

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest

REGULATIONS.

ANY eventuated action of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting as to 25, not referred, may be home-steaded by any person...

Application for homestead entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency...

Application for cancellation must be made in person. The applicant must be eligible for homestead entry.

DUTIES.—(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him...

(3) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of a homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him...

(4) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line.

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1.00 an acre...

QUARTZ.—A person eighteen years of age and over having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,000 feet by 1,000 feet...

PLACER MINING CLAIMS generally, 100 feet square. Entry fee, \$5.00.

DREDGING.—Two leases of five acres each of a river may be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years...

AN ARRANGEMENT MINING LAWS PERMIT FRAUD AND GRAFT.

The Whitney Government Refuse the Requests of the Miners—It Takes Care of Its Friends—The North Country Very Much Disturbed.

The following from a recent address of John McKay, liberal candidate in Alberta:

The Whitney government invited the explorer and citizens interested in mining to attend a convention at Toronto, in December, 1905, at their own expense.

The convention unanimously passed resolutions that no lands should at any time or under any circumstances be withdrawn from exploration or sale by order-in-council or otherwise...

The convention was strongly opposed to inspection of discoveries and to a royalty.

They urged the establishment of local mining recording offices and the creation of a government refinery.

The government established local recording offices and appointed party supporters at good salaries, and collected from the explorers and others in 1907 \$273,000 for licenses and recording fees.

They imposed a large annual tax on mining companies and levied a royalty on the profits of the mines.

The law permits a few speculators in Toronto to send up one so-called explorer with additional licenses to stake out thirty claims in the different promising camps.

They refused to establish a provincial refinery, which alone will give proper assistance to the small miner against the picked trust.

Inspection throws open the door wider to favoritism, graft and fraud than can be accomplished by any other provisions that can be suggested by the human mind.

Work alone can prove whether ninety per cent. of veins discovered will develop into a mine or not...

Time and work alone can prove their value. Instead of prosecuting alleged criminals, they brought actions in the high court of justice to set aside the patents issued by the province.

In one action they succeeded in setting aside the lease, and thereby most seriously alarmed English and American capitalists in regard to the validity of their titles to mining lands in Ontario.

They compromised one action, and during the closing hours of the session agreed to pay some of the parties interested therein \$130,000, but they withdrew their action against the mines in which the nickel trust capitalists were interested...

This defense had no weight against the minister of mines cancelling locations purchased from explorers by innocent parties.

The output of the marvellous Cobalt district in 1907 was about double the value of the gold produced in the Yukon during the same year.

The imposition of a royalty and instability of title and objectionable legislation by order-in-council has prevented millions of mining capital from being invested in Northern Ontario.

He is undoubtedly in the right when he says: "I feel satisfied that considerable numbers of the electors of this and other constituencies are just a little tired of machine politics, and are ready to give their support to any one who is independent enough to have opinions of his own, and is not afraid to give expression to them."

This spirit of independence within the party ranks is growing rapidly. In Toronto the party machines are likely to endorse the independent conservative candidates who have been put into the field.

It is too late for the North Westworth machine to do that, and it is not at all improbable that Mr. Collins will secure the support of a large number of independent voters if he determines to carry his fight as far as the polls.

In East Hamilton, fortunately, men of independent mind who resent the autocratic methods of the machine in both parties, have the privilege of supporting a candidate who is genuinely and intelligently independent.

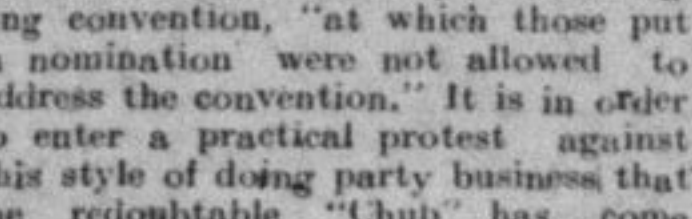

TRADE IS LOOKING UP. A Review of the United States Conditions.

Montreal Witness. In the textile trade, as in this province just now, there is a feeling across the border of depression and unrest.

But the future gives hope and confidence. Production of cotton goods and woolsens, according to reports received this week, is being curtailed by nearly thirty per cent.

While quotations have declined at least twenty per cent., the textile industry in proportion, so that the textile industry in the United States has arrived at a point in the progress of readjustment which places it in a position to respond to the slightest business improvement.

There are, happily, a few hopeful signs at the moment indicating that the low level in certain lines of trade has passed. Recovery began in Wall street shortly after the New Year, and according to predictions should make its appearance in the business world before many more weeks elapse.

Business earnings, as shown by the last statement, are most satisfactory, as each succeeding week the loss in balances becomes less and less. Probably the most encouraging feature just now is the splendid crop outlook.

The season is said to be several weeks earlier than last year, and climatic conditions have been everywhere favorable for planting and cultivation.

The cotton crop is reported as favorable, and advances to hand indicate no decrease in acreage. A bountiful harvest in the United States will accomplish more, possibly, than anything else toward restoring the industry to its former level.

Prices are being paid for all agricultural products, and the majority of the farmers all over the country are comfortably off, with a steady and growing demand for everything which the farmers can grow.

There is every prospect of the latter enjoying another profitable year, and the country at large will share it.
