At the Frontenac cheese board, on Thursday afternoon, the following factories brought:

At 10c. Mr. Gibson secured the boxes, and Mr. Alexander secured the balance at 10c. All the factories sold with the exception of McGrath's and Cold Springs.

The matter of having the cheese properly weighed and tested in Kingston was brought before the board by P. Vallois, and there was some discussion, but no definite action taken. Mr. Vallois also urged that more care be taken in the setting up of the boxes for shipment. He said that it would be well to have some one appointed to do the weighing.
