A CALL TO CHRISTIANS

THEIR DUTY TO SOCIETY AND STATE OUTLINED.

Rev. W. H. Sparling Speaks on Subject at Queen Street Methodist Church Sunday Night.

The Christian Voter's Duty in the Coming Election was the subject taken by Rev. W. H. Sparling in his sermon at Queen street Methodist church, Sunday night. The text chosen was latter part of verse 31, 1 Corinthians, 10th chapter: "Whosoever ye do, do all to the glory of God." In his opening remarks he said that every part of a Christian life was sacred. It had been well and truly said that "if the religion of the people is anything, it is everything." Religion was introduced to cover the whole of one's life. The speaker wished to refer particularly to the duty of the Christian to society and state. Had the Christian any duty to society and the nation? Was he under any obligation to take part in civic, provincial or national affairs? This was a serious question. Did not the kingdom of God stand for something, and was not religion something more than a private matter between God and the soul? The starting point was the individual, but the goal was the kingdom. It was not enough that one should only strive to save his own soul; there was a far wider field than this in social service. There was a field all too little cultivated by Christian enterprise. There was just as much need for the mission and his influence in this sphere, as in the dark regions.

Rev. Mr. Sparling went on to say that to read the criticisms of the party papers one would be led to believe that there were wrongs on both sides. In the administration of the law there was so much smoke there must be fire enough to imperil the welfare of the country. Popular government was on its trial, and there was danger of falling into the same trouble as our neighbors to the south of us. In order to overcome this danger, the nation should discharge his duty faithfully. A great many Christian men had the idea that politics were too dirty and evil to have anything to do with, and so stood aside. It was true that when some moral issue came up there were enough Christian voters unpolled which would have been sufficient to turn the issue on the right side. It was necessary that Christian men discharge their duty. If there must be a political battle it should be conducted as honorable men should conduct it. Honorable weapons should be used by party warfare. Christian men should be selected to serve the people. The Lord desired Christian people to do something, and they should rise and respond to this call and so place the foundation of this great dominion broad and deep. There should be every fear of evil men. We should be worthy of the land we live in, and of those who had gone before us.

The Yacht Races.

The yacht race, under the auspices of the Kingston Yacht Club, was started at 2.30 p.m. Monday, and the sight just after the start was a very pretty one, and was witnessed by a large crowd in Macdonald Park. A handicap was arranged at the start and the boats were started in the following order: Baby Grand and Sparrow, 2.30; Toss, 2.35; Olive, Thistle and Kathleen, 2.35.30; Temerarie, 2.50.

The course was from the yacht club to the asylum point, thence to a buoy below Channel Grove, to home buoy. The breeze was light and the Kathleen were favored to their meeting by gasoline boats. The big Temerarie, with a handicap of twenty minutes, was gradually closing in on the other boats when the wind gave out. The Kathleen covered the course under her own sail, but she did not do it within the time limit, the race was declared off and will be resailed, probably on Saturday next.

The sailing yacht Ogeists, with a party from Deseronto, arrived in the harbor, Monday morning, and spent the day in the city, returning in the evening.

WAS FOUND DEAD.

Robert Vanvolkenburgh, about sixty-five years of age, a resident of McLean village, about eight miles west of Parham, Ont., was found dead, on the public road, on Monday morning. You will have heard, probably, with heart trouble, had driven to the cheese factory with his milk and on the way home it is supposed he took a weak spell, fell over the whiffletree, and was kicked on the head by the horse. Deceased leaves a wife and a large family of grown-up children.

A Veteran Dead.

Samuel Morrison, near Tamworth, died on May 22nd, aged ninety-five years. He was the oldest Orangeman in Addington county, and was probably the oldest of his denomination having entered the order seventy-five years ago in Ireland. He was an early pioneer and had lived on the same farm and in the same log house for the past sixty-five years. He was a member of the Anglican church, and was a large family, conservative in politics and possessed the esteem of the entire community for noble character and conduct. His funeral to Christ church, Tamworth, was largely attended. He was buried under the Orange order.

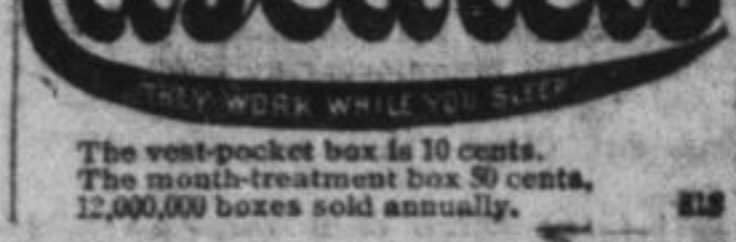
