



**METCALFE'S MEETING**

(Continued from page 1.)

"We are going before you to a large extent, with an endorsed policy," said Mr. Pense. Many charges had been made against the Ross departments, but none of these had been proven. The party had a clean leader, and he urged that the liberal government be given the confidence which had been taken away. Credit was due the Ross government for its many progressive policies, especially in regard to labor.

In his concluding remarks, Mr. Pense said that in the past he had always stood for what was in the best interests of the people, and would always continue to do so. He would not have the opportunity of canvassing all the voters, personally, and so would urge them to be ready for the contest on June 8th.

The speaker was loudly cheered on taking his seat.

**Mr. Nickle Called:**

Mr. Nickle was then called upon, and was greeted with cheers. He said that Mr. Metcalfe had asked him to attend the meeting, to discuss public questions, and in reply to this he had come to the meeting. He was surprised that Mr. Metcalfe had taken up thirty minutes on a personal attack on the speaker, and not touched upon any question of the day. His feelings towards Mr. Metcalfe were of the kindest nature. He had always looked upon him as a bright, genial promising man. Mr. Metcalfe had said the speaker should say, "Honest enough to be cold." He would say that he was honest enough to be cold, and would not be going around the streets saying, "How are you boys?" The speaker was running as the nominee of the conservative party. He referred to the convention, at which he was nominated, and said that Mr. Metcalfe said to him, "If you get the nomination I will run, no matter what happens."

"I told Mr. Metcalfe," added Mr. Nickle, "if I got the nomination I would run, and if he got it, I would stand by him. I don't think fair play! All I want is fair play and no favor." (Applause.)

Mr. Nickle said that at the meeting of delegates to convention, Mr. Metcalfe was the only one who refused to abide by the decision of the convention. As regards the charge of disloyalty made against him by Mr. Metcalfe, he would say that he always endeavored to be courteous to everyone. The cry had been made that he had money. If he had money, it was no credit to him, as his father made it. Was it discreditable to try in an honest way to represent people in the legislature? Mr. Metcalfe had made fun at the motto, "Bold enough to be honest, and honest enough to be bold." Not long ago, Mr. Metcalfe had echoed this to the echo. (Laughter.)

The speaker spoke of the secret ballot being introduced by the Whitney government, and about the expenditure of \$600,000 additional money on education. The Whitney government had accomplished a great deal.

Canada, he said, was behind, simply because she refused to develop her resources. The expenditure on education had been objected to. Should objection be raised by the liberal party about the grants to Queen's University? The claim was made that the Whitney government was extravagant.

This was not so; the spending of money to get results, was the highest economy.

Mr. Nickle said that Mr. Metcalfe had a right to come out as a labor candidate if he so wished. He was glad to see the questions discussed on the platform. He then took occasion to refer to his debate with Ald. Toye, at the city hall to-night, and invited all the ratepayers to attend.

"You won't last long," said a voice.

"The 'getting in' is not everything," said Mr. Nickle, in his closing remarks. "It is the standing out for the principles which you think are right that counts."

**Gave Second Address.**

Mr. Metcalfe again, at the close of Mr. Nickle's address, and had something to say about the "unfair bunch of conservatives." He had been told that he would get the nomination next time, but said "they will be fairer with me than at present." Mr. Nickle, he said, was very anxious to get into parliament, now that Mr. Whitney was in power, because of his desire to get the patronage.

The speaker caused much laughter when he announced that Mr. Pense required a rest and that he (Mr. Metcalfe) would fill his place in the legislature.

Regarding education, he stated that the system was wrong. He believed that too much time was taken up with the young children, taxing their young brains. The public school curriculum for children, should be shortened.
