VERY SLOW REGISTERING.

Only 434 Names Had Been Put On Up to Noon. The registration of manhood suffrage voters continues decidedly slow. At one o'clock, this afternoon, only about 434 names had been placed on the lists in the five places of registration. This evening, no doubt, there will be a greater rush. The registrars after this evening's sitting will not sit again until Friday morning. Friday and Saturday will conclude the registrations. Those intending to register should take advantage of the slack periods.

Had A Good Session.

The regular monthly meeting of the Women's Home Mission Society was held in the old arts building, Queen's College, on Monday afternoon, when a paper full of valuable and interesting information on Alberta and its missions was given by Mrs. Bennett. It is near Vegreville, in Alberta, that the largest colony of Galicians settled. At first it was only the men among them who were able to go to church, as the women and children had no suitable clothing. Until the sales from the society arrived and these got fairly well equipped. A letter was read from Mrs. Ede, Edmonton, dealing more especially with the difficulties of the student missionaries. The president, Mrs. Laird, referred very feelingly to the loss the society has sustained in the death of one of its faithful and self-sacrificing members, Mrs. R. S. Dobbs, who considered the support of missions one of her first obligations, and would rather, if necessary, curtail the personal expenditure than reduce her contributions to their maintenance.

THE PAST YEAR WAS MOST SUCCESSFUL ONE.

Annual Meeting Was Held on Monday Evening in the Association's New Home. The Officers and Committees.

The past year was a most successful one with the work of the Y.W.C.A. This was amply shown by the reports presented at the annual meeting held last night, at the association's new home. Most encouraging in every respect were the reports given, and that the association is doing a noble work, goes without saying. There was a good attendance, the chair being occupied by Rev. W. F. Fitzgerald. After the reading of the minutes by Mrs. Snelling, Miss Bajus favored with a fine solo.

A report was presented by Miss Bell, the general secretary, which gave a most interesting review of the work carried on during the year, and dealing with the various branches of the work.

The report of the treasurer showed that during the year the sum of \$1,500 had been expended, in the carrying on of the work. Of this amount, \$231 had been received in donations, and the balance made up by membership fees, sales, and entertainments held. It was also announced that \$1,000 had been paid on the new building fund, and that \$800 was now on hand, ready for the second payment.

Mrs. Shortt gave a very interesting address on hygiene, and Miss Machar gave a review of the work of the Y.W.C.A. She referred to the organization of the association, and traced the work up to the present time.

Special reference was made to the opening of the free kindergarten on William street, and to the introduction of domestic science. Miss Machar also referred to the physical culture department, which is now on such a firm basis. The report was an excellent one, and much appreciated by the workers who had the pleasure of hearing it.

Rev. Mr. Fitzgerald gave an address, pointing out the great possibilities for women engaged in this work, touching upon many interesting parts of the work.

Dalton.

Convenors of committees: Devotional committee, Mrs. McCallum; house committee, Mrs. Ross; finance, Mrs. Strachan; building, Miss Davis; physical culture, Miss Drummond; sewing, Mrs. Bayne; and, Miss Bajus; men's, Mrs. Harvey.

In addition to the convenors of committees, the following were elected members of the board: Mrs. McCann, Mrs. E. J. B. Pense, Mrs. L. E. Anderson, Mrs. James Leslie, Mrs. Brock, Mrs. James Sutherland, Mrs. Fitzgerald, Mrs. Muirhead, Mrs. Miller, Mrs. Elmer, Mrs. R. Laird, Mrs. Stevenson, Mrs. T. Tandy, Mrs. Wilholme, Miss Isabel Ross, Miss Montgomery and Miss Bareaux.

The members of the association wish to return thanks to the many who have assisted in the work during the year. The Thursday night gymnasium class raised \$175 towards furnishings at the new home. The Lent-a-Hand Circle of the King's Daughters furnished a room, and Messrs. Robert and James Reid and E. Harney, each furnished a room. The Monday evening class assisted in furnishing, McKelvey & Birch donated a range for the kitchen and several rugs were given by different citizens.
