time precarious, is now to be put to the test of a general election. If his partisans win, he will have a new lease of life. If the opposition is victorious, he will have, perforce, to surrender his throne.

Parliament has been dissolved. Its dissolution was rendered inevitable by the obstructive tactics of the opposition. Serbian procedure sets no limit to the length, the subject of the number of speeches of members of the Skuptschina. A resolute opposition can paralyze the whole business of the government.

Continuation of the opposition might have been effected by the formation of a coalition cabinet, but the king has chosen to leave M. Paschic's ministry practically intact. Fair play with the ballot boxes would spell disaster to the king. Even under the adroit management of M. Paschic, the premier and the king's most ardent supporter, the elections must result in the return of many members of the opposition and anti-regicides.

The premier will, therefore, at the best be again confronted in the new parliament with an irreconcilable opposition, bent on the identical obstruction policy that now forces him to the country. The commercial treaty with Austria will not be allowed to pass the Skuptschina; the budget will not be voted and the king will be subjected to still more encroachment attacks.

"What confidence can we have in a government," asked Dr. Vukovitch, the opposition leader, in the Skuptschina, last Saturday, "which has lowered Serbia's prestige to the extent that its ruler is branded as an

investigator of bomb outrages? Where are the projected visits to the courts of Italy, Austria and Russia? Our king is boycotted.

"We have fallen so low that a treaty unworthy of even a vassal state is proposed to us as a favor. If our position abroad is deplorable, it is worse at home. Here we have the nation's representatives assaulted by officers with impunity; political opponents locked up and killed; editors of opposition journals persecuted, or imprisoned. The heinous charges of debt, a murderous regime has set in in Serbia."

### The Summer Fashions.

Grace Margaret Gould, the dress expert, says in Woman's Home Companion, that there are two distinct types of dress this summer, both emphasizing the straight up-and-down effect. One of the tailored coat suit, showing in many instances a cutaway coat, which gives the hipless effect, and a skirt comparatively narrow at the bottom—that is, it is made without the sudden flare that the tailored skirt used to have. The other type of dress is the cut-in-one gown, and great will be its favor. In the form of the new princess jumper, this cut-in-one dress is a most practical gown to own. It can fasten in the front quite as easily as the back, and it is a model equally good for silk or linen. This style dress is always cut out at the neck, and is generally sleeveless, to show the guimpe, or trimmed just sufficient to cover the shoulders to give a modified large armhole effect. Or it may be made, as a number of the imported models are, so that it has much the effect of a polonaise cut out at the neck, but having a sleeve which is cut in one with the bodice.

### Salt In Digestion.

### Radium Strangely Affects Gems.

Two papers have recently been communicated to the French Academy of Sciences by M. F. Bordas on the remarkable effect produced by the action of radium bromide on precious stones of the alumina family, such as corundum, ruby, topaz and sapphire. In the jacket of these communications Bordas says that under the influence of the rays colorless corundum has been transformed into topaz, the depth of color of natural topazes has been increased, and a similar effect has been produced with faintly colored rubies.

Fused alumina without color, when submitted to the action of the radium bromide, became first rose-tinted and then reddish yellow. These curious effects are not explained by the discoverer, but he thinks that they are not due to oxidation, because they occur equally well at very low temperatures.
