A BURNING QUESTION

STAND OF THE OTHER SIDE IN GANANOQUE

On the Liquor Shop License Question—The Leeds Temperance People Hold That Their Trade is What Keeps up Gananoque.

Gananoque, May 16.—The main points in the outlook at present seem to be a strong mingling of temperance and political sentiment, and following the terms of such a nature as "Gananoque is Wild," and "Indignation Meeting," in the interests of fair play the temperance people think it but right and proper that a few thoughts along the opposite side of the question might be in order. "Fair Play" was the word on the tongue of almost every speaker on Wednesday evening, and also "outside interference." Gananoque is situated in the township of the Front of Leeds and Lansdowne, and the delegates that came from there to speak at the meeting of commissioners on Tuesday voiced the feeling of the township, whose trade in Gananoque is easily ten times that of the campers during their short stay in the summer among the islands, which are township territory. The trade of the surrounding township makes Gananoque what it is.

Take it away from the township, and allow only the campers' trade and fifty per cent. of the business concerns might shut up shop. In the second place the islands on which the campers locate are in local option territory and this has never hindered them being occupied, last summer being by far the best season ever known among the islands. Mr. Dargavel is keeping "mum" on this question, as he is making every effort to hold the temperance vote, which he got at the last election, but as he has cast his vote in parliament in favor of retaining the three-fifths clause in the Ontario temperance act, it is a question if he succeeds in doing so. As Mr. Mackay, the liberal leader, has made public that if he is returned as leader of the next government, he will let the majority rule and do away with the questionable three-fifths clause. South Leeds temperance voters are therefore very castly leud their efforts not only to cast Mr. Dargavel, but in so doing help out Mr. Whitney from his present position.

Has Gathered Strong Cabinet About Him.

Senor Francisco Ferreira do Amaral, the new premier of Portugal, was entrusted by the boy king, Manuel, with trying to form a capable ministry for his distressed country a few days after the assassination of King Carlos. He became minister of the interior, a cabinet position which, in Portugal, requires the most delicate handling, and has been able to gather about him a number of strong men and to calm the excitable Portuguese to some extent. He has been an admiral in the little navy of his country, and his frequent travels about the world have given him a broader understanding of government than any other Portuguese statesman of the present era.

PLAINTIFF WAS AWARDED \$40 DAMAGES.

For Loss of Two Hounds—Death of Michael Moriarty—A Champion Boat Builder.

Newboro, May 11.—Division court was held in the court house, here, on Tuesday before Judge Reynolds, and was the largest held here in some time. Messrs. H. A. Stewart and J. Deacon, Brockville, were the solicitors in attendance. The action, brought by Leggett, attracted considerable local interest and was decided by jury. CONSERVATIVE RALLY

WAS HELD FRIDAY NIGHT IN THE CITY HALL.

Speeches Were Delivered By Hon. W. J. Hanna, J. Howard Ferguson, M.P.P., Grenville, and W. F. Nickle.

A conservative rally was held in the city hall, last night, when addresses were delivered by Hon. W. J. Hanna, provincial secretary; J. Howard Ferguson, M.P.P., Grenville, and the candidate for the provincial legislature, W. F. Nickle. Francis Nelson, of Toronto, has been appointed steward of the Buffalo Racing Association, at the coming meeting at Kenilworth which follows the Hamilton Jockey Club meeting. Charging that baseball were "doped" with chemicals so as to deaden them, Newport's club, in the Arkansas League, has been called on to explain the presence of the balls in contests with Argenta. President Craighead, of the league, also has charges on file alleging use of molasses in the balls. James P. Sullivan, of the Irish-American Athletic Club, New York, and the present American champion mile runner, who recently suspended himself by running an exhibition race against a horse in aid of a charitable institution, was restored to good standing by the registration committee of the Metropolitan Association.

Longboat raced a horse from Hagersville to Caledonia and came in half a mile ahead of the trotter in the remarkable time of fifty-four minutes and thirty seconds. London, May 16.—An optical disc, invented by Prof. Harth, a German physicist, was exhibited before the Royal Photographic Society, yesterday, and a number of beautiful effects were produced by the refraction of light in liquids. The disc showed exactly what happens when a ray of light passes through a raindrop, forming a perfect miniature rainbow.
