LIGHT PLANT.

(Continued from page 1.)

The Labor Union Petition.

Ald. Toye then took up the matter of the petition of the Trades and Labor Council sent to the city council on March 2nd, and which was referred to the finance committee. Ald. Toye held that the proper committee to have referred that petition to, was the light, heat and power committee, as the question of power for the street railway was involved.

"Why has his worship no faith in the light committee of this year?" asked Ald. Toye. "He himself has initiated as much when he didn't refer the petition to it."

Mayor Ross—"I deny that out and out. I referred the petition to the finance committee because it was the proper committee to deal with it. The petition asked for a referendum. What has the light, heat and power committee to do with that?"

Ald. Toye maintained that the petition should have gone to the light, heat and power committee. But where did it go? It went to the finance committee and was discussed behind closed doors.

"Why was this?" asked Ald. Toye. The decision that came back was signed by an alderman, who is a large stockholder in the street railway company.

"Oh, rub it in!" said Ald. Nickle. "If this is not dealt with this year, continued Ald. Toye, it will be a serious thing for the light plant. Mr. Campbell pointed that out, stating that when changes were made in the plant, it would be impossible to carry out the agreement. That time has now arrived, and it is time for the council to act. If the mayor's action is not want of confidence, then what is it? The mayor's action shows lack of confidence, or he sent the petition to the finance committee for a purpose."

Mayor Ross said that was Ald. Toye's opinion and he accepted it as such.

Ald. Graham declared that he never heard Ald. Toye get up in last year's light committee, of which he was a member, and read a report stating that there was an overdraft of \$41,000. That surely was keeping things in the dark. As to the price of gas, Ald. Graham said he never charged that Ald. Toye had done anything mean or improper.

Ald. Chown—"If Ald. Graham didn't see it in the report of a year ago, that is not Ald. Toye's fault. The report is there for any alderman to see."

Ald. Nickle wanted to know when there was a report made saying that it cost \$1.23 to manufacture gas. Was there a report for 1906 that was not presented to council?

Ald. Toye said that the financial statement of 1906, was before the committee last year.

Ald. Givens intimated that the report of 1906 was not like that of 1907. It was only a financial statement. Portions were purposely omitted by the decision of the committee.

Ald. Nickle Opposed. Ald. Nickle took issue with Ald. Toye on the probable profit that gas would yield this year. The revenue for the first three months was naturally large, but for the next six months it would be much smaller, and he doubted if the first and last three months of the year would make up the loss that would result from April to October. He held that gas consumers were getting gas at a loss of twenty-five per cent to the city. Last year's committee, he held, should have brought forward some scheme by which the cost of electricity would have been placed on a more equitable basis. Every large consumer of gas, he held, was making a profit at the expense of the small consumer of electricity.

Ald. Nickle reminded Ald. Toye that in his nomination speech last December, he had stated that the city's expert, Mr. Campbell, did not approve of the reduction of gas, but that he (Ald. Toye) had finally convinced him that a reduction could be made. Why was it that Mr. Campbell's opposition to the reduction of gas was not brought to the attention of the city council? Ald. Nickle asked. Surely that was a case of secrecy on the part of Ald. Toye, he held.

Ald. Toye replied that Mayor Ross, on the same nomination platform, had declared that the reduction of the price of gas was due not to him but to Ald. Gaskin, who had moved in committee that the price be lowered to a dollar. That was his answer to Ald. Nickle's question.

Ald. Nickle—"All the same Ald. Toye took all the credit for the reduction, claiming that it was his brains that brought the matter to a head."

Ald. Toye—"Mr. Campbell never made the statement that it was not possible to reduce the price of gas."

ager Folger how much it would cost to repair the damage by the explosion at the plant last autumn. Mr. Folger said that \$100 had been spent already and it would perhaps cost a couple hundred dollars more.

Ald. Elliott Optimistic. Ald. Elliott then took up the subject on behalf of Ald. Toye. He didn't agree with Ald. Nickle about the receipts for gas during the ensuing six months, being so small. He thought Ald. Nickle was wrong in his calculations. The people from now on will be using gas largely for cooking, and will consume a great deal. Ald. Elliott said that the council should be thankful to Ald. Toye for his explanations and information, and his opinion that it would not be necessary to raise the price of gas, as Ald. Nickle tried to make out. "If Ald. Toye knew Ald. Graham as I do," said Ald. Elliott, "he wouldn't place so much reliance on the statements he makes in council."

"What," put in Ald. Graham.

Ald. Elliott—"Ald. Toye shouldn't take so seriously these statements, especially when they come from Ald. Graham."

Regarding the petition of the trades and labor council regarding the street railway, Ald. Elliott said he wouldn't be so unkind as to say there was an object in referring it to finance and not to the light, heat and power committee. Perhaps the mayor had done this on the spur of the moment. However, it should have gone to the light committee for information as to a new street railway power agreement, and not to the finance committee, as the Ald. Nickle is a member. Of course, said Ald. Elliott, if anyone wishes to infer something the circumstances leaves itself open to suspicion.

Mayor Ross asked Ald. Angrove to take the chair, since he spoke on the question. He declared that he could not understand how any alderman could say that the petition should have gone to the light, heat and power committee, when it was a matter relating to municipal ownership. The finance committee has the proper committee for the petition. What the trades and labor council asked him for an answer to a petition they would get a fair and square one.

are cowardly," declared his worship. "I don't do things under cover to favor any man."

Ald. Graham followed. He stated that Ald. Elliott had pounded him in council discussions and given a great deal of baldness, but in the end had always supported his reports. "A man who will hammer a man and then support his reports is worse than a fool," exclaimed Ald. Graham.

This brought Ald. Elliott to his feet like a flash. "I rise to a point of order, Mr. Mayor," he said. "Ald. Graham needn't think that he's talking to Ald. Angrove or Ald. Carson. He can't call me in that way. Mr. Mayor if you don't call him down I will."

"There was silence for a moment as Ald. Elliott stood waiting for the mayor's reply.

Mayor Ross said he was waiting for Ald. Graham to overstep proper bounds, but he had not done so as yet. He had mentioned no name in his references. "When he names an alderman I'll call him."

Ald. Elliott—"His reference was to me, all right."

Then the matter dropped.

Ald. Givens stated that the reports of the past three years showed that the amount of gas consumed from May 1st to September was small. He further pointed out that the gas extensions made last year had not paid yet.

Ald. Chown concluded the discussion by pointing out that gas really sold at \$1.09 1/3 as the meter profit was not included. "Here would be a saving of \$800 this year on Mr. Campbell's salary of past years."
