**DOMINION AMMUNITION**

**DEATH FROM BURNS**  
**OF MISS NELLIE WILSON, OF MONTREAL.**

She Was to Have Been Married Shortly—Beatification of the Mother Friendless of Sacred Heart Order.

Montreal, May 22.—The death took place this morning, under pathetic circumstances, of Miss Nellie Wilson, daughter of the late Thomas Wilson, who in his life time was a well-known member of the Montreal Stock Exchange. Last Sunday, while visiting Mrs. Rene Doucet, Baile street, Miss Wilson set fire to her clothing, while extinguishing a lamp. Her injuries proved fatal to-day. Miss Wilson was engaged to be married, and the ceremony was to have taken place within a short time.

The beatification of the Mother Friendless of the Sacred Heart Order takes place in Rome, on Sunday, on which occasion there will be special celebrations held in all the houses of the order throughout the world. In Montreal, where the ladies of the Sacred Heart conduct one of the most fashionable educational institutions in America, the celebration will take the form of high mass and solemn benediction, in which Archbishop Bruchesi will participate, and many former pupils will be present. There are a number of Sacred Heart convents in the maritime provinces and Quebec.

According to reports, from headquarters, the C.P.R. is preparing to fight to a finish against the demands made by mechanics and machinists in their employ to re-negotiate the schedule of wages, which was in effect up to May 1st. The men are delighted at the decision of the board of arbitration, in Winnipeg, that its jurisdiction extends from east to west and are preparing to force their claims upon the company so that all may stand on a fall together. David McNeill, general manager, returned from Toronto, to-day, but refused to say anything of the policy of the company in the matter. However, the decision was unexpected, and officials, though knocked out for the time being, intend to come back with a heavier blow. Eastern men claim they do not want to strike, but they will stick to the western men and do all in their power to have the affairs of both sections settled on the same basis at the same time.

**GET CARNEGIE MEDAL.**  
**Bravery of Two Men at Niagara Falls.**

Pittsburg, Pa., May 22.—The Carnegie hero fund committee, yesterday, granted a medal or medal and cash in thirty instances. The awards included:

Thomas Conroy, a city fireman of Niagara Falls, N.Y., awarded a silver medal and \$1,000 to pay a mortgage on his home.

J. H. Batts, a police sergeant of Niagara Falls, N.Y., awarded a silver medal and \$1,000 to meet a payment on his home.

The two men in June, 1906, rescued Amos Schwaizer, a merchant of Sutton, Ont., who, while descending walking into the swift current of Niagara river and fought off all who attempted to save him. The rescuers, at the end of a trail ladder hanging over a current, flowing fourteen feet a second, and but fifteen feet from the brink of the falls, struggled with the insane man for nearly an hour, and finally brought him ashore unharmed.

**WAS DECLARED DEAD**  
**SO THAT INSURANCE MONEY CAN BE PAID.**

Was Samuel Hunter, of Peel County, Murdered?—Thought to Have Been Killed By Thugs in Buffalo Two Years Ago.

Toronto, May 22.—Was Samuel Hunter, the former reeve of Chinguacousy township, in Peel county, murdered by thugs in Buffalo, in 1906, and his body sent over the falls? This question arose, this morning, at Osogood Hall, on a motion on behalf of the missing man's children, to have his estate administered. Justice Clute gave judgment, declaring the man dead, for the purpose of allowing the Sons of Scotland Society to pay over the insurance on Hunter's life, which amounted to \$1,000. Hunter was a very much-respected farmer of Peel county, had held the office of reeve for seven years, and had held many positions of trust. In September, 1906, he went over to Danville, N.Y., which is about eighty miles from Buffalo, and there stayed with a close friend, Dr. William Hunter. He was there two days and then set out for home, but was never seen again. At that time there had been an epidemic of crime in Buffalo, and many bodies were known to have gone over the falls, on which no inquests were ever held. Hunter was a prosperous-looking man, and it is supposed, fell a victim of foot. At the time of his disappearance his domestic affairs were in excellent condition. The family of the late C. A. Bernard, who met death in the Tilsonburg hotel, have learned that Mr. Bernard, whose room was on the top floor, had been awakened and had dressed himself entirely, with the exception of his collar and tie. He had also time to pack his valuables. On the way down the proprietor called out, "Bernie, the stairs leading out to the back are closed. The three were seen by the firemen as they showed up. Wait a minute and we'll have a ladder." Almost at the same moment there was a rush of flame from behind which forced the heavy doors open, and the three people were knocked forward and down to the pavement below.

There has been a marked falling off in the number of immigrants coming to Canada during the present year.

Guy C. Dan, district engineer of the New Brunswick section of the Transcontinental railway, with headquarters at St. John, has resigned.

Ninth month injured, four probably fatally, on Friday, in a collision of trolley cars at the Manhattan end of Brooklyn bridge.

A former auditor of a Toronto bank has been arrested in Boston, Mass. Embezzlement is charged. It has caused a tremendous sensation.

The rebel Mohamad tribesmen along the northern Indian frontier are still desperately resisting every foot of the English advance into their country.

The Dominion Rifle Association has ordered the best imported bullets that can be secured in England for the Olympic team representing Canada.

Ralph Smith, of Nanaimo, B.C., addressed a suffragette meeting at Ottawa, cordially endorsing women's suffrage, and promising them full support.

The negotiations between the government and the opposition with reference to the Aylesworth election bill are, it is said, progressing satisfactorily.

At Kansas City Rev. Baxter Fuller, D.D., St. Louis, was unanimously elected moderator of the general assembly of the Presbyterian church in the United States of America.

The large grist mill, owned and operated by Joseph Eide, Linwood, Ont., was totally destroyed by fire on Friday morning. Loss in the neighborhood of \$8,000.

Frederick Sutton, Burlington, Ont., died at the city hospital, Hamilton, Ont., on Friday morning, as the result of injuries received on the Brantford and Hamilton Electric railroad. He was about seven years old and both legs were cut off.

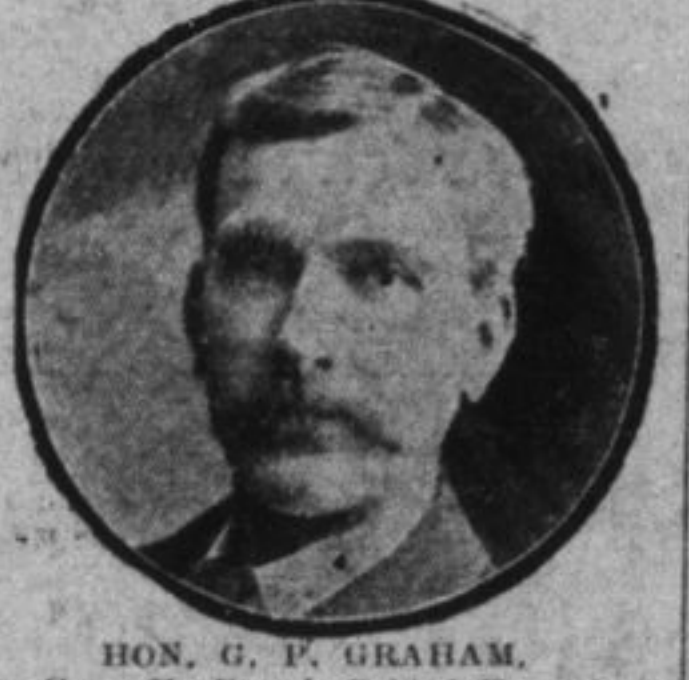
**Harbin At Mercy Of Japs.**

Shanghai, May 22.—It is said on reliable authority that the Russian government intends to sell the Kwang-Chang-Ho Harbin railway to the Japanese, which is the object of the journey of Baron Goto, president of the South Manchurian railway, to St. Petersburg.

If this plan is carried out it means the abandonment of Alaska and the Farther provinces, which would thereby be placed at the mercy of the Japanese, who would immediately possess control of Harbin.

**A Methodist College.**

Vancover, May 22.—The Methodist conference, here, has agreed to commemorate in 1909 the fiftieth anniversary of Methodism in British Columbia, and unanimously pronounced in favor of raising \$100,000 towards founding a theological college in affiliation with the University of British Columbia, to be established at Vancover. The denomination already has a Columbia College, New Westminster.

**BROKE INTO A CHURCH.**

**Woodstock Lad Confesses to Burglarizing School.**

Woodstock, Ont., May 22.—A sixteen-year-old lad, named William Jones, was placed under arrest on the charge of breaking into the First Baptist church, and after that into the school where lost from a police wing is kept. There was no wine in the cupboard at the time. The same night one of the windows of the Beale street school was forced and the building entered. Four dollars in money and a quantity of jack-knives and punitive straps were taken.

The lad confessed that he was guilty of both depredations and implicated another lad, who will also be arrested.

**VICTORIA DAY EVENTS.**

**What is to Take Place Here on the Holiday.**

Everything is now in readiness for the big celebration on Victoria day, and it is up to the weather man to make it a success. The following is a programme in brief: The battery band will play on the green fronting the city buildings, all morning.

The Marathon race will leave the market square at ten o'clock. **Woman Convicted of Murder at Kansas City.**

Kansas City, Mo., May 22.—Mrs. Sarah Morash, aged forty-eight years, was found guilty of murder in the first degree by a jury in Kansas City, Kan., which tried her on the charge of poisoning her husband, Keith Miller. The woman will be sentenced to the imprisonment. It was proved that Ruth had died from eating poisoned candy intended by the accused for the child's elder sister.

**FLITTING BILLIONS.**

Sometimes Here and at Other Times Elsewhere.

One of the consoling features of a so-called loss of national wealth caused by a shrinkage in securities is that the property that disappears may come back as easily as it goes. Let us take the case of the money that was lost in the panic of 1907. As a nation, we had lost at least five billion dollars in a year, and probably much more. Just in the stocks dealt in on the New York, Philadelphia, Chicago, and Boston exchanges, comprising only one-tenth of the wealth of the country, the shrinkage from the high to the low point of 1907 was \$1,844,297,755, or nearly forty-one per cent. If all the other varieties of our national wealth contracted in like proportion the total loss was over forty billion dollars.

Happily this sad state of things is on the mend. Between November, 1907, and April 24th, 1908, the stocks that had lost nearly five billions recovered \$1,757,255,490. They were then where they had been some months before the panic. Our apparent loss on that particular form of national wealth was reduced to a little over three billions. Before very long, perhaps next year, we may expect all that to be made up, and then we shall discover that we have not really been any poorer all along. We have only thought we have been poorer.

Of course that applies only to the country as a whole. The men who have been thrown out of employment, and the owners of securities and other property who were compelled to sell out at the bottom of the depression, have not been mere paper losers. They have suffered very real hardships.

**HAD A BAD FALL.**

**An Ottawa Electrician Badly Injured.**

Ottawa, May 22.—James Mills, one of the city electricians, aged thirty-six, today, fell from a pole. He is in St. Luke's hospital unconscious and in a very critical condition. He has a fracture of the upper jaw, one of the lower jaw, one of the skull and one of the arm. Doctors cannot, this afternoon, say whether he will recover or not.

**Expect Heavy Traffic.**

The railways expect a very heavy traffic to the city on Victoria Day. The K. & P. is placing extra cars on the trains for the holiday, and additional coaches will also be put on the trains on Saturday. With a Bay weather it is expected that quite a large number will come over the line. For the benefit of the visitors in the city both the Bay of Quinte and K. & P. trains will leave an hour later than usual, the Bay of Quinte at five o'clock and K. & P. at six o'clock, thus giving the people another hour in the city.
