ATTEMPTED MURDER

NEGRO PLEADED GUILTY: AT WINDSOR

And Was Sent Up For Trial—The Victim's Wife Held By the Police on the Charge of Being the Instigator.

Windsor, Ont., May 15.—The case against Charles White, the negro, who it is alleged assaulted Joshua Pierce, at his home one night several weeks ago, took a sensational turn in the police court, when the colored man came up for his preliminary hearing, and was committed for trial on a charge of attempted murder. The new charge was added to that of assault by Pierce, who says that he believes White meant to take his life. The prisoner pleaded guilty on each count, and was committed for trial on both. Pierce's wife, who is charged by the police as being the instigator of the assault, was remanded for a week.

THE ALL RED ROUTE.

Canada's Commissioner Still Doing Missionary Work.

Notwithstanding the rather cool reception given in England to the idea of the "All Red" route around the world the idea is by no means dead. The Royal Colonial Institute in London recently heard Lord Strathcona, the Canadian high commissioner, read a paper in which he gave no less than twelve reasons for adopting such a route. Boiled down, these reasons were that the All Red scheme would improve the communications between the United Kingdom and Canada, cut at least ten days from the time between Great Britain and New Zealand, and two days from that between Great Britain and Australia, furnish auxiliary cruisers on the Atlantic and Pacific, divert some Canadian and American travel from New York, provide an alternative route to the east, enabling troops and supplies to be sent with less danger of interruption than in any other way, help to give Great Britain control of the Pacific trade, assist the consolidation of the empire, while its cost would be distributed among the different parts; supplement the British Pacific cable and the other steamship routes, assist the commercial expansion of the different parts of the empire, and lead to extra travel.

English financial opinion is still considering the subject with an open mind, and the London Statist thinks that unless the cost immediately exceeds the advantages most people will agree that the enterprise ought to be undertaken. The hospitality of the British mind toward the scheme is notably enhanced by Lord Strathcona's intimation that the chief burden will probably fall on Canada.

King Rockefeller's Warning.

In addition to keeping people off 35,000 acres of the best hunting and fishing lands in the Adirondacks, William Rockefeller has leased the Ottawa valley of the New York and Ottawa railroad through his Adirondack preserve and park properties, and has posted notices in conspicuous places, warning all persons not to trespass.

Heretofore those who could not fish on park lands have utilized the railroad wherever they could get a fish from that. The notices, which have earned a livelihood in fishing and summer by fishing are now practically shut off unless they can obtain a permit from the representative of Mr. Rockefeller.

Toronto is within \$1,725,000 of the limit of her borrowing power. The cost of her sewage disposal and filtration systems is estimated at \$5,120,000. Then there is \$700,000 for her waterfront wall, and \$2,250,000 for her Niagara power scheme. The amount required would exceed by \$6,250,000 the amount the city can by law borrow. She is, therefore, constrained to put off some of the by-laws for a while. What a list of profrugality would be included? Are our municipal "statesmen" not trammelled in loading the taxpayers with debt.

KERR VS. LEGGETT.

Jury Trial Over Killing of Fox Hounds.

At the sitting of the Newboro division court, on Tuesday, an action was brought by L. K. Kerr against Charles Leggett, farmers residing in the neighborhood of Newboro, to recover damages for the killing of two valuable fox hounds. The hounds were, it is alleged, killed by Leggett's son and hired man, about February, 1907, and it was not discovered until ten months afterwards, when it was found to be too late to prosecute the defendant successfully before a justice of the peace and consequently a civil action had to be brought to recover damages for the value of the dogs. After being sued, the defendant applied for a jury to try the issues. Defendant's excuse for killing the hounds was that he had learned that on one time previously the dogs had chased his sheep, and the inquiry at the trial was about this chasing and Leggett's good deal of the time. This case was viewed by the jury as insufficient, and they gave a verdict for the plaintiff for \$300 and costs.
