

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest**HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.**

A NY even-numbered section of Dry Land in Manitoba or the Northwest Territories, sections 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or one over 18 years of age, to the extent of one quarter section, or 160 acres, more or less.

Application for homestead entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency. Entry by post or telegraph will not be valid at an Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother; son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

An application for a claim must be made in person. The applicant must be eligible for homestead entry.

DUTIES.—(1) At least six months' residence upon cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of a homesteader has died, he must reside on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.

(3) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1.00 an acre. Not more than 2,560 acres can be leased to one applicant.

Quarantine—Persons eighteen years of age and over having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,500 feet by 1,500 feet. Fee, \$5.00. At least \$100.00 must be expended on the claim each year paid to the Mining Recorder. When \$500.00 has been expended or paid and other requirements complied with the claim may be purchased at \$100.00 an acre.

PLACER MINING CLAIMS generally, \$100 per foot square. Entry fee, \$5.00.

DREDGING.—Two leases of five miles each of a river may be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$10.00 a mile per annum. Deposit, 2 per cent after the output exceeds \$10,000.

Died At Black River Bridge.

Picton Gazette.—A well-known resident of the county,
John C. Hubbs, died on Monday
morning, at his home, at Black River
Bridge. He had been in declining
health for the past three or four
years, and his end had not been unexpected.
Mr. Hubbs was one of the best known
farmers of the southern part of the county, where he had
made his home for nearly sixty years.
He had been a life long resident of
Prince Edward, having been born at
Wellington, the son of Mr. and Mrs.
Robert Hubbs, a family of very early
settlers, sixty-nine years ago. Since
a young man he had farmed at Black
River Bridge. He was a Fenian raid
veteran and possessed a medal for the
part he took in this stirring incident
of Canadian history. Mr. Hubbs was
an ardent conservative in politics and
a member of the Methodist church. He
is survived by his widow, one son,
Clarence Hubbs, at home, and a daughter,
Mrs. Walter H. Mackenzie, of Em-
erson, Man.

WAVE 26 FEET HIGH

**SWEEPED THE RIVER DROWN-
ING CHINESE.**

**Multitudes of Sleeping Natives
Overwhelmed By Bore—Tele-
graphed Warning Too Late.**

Victoria, B.C., May 14.—News of one
of the greatest disasters that China
has known, a sudden tidal bore in the
Yang Tsé King, which involves the
loss of nearly 10,000 lives at Hankow.
A bore twenty-six feet in height flooded
without warning down the river, over-
whelming thousands of junks, sampans
and small boats, and wrecking
some large river steamers.

Mr. Bell, agent of Butterfield &
Swire, at Yokohama, who arrived by
the Blue Funnel liner, stated that the
disaster has caused tremendous loss of life,
far greater, it was estimated than
the great typhoon at Hong Kong of
eighteen months ago, when ten thousand
Chinese were snuffed out. It is
usual, said Mr. Bell, to send a tele-
gram down the river when such a
flood occurs. The telegram was de-
livered, finally arriving about the same
time as the wall of water, which swept
down upon the sleeping river people
in the early morning, overturning
thousands of craft and sweeping away
thousands of Chinese in the torrent
that swept seawards.

Some 3,000 Chinese were sleeping in
small craft, in sheds and huts by the river side, at Hankow,
and were enveloped by the great
wave, which swept broken boats, split-
tered sampans and a heterogeneous
mass of debris with swarms of drowned
Chinese mixed with the wreckage.

The scenes for many days after the
disaster were horrible, the river side
being strewn with dead and debris of
wrecked craft for many miles.
