REGISTRATION FIGURES

The Total For Monday and Tuesday Was 703.

The manhood suffrage registration closed last evening, until Friday morning, at ten o'clock, when it will be continued until 9 p.m. Saturday. So far 703 names have been registered, as follows: Sydenham, Ontario and St. Lawrence wards, 157; Cataract, 146; Frontenac, 173; Rideau ward, 154; Victoria ward, 73.

It is expected that the registration will be at least 1,800. Of course many Queen's students who registered on former occasions are no longer here, and the registration will accordingly be smaller.

Bread From Cassava Meal. In tropical America a cassava meal, obtained by grating the fleshy root of the manioc, made into bread. The mass which first was washed and pressed to force from it the poisonous juice. The dried pulp, pounded into a coarse meal, is made into large, flat loaves, three feet in diameter and a fourth of an inch in thickness. Such bread, when baked, may be kept in good condition for years.

SUSPENDED SENTENCE

FOR EX-IMMIGRATION INSPECTOR WAUGH.

Pleaded Guilty to Taking \$250 By False Pretences—The Money Paid Back—Claimed it Was Used Through Misunderstanding.

Chatham, May 20.—James S. Waugh, former Dominion immigration inspector, appeared before Judge Dowling's county criminal court, and pleaded guilty to the charge of obtaining \$250 from the government by false pretences. Two other charges were pressed. Counsel for Waugh represented to the judge that the client had paid back to the government all the money that it claimed he had improperly received, also paying a portion of the costs of prosecuting. He claimed that the matter was largely the result of a mistaken interpretation as to the rights of Mr. Waugh during his tenure of office. The judge handed down a six months' suspended sentence.

WILLIAM WILFRED CAMPBELL Will Give An Address at Queen's on Friday Evening.

On Friday evening the Canadian poet, William Wilfred Campbell, F.R.S., will give an address in Convocation Hall, Queen's University, at the formal closing of the faculty of education. To those who have not had an opportunity of hearing Mr. Campbell, his visit will afford a decided intellectual treat. Mr. Campbell is a forceful speaker and his message in prose is scarcely less stirring than his inspiring verse. "Canada," to quote his own words, "sings to-day to be saved from her worse self,—namely, materialism. The best cure is in the highest British ideals, character, culture, loyalty and imagination. The people need to forget their rights and awake to their responsibilities. For this end we must all work, both the educationalist and the poet, side by side."

Mr. Campbell is scarcely past middle age, having been born in 1861. His father is an Anglican clergyman, living at present in the town of Winton. The future poet was educated in Toronto and Harvard universities. He studied for the church, and in 1891 entered the civil service and is at present employed in the privy council office. His most famous publications were "Lake Lyrics," 1889; "The Broad Voyage," 1893; "Beyond the Hills of Brecon," 1895. Poems such as "The Mother," attracted widespread comment and unstinted admiration at the time of their publication—but the least of his work is perhaps after all that which deals with national life, deeds of heroism and the imperialistic spirit. There is no admission, too on Friday evening and friends of education are cordially invited.

A GRANDSON'S VISIT.

Came to Queen's to Learn of Family History. Old times at Queen's have been recalled by the visit here of Rev. Malcolm Smith, of Syracuse, N.Y. Mr. Smith is a grandson of Prof. Malcolm Smith, who followed Prof. Romanus in the chair of classics, at Queen's, when the college instructed its students and housed them in the stone building now known as "The Avonmore," on William street, and in the house which first housed the Rev. Prof. Smith's wife died at sea while they were crossing to their Scottish home, and that same summer the professor himself was drowned at Gairloch, in Scotland, and Queen's and the world lost then a brilliant classic. Prof. Smith, and all his clan, were staunch Presbyterians, but his grandchildren, including Rev. Mr. Smith, who is in town to look for traces of his father and grandfather, have left the paths of Luther and Calvin. Rev. Malcolm Smith has taken orders in the Protestant Episcopal church of the United States, and is a high churchman in faith, as well as in stature. His grandfather ruled at Queen's in the '50's, when Rev. Prof. Ferguson was a student.

YOUNGSTER CAUSED TROUBLE

A Three-Year-Old Around Local Railway Yards. A three-year-old youngster caused a good deal of worry and excitement around the local railway yards this morning. The little fellow wandered away from his home, and the cars in the yard had a great attraction for him. Railway men who noticed him were in hot water for a few minutes, as a shunting engine was at work, and it was feared that the child would be injured. The railway was halted, and gave every appearance of having "skipped out" from his home, unknown to his parents. He dodged in and around the cars, and it was some time before he was taken in charge. A lad who knew him volunteered to take him to his home.

CONCRETING THE STREETS.

First Concrete Walk of the Season Completed. This afternoon, the first concrete walk laid this season here will be finished. It is on Pembroke street. The first piece of road to be repaired will be that on Bagot street, between Brock and West streets. Extra grades have been put in, and some are also being laid in Brock street. A wire fence is being constructed around the city's newly acquired quarry property on Montreal street. The board of works meets to-morrow afternoon. The refusal of the Kirby company to accept the city council's street paving proposition may be discussed.
