His most famous publications were "Lake Lyrics," 1889; "The Bread Voyage," 1893; "Beyond the Hills of er," attracted widespread comment and unstinted admiration at the time of their publication-but the test of his work is perhaps after all that which deals with national life, deeds of heroism and the imperialistic spirit.
