CITY COUNCIL MEETING

THE CAB STAND QUESTION WAS DISCUSSED.

Special Tree Cutting Committee Reported—Additional Walks to Be Built—Other Business Before the Council.

At the city council meeting last evening were Mayor Ross and Aldermen Angrove, Carson, Chown, Couper, Elliott, Givens, Graham, Hart, Kent, McCann, McCartney, Nickle, Robertson, Toye.

These communications were referred to committees: E. Zacks and others for a crossing in the centre of the block on Princess street, between Sydenham and Clergy streets.

J. B. Cook, asking \$130 damages on account of accident to horse and cutter on Princess street, stating that the government dry dock light question has been referred to the department's chief engineer for report.

W. J. Moore & Son, asking removal of telegraph pole in front of their place of business on Wellington street.

Mon. William Hart, enclosing letter from F. Geimas, secretary of department of public works, stating that the government dry dock light question has been referred to the department's chief engineer for report.

Thomas Thurlby and others, asking for the sewer on Ellerbeck street.

W. E. Wood and others, for tile sewer on Colborne street.

Alfred E. Back and others, Union street, asking for permission to build new porches in same place as the old ones, which are a few inches on the street line.

James Craig, for permission to place a push wagon at the corner of Princess and Wellington streets, for sale of newspapers, etc.

Finance and Board of Works. The finance committee contained the following recommendations:

On the communication of Macdonnell & Farrell, for Thomas Keats, re local improvement sewer tax, that on the report of the city solicitor and city engineer the request be not granted.

On the communication of J. C. Swain, asking for a refund of taxes for local improvement sewer tax, that the request be not granted.

On the communication of Joseph Smith, sr., asking for a refund of waste labor tax, that he be refunded the sum of \$1.

The Board of Works' recommendation that these concrete walks be laid was adopted: Brock street, west side, Montreal to Clergy.

Bagot street, west side, Earl to Writam.

Albert street, east side, York to Princess.

Albert street, west side, York street easterly 167 feet.

Alice street, west side, Frontenac street westerly 122 feet.

Clarence street, north side, Montreal street to Clergy street.

Ontario street, east side, Union street southerly 62 feet.

The Cab Stand Question. There was a discussion on the Board of Works' recommendation regarding the cab stand. The recommendation read thus: "On the petition of licensed cabmen to stand on the south side of Clarence street, from Ontario street west to the east limit of the British American hotel building, and on the petition of E. G. Kilpatrick and others, objecting to the granting of the petition of above mentioned cabmen, that by-law No. 13 be amended so as to permit licensed cabmen to stand on the south side of Clarence street, from Ontario street west to the east limit of Mrs. Kirkpatrick's building, and on both sides of Clarence street east of Ontario street."

Ald. Carson and Elliott pointed out that the cabmen did not petition to be permitted to stand below Ontario street. The Board of Works' recommendation would result in blocking of the bakery entrance. They thought that this should not be, and suggested that a change be made in the wording of the report.

Ald. Toye said he would like to accommodate the cabmen, but pointed out that there were only fifty-five feet between the crossing and the railway track, and that trams were continual coming to his side entrance. Furthermore, he questioned if it would be in the sanitary interests of his bakery to allow a cab stand within a few feet of it.

This latter point appealed to Ald. Nickle and other of the aldermen. W. McQuaid, representing the cabmen, asked that instead of the privilege of being allowed to stand on Clarence street alongside Toye's bakery, they be allowed space for three cabs on Ontario street.

After some further discussion it was decided to allow the cabmen to use only the north side of Clarence street below Ontario street. If later on they find they haven't enough space they can petition for more.

Tree Committee's Report. The special tree committee reported as follows: That citizens be requested to try the high training of shade trees before requesting to have them cut down.

That the laying of a walk on George street does not necessitate the cutting down of all the shade trees on that side of the street but if the citizens ask for the cutting down of any tree on the street owing to injury to their property the privilege be granted on condition the claim is just.

Labor Educational Association to Take Up Question. The Labor Educational Association of Ontario will hold its sixth annual convention in Kingston on May 23, and it is stated that the chief topic of discussion will be the question of establishing a daily paper in the province of Ontario, devoted to "labor interests." The weekly paper is now on a firm basis, and it is believed by a great many of the leading labor men that the time has now arrived when a daily paper should be started.
