

IT WAS NOT FAVORED MILLIONAIRE SLAIN BY HIS INSANE SON.

Letter Commits Suicide After Murder of Drug Importer—Father's Determination to Retaliate Leads to the Double Tragedy.

New York, May 20.—A family estrangement which had driven one of the members to insanity culminated yesterday in the murder of George E. Sterry, a millionaire drug importer, by his son, George F. Sterry, jr., and the suicide of the latter.

The elder Sterry was shot down at the Pine street office of Weaver & Sterry company, limited, where he had been staying for a few moments with the murderer. The son immediately afterward shot himself and both men were dead when others of the firm hurried into the room.

The determination of the father to retaliate led to the tragedy. A letter left by the son made plain that his acts were deliberate and the product of a deranged mind.

The elder Sterry was seventy-two years old and in addition to his drug interests was president of the Bloomfield Mills company and a director in the Spring Coal Mining company. He lived on West Seventy-fourth street, and was socially prominent and active in religious affairs.

Mr. Sterry's wife died four years ago, and last January he announced his intention of marrying Miss Rachel Blaikie, a public school teacher of East Orange, N. J. Miss Blaikie, who is thirty-two years old, was a friend of the late Mrs. Sterry.

Miss Blaikie collapsed. Orange, N. J., May 20.—Miss Rachel Blaikie, who has married George E. Sterry, collapsed when she learned of the murder and suicide. Miss Blaikie had been absent from her home in East Orange during the day. Her condition is such that she required the constant attention of a physician.

The Allan steamer Parisian, for London, sailed from Montreal, at 4 a.m. The French government has decided to take part officially in the celebrations to be held in Quebec next July.

The Allan steamer Corsican, from Liverpool, for Montreal, was reported 180 miles east of Cape Race at 6.25 a.m. Eddy Bros., Blind River, Algoma, have entered an action to secure an injunction to protect their men against strikers.

The reason the executor of John B. Shirley, United States consul at Charlottetown, P.E.I., has been summarily withdrawn by the British government is that he had been engaged too prominently in commercial enterprises.

Major Broussard, medical officer at Citadel, Que., is here, undergoing an examination for the rank of lieutenant-colonel of the P.A.M.C.

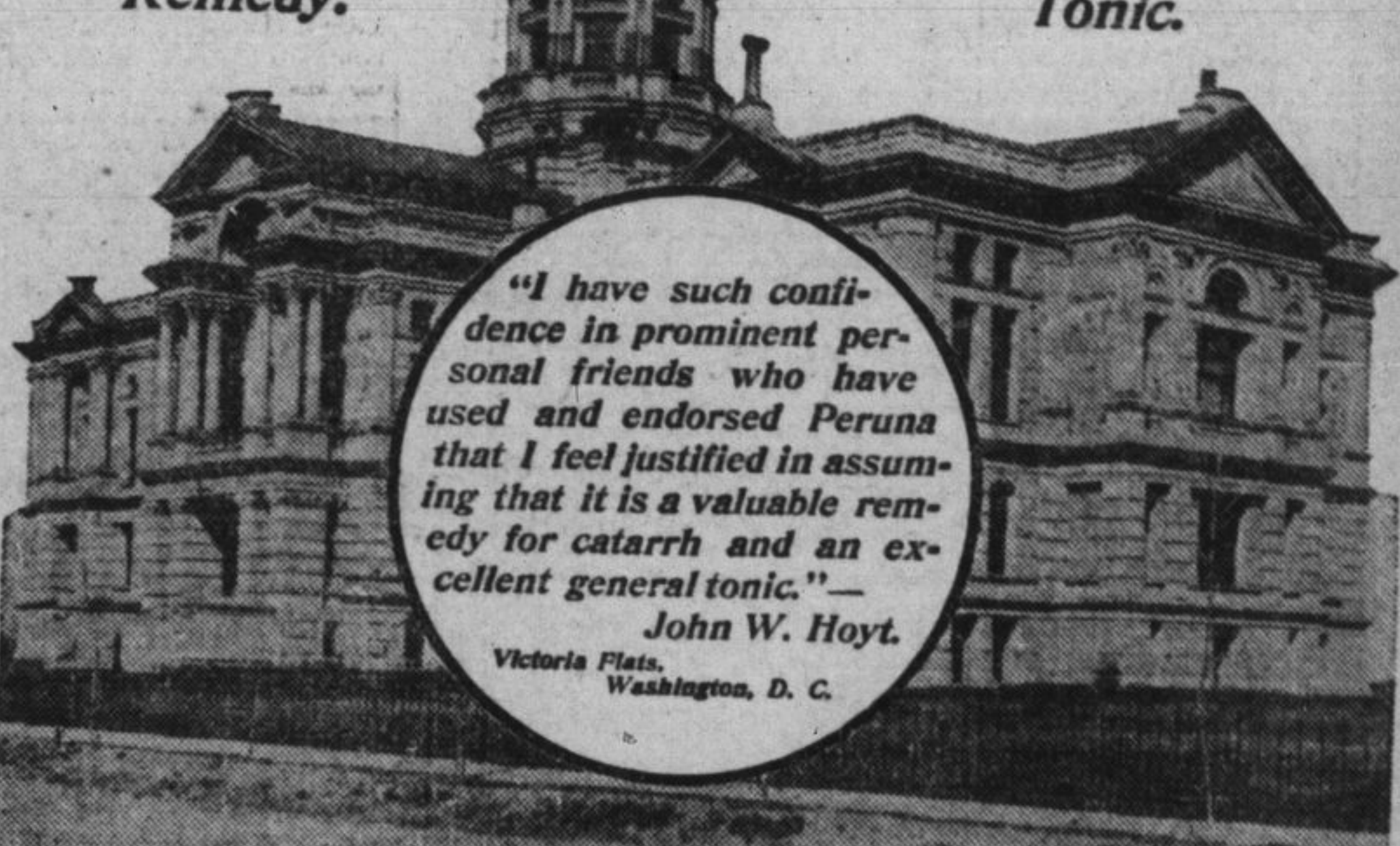

GERMAN IRE ROUSED

SERIOUS AFFRONT TO MESSENGER BY SOLDIER.

Was Beaten; Letter Spat on—Representations on the Subject Will Be Made to the French Government.

Berlin, May 20.—The German foreign office is investigating an alleged serious affront to a German consular messenger by French soldiers in Morocco, a complaint regarding which has just been received from the German representative at Fez. The story is that a messenger was sent to a commander of French troops with a letter, and some of the French soldiers beat him and one of them spat on the letter.

The incident, which at present is not reported with much detail, is causing a sensation here, as it is immediately made to the French government.

PREMIER LAID UP.

Mr. Whitney is Unable to Walk Just Now.

Toronto, May 20.—Premier Whitney, who is confined to his residence with a bad attack of rheumatism, passed a bad night. He is unable to walk, and unless there is a considerable improvement, he may not be able to take any active part in the campaign.

Accident to Bishop Richardson.

St. John, N.B., May 20.—A letter has been received from Archbishop Raymond, who with Bishop Richardson and others sailed on the steamer Lake Champlain for England to attend the Pan-Atlantic conference. He writes that the bishop struck his head against the ironwork on board and was thrown to the deck stunned. Two stitches had to be put in the wound.

Old Cannon Exploded.

Eureka, Cal., May 20.—News has come from Ferndale, a small town of the coast of Humboldt county, that by the explosion of an old cannon one man was killed and several injured. The cannon was brought to mate the passing battleship fleet.

Died At Port Dalhousie.

Port Dalhousie, Ont., May 20.—Capt. B. McGrath, born in Port Dalhousie seventy-seven years ago, an old lake captain in the sixties, also of late years hotelkeeper, and two years ago appointed lighthouse keeper, died this morning.

Another Body Found.

Tilsbury, Ont., May 20.—The body of Thomas Wiclatley, bartender at the Queen's hotel, has been found in the ruins. It was burned beyond recognition. This makes a total of three dead so far.
