FAILED TO CONVINCE THE C.P.R. REGARDING THE WESTERN STRIKE.

The Company Preparing to Lock Out Two-Thirds of Its Mechanical Staff—This Would Not Inconvenience the Road.

Montreal, May 27.—F. Ackland, of the department of labor, Ottawa, who has been here in conference with D. McEvilly, general manager of the C. P. R., with reference to the arbitration deadline in Winnipeg, has returned to the capital without being able to convince the management that it should permit the western matters at stake to be arbitrated along with the situation in the east.

It is asserted in railway labor circles that the C. P. R. is preparing to lock out two-thirds of its mechanical staff to impress on its employees that eastern and western interests must stand apart; and that it can do this without inconveniencing the service to any extent at the present time. The closing of the McAdam shops is regarded as partly a hint in that direction.

At the annual meeting of the Bonninton Textile company, the year's financial statements showed net earnings of \$800,000. There was written off for repairs and betterment \$218,000, and for new plant and machinery \$225,000. After paying interest and dividends there was a surplus of \$43,000. Sales for the year amounted to \$8,045,000, a decrease of \$461,000 on the previous year. The company employed 6,000 hands and wages amounted to nearly \$2,000,000, some \$200,000 over the previous year.

PITH OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest Called From All Over the World.

Bear Admiral Crownfield died at the Episcopal hospital on Wednesday morning.

"Grand Trunk" earnings for the third week of May showed a decrease of \$111,377.

A gasoline launch exploded off Point Atkinson, B.C. The occupants plunged into the water and swam ashore.

C.P.R. traffic earnings for the week ended May 21st, 1908, \$1,255,000; for the same period last year, \$1,517,000; increase, \$262,000.

Mr. Jamison, a Vancouver tailor, had his skull fractured while leaning out of a street car window by a blow from a passing car.

The schooner Fane, of Gloucester, Mass., was run down, off the Maine coast, by the steamer Bounton, and thirteen members of her crew were drowned.

Mrs. Henrietta Grisman pleaded guilty at Toronto sessions to a charge of stealing a \$9 table cloth, from Eaton's. Remanded for sentence till Saturday.

Rev. Charles A. Washington, colored bishop of the British Methodist Episcopal church of Canada, died at Woodstock, on Thursday night, aged sixty-one years. Bishop Washington lived in Windsor.

Maurice Powers was yesterday killed at Rossland, B.C., while landing some holes in a stop in the seventh level of the Centre Star mine with a new powder called Nitrocellite. Powers had his head partially blown off.

Four persons were killed and a number badly injured by a tornado which struck Abrahams, Okla., on Wednesday.

Half a dozen farm houses were destroyed and the crops for an area of several miles were ruined.

Before Sidney Morris, wanted in Toronto on charges of defrauding Toronto wholesalers, will be handed over to Canadian justice, further evidence will have to be put in. Morris was captured in London, Eng., several weeks ago.

Five men were buried alive while digging a sewer on one of the main streets in Wilkes-Barre, Pa., on Tuesday evening. Three of them were rescued but the other two had their lives crushed out.

Thomas Kirkpatrick and Emma Hayes were in Toronto police court, accused of bigamy. Kirkpatrick said his first wife, with whom he had not lived for twelve years, was married again. He was remanded. Emma Hayes surprised the court by declaring she was not married to Kirkpatrick. She will produce evidence,
