LANDING OF THE APOSTLE ST. PAUL

Celebrated By the People of Malta—A Bell Ringer for Fifty Years—Monasteries in Russia.

The Salvation Army is operating in fifty-four countries and colonies. Sunday, October 18, has been chosen as a universal day of prayer for Sunday schools.

Of 387 recorded ministers of the Society of Friends in Great Britain, 153 are women.

Several Christian churches, built in the second or third century, have been discovered through excavations in Egypt. Broome P. Smith, the appointed agent of the Upper Canada Bible Society, has had extensive experience in Africa.

Rev. F. W. Anderson, of Sydney, C.B., has been called to the general secretaryship of the Young People's Missionary Movement in Canada.

The Greek church in Russia is to have a local council. The last one was held in 1667, called by Czar Alexis, father of Peter the Great.

A subscription fund is being made up in England for the support of A. Midland, author of the hymn, "There's a Friend for Little Children."

Although five men and a dog were in the house, burglars broke into the vicarage, Sutton, Surrey, on Sunday morning, and took away £200 worth of silver.

All Saints' church, Orange, New Jersey, has made advent as a lecture of the "new thought" exemplified by "The Circle of Divine Ministry."

One Sunday night recently Rev. J. M. Whiteman being ill, his wife ascended the pulpit at a Unitarian church in Burnley, England, and conducted the service, giving an eloquent sermon.

Andover seminary, Massachusetts, endowed with \$200,000 and fine buildings and equipment, being reduced to twelve students for its seven professors, is to pass over to Harvard University.

At the sale in London of the library of the late Bishop of Truro, "Biblia Pauperum" brought \$150. Caxton's "Golden Legend," the third work with wood-cuts, printed in England, sold for \$3,000.

At a meeting in the home of Miss Helen Gould, New York, over \$100,000 was subscribed to restore the American College for girls at Constantinople. One gift was \$50,000, four others of \$10 each.

Though Rome is called the Eternal City, the name by right belongs to Damascus, in Syria, the oldest city in the world. As long as man has written records it has been known.

The late Bishop Dudley, of Kentucky, presented these words of a mountaineer as the least grammatical sentence he had ever heard: "Them three Miss Blake are three of as pretty a gal as I ever see."

In northern Sweden the hard rye cakes which form the staff of life are baked twice a year. They have a hole in the centre, by which the whole baking is strung on cords or hung to poles to be used as needed.

A bequest of \$20,000 to the French Academy, left by Miss Leclerc, has been refused. As it was to be applied to "raising the moral tone of France," the rejection proclaims an apathetic state as to morals and their remedy.

The three sacred books of Buddhism, titled "Pitakas," were issued 170 years after the death of Buddha, to give his teachings. Descriptions referring to them have been found to date back to the third century before the birth of Christ.

Lady Constance Phipps and Miss Beatrice Creighton, daughter of the late Bishop of London, with fourteen other ladies of Hampton Court, have passed the St. John Ambulance Association's examination.

Rev. E. Wilmott, curate of Witham, Essex, an advocate for the Sunday closing of public houses, has issued a challenge that, as a teetotaler, he will take on any man his own height and weight at anything, fighting or playing.

Edwin Stannard, of Methodist church, Guilford, has been for forty-six years treasurer and librarian, and for over fifty years an active worker in the Sunday school. He has been absent only one Sunday, to attend the funeral of his father.

An army of Boston's unemployed marched to the churches of Boston at a Sunday service. As a result eight of these edifices were turned into temporary lodging houses for the poor, open day and night, the pews being converted into cots.

The new Presbyterian church at La Prairie, opposite Montreal, which has replaced a dilapidated building, is unique in two respects. It is the only Protestant church in the district and has been materially benefited by subscriptions of Roman Catholics.

NOTABLE RELIC.

It Has Been Purchased at High Price. A remarkable price has been realized at Christie's, London, for a rare little ecclesiastical relic of the thirteenth century. The ciborium—or case in which the sacred elements are kept—was one of the treasures of the celebrated Brankenburg collection of mediæval works of art. It is formed of copper gilt and champlevé enamel, the earliest and best enamel work known, and the wonderful beauty and delicacy of its workmanship excited admiration and comment from the large crowd of bidders and sightseers. Six subjects from the Old and New Testaments are exquisitely designed on bowl and cover, while in the interior of the covers are medallions representing Christ in glory, and the Agnes Dei. Depicted on the cover are the Nativity, the Circumcision, the Baptism, the Road to Calvary, the Crucifixion, and the Resurrection. Those on the bowl illustrate Aaron with his rod that budded, the Sacrifice of Abel, the Circumcision, Abraham's Sacrifice, the Brazen Serpent, and Samson fighting the Philistines. The relic, which is seven inches high and an inch less in diameter, came originally from Malmesbury Abbey. There was a sensational contest for its possession, and for the first word—£1,050—had been spoken, the price leapt up at an amazing pace. Mr. Durlacher, who has large shops in London and Paris, in four minutes had outbid all opponents, and obtained the prize for the enormous sum of £6,000, or more than the Prime Minister's salary for a whole year.

The nomad Tuaregs of the Sahara are said to be descendants of the Crusaders, for they possess arms and armour unmistakably of crusading origin. The chief ornament of their equipment is the cross, and it appears on their shields and saddles. The Tuaregs are Moslems, but are looked upon as strangers in Islam.

"The heathen, in his blindness, bows down to wood and stone"—and other things. The town of Werda, in the kingdom of Dahomey, is celebrated for its temple of serpents, in which the priests keep upwards of 1,000 kinds of all sizes. These they feed with birds and frogs brought to them as offerings by the natives.

Among the injuries inflicted upon historic buildings in England during recent years, those suffered by the parish church or abbey of Sempringham, Lincolnshire, were the most serious. Fortunately, although three gnomes crashed through the chancel roof, accompanied by tons of masonry, the remains of the famous St. Gilbert Priory church in the nave were uninjured. The sacristy, however, was not so fortunate, and tombstones marking important interments were damaged. The ancient building consists of four massive Norman bays, a perpendicular central tower, and a Norman doorway, which was found serving the lowly purpose of a dovecote at Laundon House. This has now been included in the porch built a few years ago. Two other fine pieces of work are a Norman archway in iron, and a Norman doorway. The Gilbertine walls date back to the twelfth century. St. Gilbert, founder of the Order, having been born in the neighborhood about 1083. The Order, housed in thirteen buildings at the time of his death, consisted of 1,500 nuns and 700 canons.

Socialists' Case. Once more, in the Socialism with which we are contending, there is nothing constructive. It is a mere expression of discontent for which there are only too many causes in this imperfect world. No plan of a constitution, social political, leveling all equalities and making everybody found, can be devised for us. The Socialists tell us that to which we are all to look for aid and guidance, is a phantom. The real forces are not derived from aspiration to a state of fraternal equality, but from class-hatred, desire to redistribute property, and industrial antagonism between employer and employed. It does not follow, however, that because Socialism is a bad thing, it is not to be destructive. The history of the Reign of Terror and the recent outbreak in Russia tell us that it may, and that the crisis which order and property have to face is real. The Socialists who made the revolution would not themselves profit by it even if they lived to see its end. Let us all try to do our social duty. That is the best safeguard against revolutions.

Monumental. More than \$100,000 is in the hands of a committee at Geneva, Switzerland, with which to erect in his own city a monument to John Calvin, which shall commemorate both the man and the cause he represented. Around the figure of Calvin will be grouped the famous ecclesiastics of early Protestantism; upon the pedestal will be arranged the figures of the soldiers of the Reformation—Coligny, William of Orange, Cromwell and others. The four hundred anniversary of Calvin's birth will occur in July of next year.

An international committee proposes to raise \$1,000,000 for a Shakespeare memorial, to be finished by the tercentenary year, 1916. Celebrations appear to be the latter day methods of squandering money out for unnecessary purposes.

Bad Memories. Many of our ways are ancient times of detected criminals, but no queer example could be found than that by bread and cheese. The offender was led, with a halter round his neck, to the parish church, and there, in the presence of the people, the priest put a piece of cheese and eye bread in a patten of the altar. These he blessed, and then the supposed criminal had to eat them dry before the congregation. He was managed to swallow them easily he was acquitted, but if he choked he was condemned. There were few reprieves in those days.


