REFORM HABITUALS BY CONCILIATORY TREATING.

Would Affect Two Classes—Measure Proposes to Follow Penal Sentences by a Period of Preventive Detention.

London, May 28.—Home Secretary Gladstone, has introduced, in the House of Commons, a bill aiming to reform habitual criminals by conciliatory treatment. Mr. Gladstone said the present system was sufficient deterrent for fifty to sixty per cent. of the prisoners, but was useless for two classes, namely, those who are criminal owing to mental or physical deficiency and those preferring to live by crime.
